THE FORESTERS MEET.

Wonderful Growth of the Order During the Past Year.

The high court I. O. F., of New Brunswick, met Monday evening, H. G. C. Coleman in the chair, in the temperance hall, York street. Over two hundred were in attendance.

In his opening address High Chief Ranger Coleman, of St. John, in referring to the growth of the order said: In considering the advancement of our order we are naturally proud of its great strength and its most remarkable growth, standing as it does today with a membership of 77,444, an addition of 15,875 to our membership during the year. This is an average increase of 1,383 members per month. Also, the remarkable increase of our reserve fund, which has far exceeded our anticipations, having reached the magnificent sum of \$1,317,600. The amount added for the year ending June last was \$336,119, being an average increase of \$28 per month.

I would now call your attention to our own jurisdiction, in whose progress and prosperity we are more particularly interested. I am proud to be able to report a record that surpasses the result of that of any previous year. The following statement— increase in membership, and number of courts instituted for each year since the organization of this high court— will show this:

This statement shows that since our inception we have had a good, sound, healthy growth, and also strong evidence of the soundness of the principles of our order. Our growth during the past year goes to prove conclusively the hearty co-operation of the entire membership in the work.

The following statement will show you how the order has been extended in this jurisdiction, as it gives the number of courts in each county and the entire membership for the same. It may be noticed that one county (Gloucester) is not mentioned, because we have not one court in that great county.

I believe I voice the sentiment of our entire membership when I say we are proud of our position, standing as we do, sixth in point of membership in the entire supreme jurisdiction. I am particularly proud to call your attention to the fact that the increase in membership in this jurisdiction during the past year, has not been equalled by any other high court jurisdiction, that is, in proportion to the population of the provinces or states where the order is located.

Report of High Secretary.

The high secretary, F. W. Emerson, in his report says: Ever since I have had the honor of being your secretary, it has been my pleasure to report that each successive year had been the most prosperous one. Today I am able to report that since July 1st last, our progress, both in the increase of our membership and in the number of our subordinate courts has been far ahead of any made in any previous year.

Our membership on July 1st, 1894, was 2,832. Today it is about 4,000, an increase of over 40 per cent. On July 1st last, we had 67 subordinate courts in this jurisdiction, while today we have 105, an increase of 58.

No court has been suspended. It affords me great pleasure that not only many of our leading public men, merchants, bankers and professional men, but many of our young farmers—the bone and sinew of our country—have enrolled themselves on the honor-roll of our beloved order.

The following were elected delegates to the supreme court, which meets in London on August 1st: Wm. Kinghorn, F. W. Emerson, G. G. Scovill, M. P. P., A. M. Belding, and John McAllister, M. P.

The Holiday.

The weather Monday was beautiful for our outdoor holiday celebrations, and Fredericton was crowded with visitors. The Foresters commenced to arrive in the morning from all points in the province, and there must have been five hundred of them in town during the day.

REV. MR. PARKER'S CASE.

Disposed of by the Conference Committee at Marysville.

The Methodist conference which closed its session at Marysville Thursday, dealt with the charges against Rev. Mr. Parker, with taking from William Miller of the same place, an amount of money under false pretences or as a forced loan; [2] that Mr. Parker uttered a falsehood on or between the 12th and 20th of February last, by charging Mrs. William Miller with attempting abortion on Bessie Newman.

The committee which tried the charges was composed of Revs. Robert Wilson, Douglas Chapman, Job Shenton, Thomas Marshall and George Steel, and they found that the charge of obtaining a forced loan is sustained and proved, and that the defendant is guilty of the offence laid thereon, and that charge of uttering falsehoods is true. This committee believes that Mrs. Miller was entirely innocent of the charge made against her by Rev. Mr. Parker.

Against this verdict the defendant in the case appealed on the grounds [1] that the decision is against law and evidence and the weight of evidence; [2] that the committee refused to allow the defence to examine the witnesses questions that were proper and necessary to the proof of his innocence. After hearing the appeal the committee resolved:

First—That the charge of obtaining a forced loan is not sustained by the evidence. Second—The finding of the committee that he was guilty of uttering falsehoods, and that Brother Parker when making the statements concerning Mrs. Miller believed them to be true, is sustained.

Third—This court is of the opinion that Mr. Parker's relation to the case has been marked by serious indiscretions that this court expresses its strongest disapproval of such conduct, and it therefore orders that Mr. Parker be suitably admonished and reproved by the proper authority of this conference.

An amendment was offered by Rev. Dr. Stewart, which read thus: That the finding of the committee in the case of Rev. I. N. Parker be hereby accepted and re-affirmed by the conference.

Neither the chairman nor the members of the committee of trial are allowed to vote in such a case. The result of the voting was as follows: For the amendment, 13 to 20; for count one of the motion, 26 to 13; for count two, 29, none against, and for the essence clause, 11 to 7.

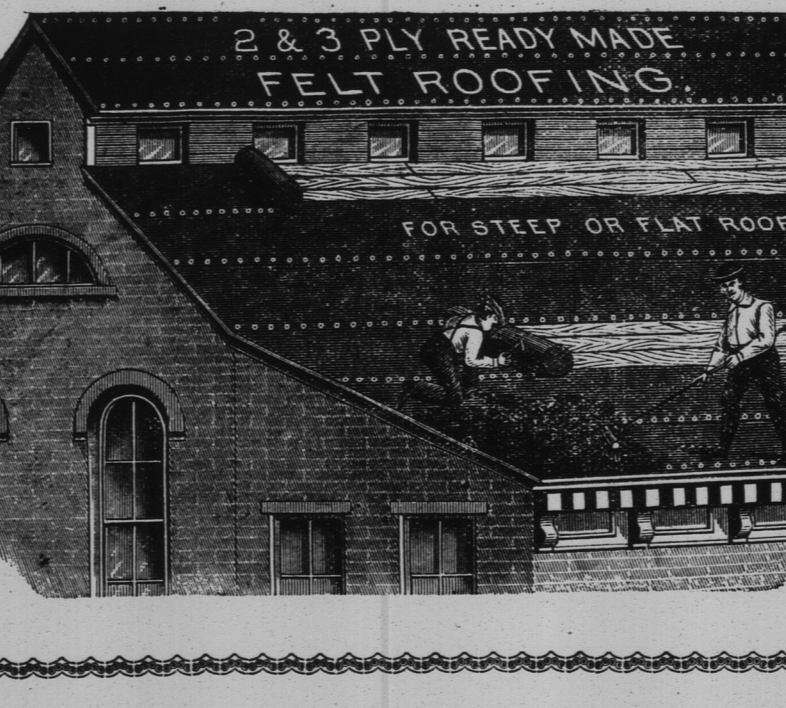
