Master Charlie Allen, son of T. Carleton Allen, is home from the Davenport school for the holidays.

It is expected that the new Salvation Army barracks will be ready for occupation about the middle of January.

Mrs. A. G. Fair is in the city, staying with her mother, Mrs. Geo. Thompson, who has been ill for the past few days.

The Herald has received some very handsome calendars from Frank I. Morrison, the well known fire and accident insurance agent.

W. T. Whitehead, John A. Edwards, Alderman, and E. T. Winslow, went among the Frederictonians who attended the funeral of the late Hon. D. McLellan at St. John yesterday.

Geo. W. Allen, the well known barrister, has been suffering some weeks at St. John with a severe attack of inflammatory rheumatism, but is showing some improvement the past few days.

Nora Allen, the eight year old daughter of E. H. Allen, used a dipper of boiling water on one of her arms yesterday, severely scalding that member and suffering much pain from the accident.

A small blaze in some packing boxes in the rear of the Misses Young's millinery establishment, created some alarm at midnight Wednesday, but the fire was put out before any damage resulted.

The road committee of the city council have opened the tenders for 600 perches of stone for macadamizing purposes. The tenders of Michael Cooney, Frank Gordon, and John McKay for 200 perches each were accepted.

Agricultural Society for District No. 34 will hold their annual meeting at the Queen hotel on next Saturday afternoon, the 29th, at 2 o'clock. As matters of importance are transacted at these meetings, a good attendance is hoped for.

The Merchants' bank in this city, will receive subscriptions for the benefit of Lady Thompson and family, and all money paid for this purpose will be deposited to the credit of the Hon. G. E. Foster, treasurer of the National subscription fund.

Nomination of candidates to fill the vacancy in Madawaska, by the resignation of Levitt Thériault, has been fixed for the 31st inst. Polling will be on the 7th of January. The only candidate yet in the field is Hector Nadeau, a Government supporter.

The country market has been lively for the past few days and produce of all kinds plentiful. Turkeys sell from 9 to 11 cts per lb; chickens, 40 to 50 cts per pair; geese, 75 cts.; beef, 5 to 6 cts. There will probably be a rush on Monday.

Governor and Mrs. Fraser extended their sympathy to Lady Thompson in the following dispatch: "Greatly shocked to hear of Sir John Thompson's sudden death. Please convey to Lady Thompson most sincere sympathy from my wife and myself."

The will of the late John B. Greaves has been probated, and letters testamentary granted to the widow of the deceased and A. D. Yerxa, the executor and executor named in the will. The estate was sworn at \$2,000 leasehold and \$13,000 personal.

The land and buildings at Hawkeshaw, belonging to the insolvent estate of John A. Scott, were sold at public auction this morning under an order of the Master, Frederick I. Morrison, Mr. Bowman, of Hawkeshaw, becoming the purchaser at \$75 over the mortgage of \$50.

Thos Harrison, son of Wm. Harrison, of Sheffield, is home from the Northwest after an absence of four years. He resides at Moosejaw and is well known in Fredericton, having graduated from the University. Mr. Harrison is receiving a warm welcome from his numerous friends.

The estate of the late Mrs. Bridget E. Scully, wife of W. H. Scully, is entered at \$12,000, of which \$5,000 is real and \$7,000 personal property. As Mrs. Scully left no will, the personal property goes to Mr. Scully, and the real estate will be divided among the several heirs.

Mr. Mitchell, Manager of the Merchants' Bank, had the misfortune yesterday afternoon of falling on the ice and dislocating his shoulder. Dr. McLearn pulled the limb together again, and while Mr. Mitchell will be inconvenienced for some days, he will be able next week to attend to business as usual.

Dr. Harrison, Chancellor of the University, left Thursday to meet his youngest son Arthur, who has resigned his position in the railway service at Cincinnati, and is now on his way to study law at Edmonton, N. W. T., where his brother, Dr. J. D. Harrison, is located. The Chancellor expects to return at the end of next week.

A hallujah wedding was celebrated at the City Hall Wednesday evening, when ex-Capt. Galpin of the Salvation Army, was married to Miss Jennie McAlpine, of this city. Rev. Mr. Payson performed the legal ceremony. The bride was Miss Nellie Lipsett, daughter of the Farmer editor, and the groomsmen Capt. Byers.

W. E. Stavert, Manager of the Bank of Nova Scotia here, has been ordered to St. John's, Newfoundland, where the bank proposes establishing an agency, and he leaves for that city on Monday. He does not know whether he will remain there any length of time or not. If the order should result in Mr. Stavert's permanent removal from Fredericton, there will be sincere and general regret in business and social circles. Both Mr. and Mrs. Stavert have endeavored themselves to a large circle of friends during their short residence in Fredericton. Mrs. Stavert will remain here for the present.

The Hoegg Matter.

