The Fredericton Bridge.

A return was laid on the table of the House of Commons last week regarding the relations between the Fredericton & St. Marys Bridge Co. and the Dominion Government. The papers brought down, however, are only part of what was moved for. A statement submitted shows that the amount of tolls for traffic collected up to June 30, 1889, was \$1,546; for the year ending June 30, 1890, \$2,461; 1891, \$2,908; 1892, \$3,300; 1893, \$3,011; 1894, \$4,354. Total, \$18,580. According to the statement entered into, the bridge and other property belonging to the company is now the property of the government. This interesting clause of the agreement regarding the tolls, and the advances and interest within fifteen years from the date of the advance of the first sum, then in either case all their property, real and personal, and all their rights, franchises, assessments and privileges, shall be sold, to be come, by act of default, and without any proceedings for condemnation, foreclosure or possession, forfeited to the crown, and her Majesty, by her officers or agents, may thereupon enter on and take possession of the same and the same shall thereupon be the property of her Majesty, as represented by the Dominion government. The agreement is signed by J. H. Pope, Minister of Railways, and Alex. Campbell, President of the Bridge Company. No copies of the correspondence that has passed between the government and the bridge company with regard to the default, interest is brought down, according to the Auditor General the bridge company have repeatedly been written to, calling attention in the ordinary way to the unpaid interest account, but these appeals, so far as the correspondence brought down, appear to have been treated with silent contempt.

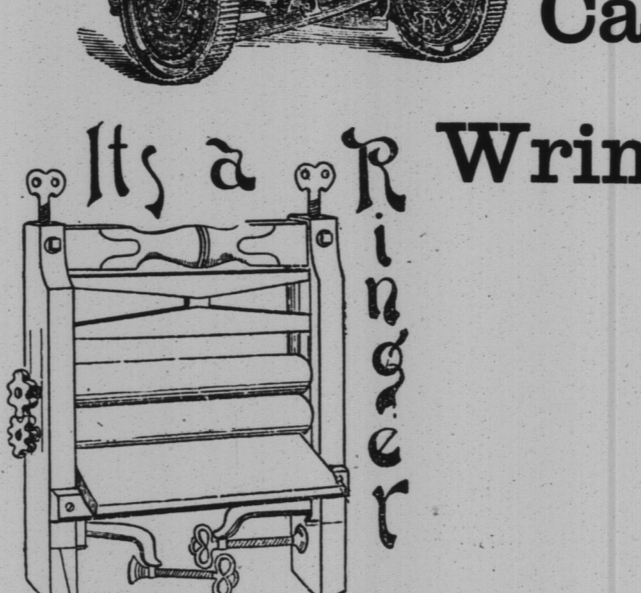
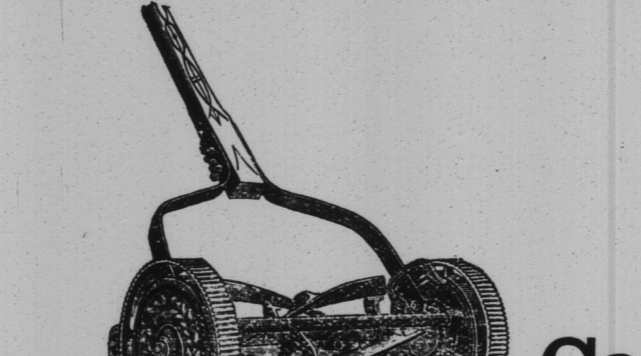
