The Official Returns.

The Herald is indebted to Collector Street for the Customs, Excise and Savings Bank returns at Fredericton for August. The value of goods entered here was \$22,544, as against \$10,750 for the same month last year and the duty thereon was \$1705.75. The value of goods exported from Fredericton was \$4708, as against \$9,221 in August, 1904. The duty collected on tobacco during August, was \$2,135.50. During the past month the deposits in the Savings Bank amounted to \$11,493; the withdrawals \$13,787, leaving balance due depositors, \$618,491.30.