The special committee of the city council appointed to meet and discuss with G. W. Hoegg the proposition of his firm for exemption from taxation and free water for a term of ten years, held its first session last night. The committee is composed of Ald. Golding, Babbitt, Macnutt, Gilman and Anderson, and all were present. Mr. Hoegg and his solicitor Geo. A. Hughes, were also in attendance, and there were also present by invitation Jas. S. Neill, President of the Board of Trade, J. C. Risteen, and John Palmer, the two latter representing the manufacturers of Fredericton. Mr. Hoegg was heard in behalf of his Hoegg making strong case in favor of the proposed exemptions. Mr. Neill, Mr. Risteen and Mr. Palmer also addressed the committee and all favored the council meeting Mr. Hoegg's request. Mr. Neill said that the Board of Trade is unanimous in its opinion that the city should give all possible concessions to any person seeking to establish new industries here. The committee after hearing these gentlemen discussed the matter briefly. Ald. Macnutt offered a resolution recommending the council to grant Mr. Hoegg's request, it being understood that his firm would enter into an agreement to carry out the propositions contained in the memorial, but some members of the committee wanted further time to consider the matter. Ald. Gilman, Babbitt, Golding and Anderson all left the impression that when the members will come to some understanding in the matter, and make their recommendation to the council.

A Credit to Fredericton.

The citizens of Fredericton have every reason to feel a pride in the enterprise and public spirit of William Kitchen, who on Wednesday threw open the doors of his new and immense furniture establishment to the public. The building is one of the handsomest and most substantial in this city, and indeed would do credit to a town of very much larger pretensions than Fredericton. It is of brick, four stories high, and is finished throughout in a most workmanlike manner. The front is exceptionally handsome, something entirely new in design here, and will enable Mr. Kitchen to show off his big stock to the best advantage. The four flats are without partitions and each measure 100 x 33 ft. The entire building is neatly tiled, filled and varnished, showing the natural spruce wood. A large elevator runs to the top storey, and a rear entrance is gained from King street. The offices are admirably located and arranged, the larger one for the book-keeper and his staff, the other for Mr. Kitchen, and both besides being steam heated are furnished with register grates. A Herald representative who was kindly shown over the building by Mr. Kitchen ventures the opinion that there is not a mercantile establishment in New Brunswick with better facilities for doing business than are possessed by Mr. Kitchen in his new and beautiful premises. We hope his enterprise may be fully rewarded, and that his shadow may never grow less. It is men like Mr. Kitchen who build up a city, men who spend their money here, and show their faith in the future of Fredericton. We can extend on behalf of Mr. Kitchen, a cordial invitation to the public to visit and inspect his immense establishment. All will be assured of kind and courteous treatment whether they want to buy goods or not.

Died of His Injuries.

George Fraser, whose serious injuries from a runaway accident, were told in the last Herald, died at the Victoria hospital yesterday morning, never having regained consciousness. He was twice married, and three children by his first wife survive, as do also his second wife, daughter of the late Mrs. Charly Moore, and her five children. The funeral will take place at 2.30, p.m., tomorrow, services by Rev. Willard Macdonald. The Organmen will attend the funeral in a body, the deceased having been a prominent member of that body. The sad circumstances of Mr. Fraser's death have called out the sincere sympathy of the community for his wife and family, who are quite prostrated by the unexpected loss. Mr. Fraser was an honorable, honest and industrious man, and had a large circle of acquaintances, who will hear of his violent death with much regret.

