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The Late Solomon Denton.

A brief notice in the obituary column of the newspapers, announces the death of Solomon Denton, who many years ago was a well known and highly respected citizen of Fredericton. Mr. Denton was a native of Scotchtown, Queens County, where he died at the ripe age of eighty-two years, and for a long time was a successful and popular school teacher. Many of the leading business and professional men of Fredericton to-day were pupils of his in the little school room to the rear of Albert W. Edgcombe's present residence on King street, and every one of them with whom THE HERALD talked regarding their old schoolmaster, spoke in the most respectful terms of his great industry and success in his profession. Frank I. Morrison, who was one of Mr. Denton's last pupils here, is in possession of the desk the teacher used and prizes it highly as a memento of the past. When Mr. Denton retired after a long and successful career in his profession he was succeeded by C. S. Ingraham, who conducted the school for some years, and continued the good work inaugurated by Mr. Denton. The deceased gentleman was married to a sister of Robert Mitchell of this city, and an aunt of Hon. Mr. Mitchell, Provincial Secretary; they had no issue. Mrs. Denton is still living in the enjoyment of a peaceful old age at Scotchtown, and is visited occasionally by her kinsman, the Provincial Secretary. THE HERALD offers its sympathy to her in the loneliness of her late honored husband's home, and wishes her to be comforted by the high esteem in which her late husband was held by his old friends in Fredericton, and to remember that his efforts in the cause of education have borne excellent fruit, such as Mr. Denton hoped for when in the active discharge of his public duties.

Unmarked Logs Sold.

The annual sale of unmarked and mixed marked logs that have come and are yet to come through the booms this summer took place at the office of A. F. Randolph & Sons Thursday forenoon. The marked logs were sold as follows: Cedar, 31,850 feet, to E. Babbitt & Sons at \$225; pine, 21,800 feet, to Hale and Murchie at \$700; spruce, 373, 633, merchantable, 151,440 battans, 64,540 condensed, or a total of 583,013 feet, to E. L. Jewett at \$700.57. The mixed marked logs were sold as follows: Hemlock, 8,270 feet, to Hale & Murchie at \$810; cedar, 18, 280 feet, to E. A. Babbitt & Son, \$2; pine, 1,130 feet, to Hale & Murchie, \$5; spruce, 13,111 merchantable, 12,355 battans, 6,702 condensed, or a total of 32,078 feet, to Geo. E. Barnhill, at \$700.67.

Drowned at Canterbury.

A very sad drowning accident happened at Canterbury on Friday last week. Mrs. Angus McCallum and Mrs. Scott were in a canoe fishing in Moore's mill pond. They attempted the craft to get too close to the mill dam, and in spite of their efforts it was overturned. Mrs. McCallum and her companion were thrown out, the former striking her head against a rock. Mrs. Scott became caught between two rocks and the force of the current kept her head above water. She was just rescued in time, but Mrs. McCallum was drowned. Mrs. McCallum was a young woman between thirty and forty years old, and leaves six children. Her husband is a shoemaker.

The Sale of the Dr. Brown Estate.

The sale of the Dr. Brown estate was concluded Saturday afternoon after THE HERALD went to press. The Hon. Dr. Brown farm was put up again the necessary deposit of ten per cent not having been made by Mr. Brown, who bid in in the morning, and was knocked down to John T. Miles for \$2,800. HON. JOHN GLASIER.

Dies Suddenly at Ottawa of Cholera.

The Funeral Services and Sketch of His Life.

Just after THE HERALD had gone to press last Saturday, the news reached Fredericton that Hon. John Glasier, Senator for Sunbury had died suddenly at Ottawa. The particulars of his unexpected death, and a brief sketch of his long and active life will be read with interest. Senator Glasier had been at the Capital all the session attending to his parliamentary duties and enjoyed exceptionally good health. For a man of his advanced years, on Sunday, July 1st, he was up and around, active and in good spirits. After breakfast at his hotel the Grand Union, he walked to the parliament buildings, wrote some letters home, and generally felt as well as usual. The same night he was taken ill with cholera, and although he was hopeful himself of a speedy recovery the physicians said he failed to rally after the second attack. A man of his age could scarcely stand so violent an attack. Dr. McMillan a fellow senator and close friend of Senator Glasier, Dr. Roome, M. P. and others were

on the suffering man, but all to no purpose. His son Arthur was telegraphed for on Monday, but owing to the C. P. R. accident he did not get away until Tuesday, going by the Intercolonial route. He reached his father's side Thursday, and even then the Senator thought he would pull through. He suffered very little pain, was perfectly conscious and rational up to 3 p.m. Friday, but the aged frame could not stand against the insidious enemy, and death closed his eyes at 2.30 o'clock Saturday morning.

The body was immediately placed in the hands of an embalmer, the Government very kindly undertaking to bear all the expenses at Ottawa for two years. When the remains left Ottawa for home, many members of the Senate and House of Commons, accompanying the sad procession from the hotel to the depot. Mr. Glasier with his charge arrived at Wascott Monday at noon, and was met by undertaker John G. Adams, and the remains of the deceased Senator were borne to his late home at Lincoln.

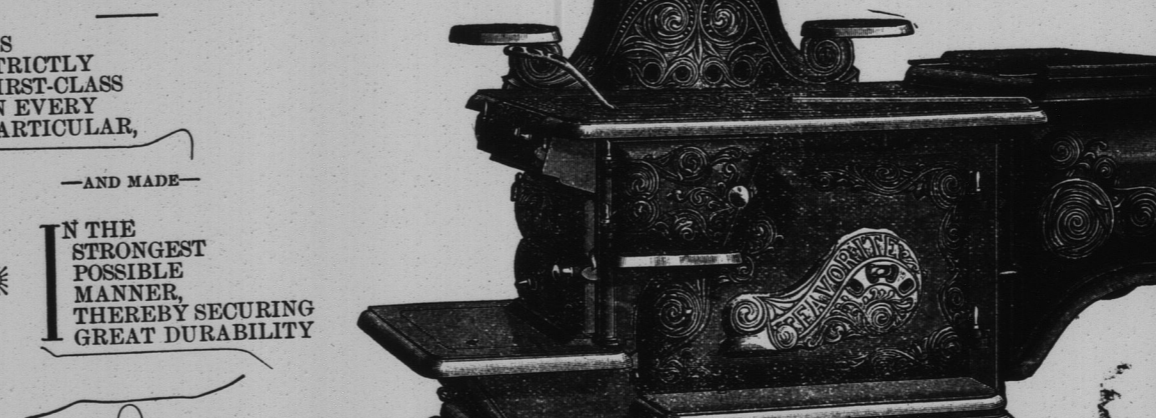