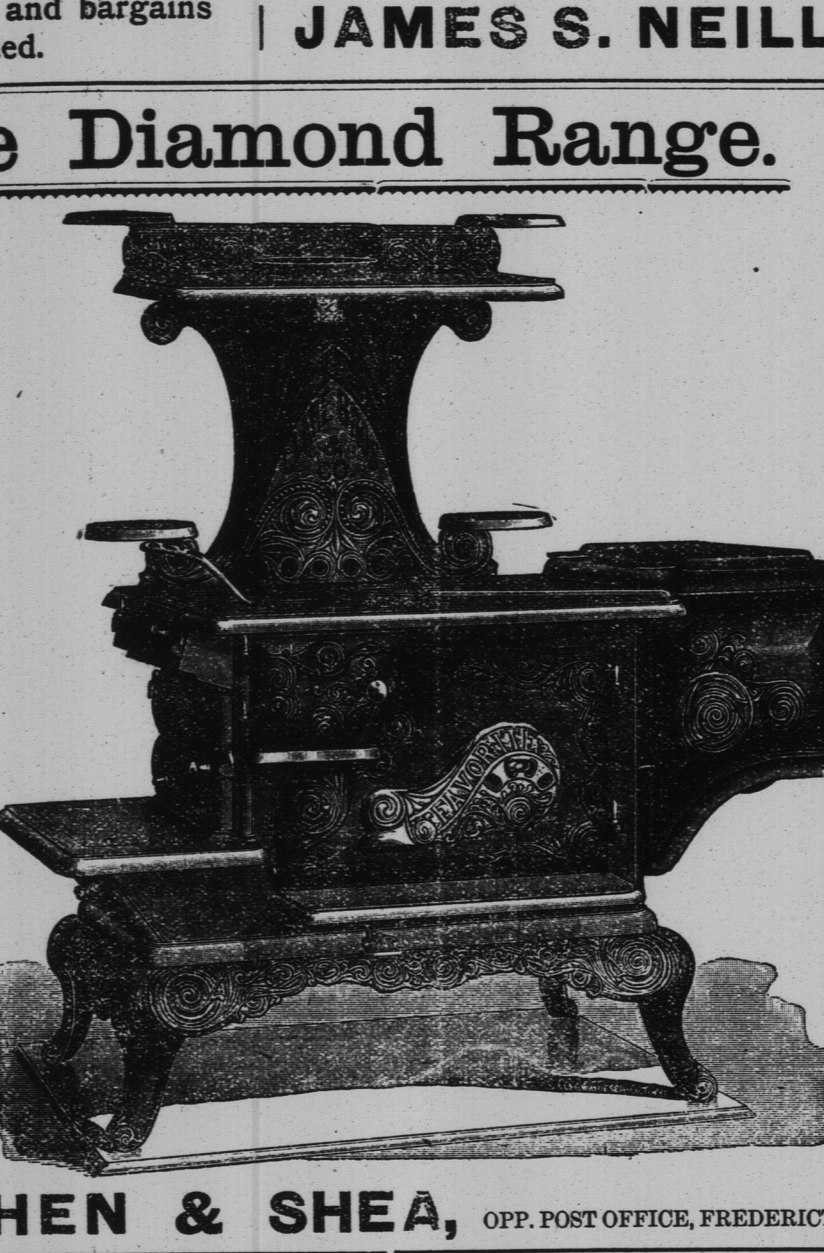
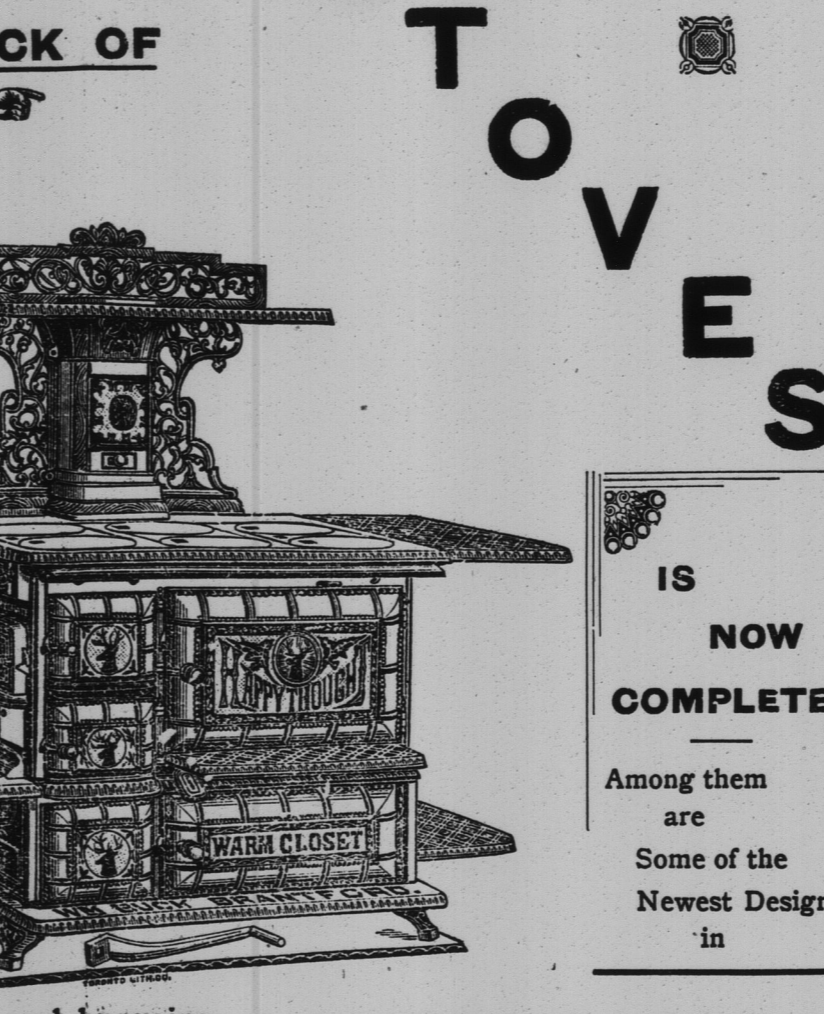
