TO BE OR NOT TO BE?

Will the Coronation Celebration be Held as Originally Decided Upon?

Citizens' Committee Divided on the Subject.

LAST NIGHT'S MEETING WAS SLIMLY ATTENDED.

The citizens' committee on the coronation celebration met last night at the residence of Mr. Barker. The meeting was attended by a few members of the committee and a number of citizens. The subject of the coronation celebration was discussed at length, and it was decided to hold the celebration as originally planned, unless a majority of the committee should decide otherwise.

Mr. Barker presided at a meeting of the coronation celebration committee at the city council chamber last evening. There was a fairly good attendance and plenty of speech making. The meeting adjourned until Monday afternoon without accomplishing very much. The list of gentlemen present included C. A. Simons, Col. Wadmore, Ald. Stockford, Ald. Farrell, Capt. H. F. McLeod, W. S. Hooper, Ald. Ross, Ald. Moore, H. C. Reiter, A. D. Thomas, James Roberts, E. S. Barker, George Y. Dibble, Ald. Van Wart, D. E. Crowe, A. W. Edgecombe and representatives of the local press.

The Mayor explained that Saturday, August 2nd, had been proclaimed a public holiday by the Dominion Government, and that pursuant to instructions from the committee he had called the meeting to take steps towards arranging a local celebration. He would like to have an expression of opinion on the subject from those present.

Mr. Dibble said that it seemed to him that under the circumstances it was going to be a hard matter to get up a celebration. It was quite evident from the size of the meeting that the enthusiasm had in a great measure died out. He thought it would be next to impossible to get the merchants to close their stores on Saturday at this season of the year, and that being so, it might be well to limit the celebration to a display of fireworks and a torchlight procession in the evening.

Mr. Sampson thought it advisable before taking action to have reports from the several committees as to how far their arrangements were advanced. In conjunction with Messrs. A. D. Thomas and Sheriff Sterling he had arranged to have a parade of school children for June 26th. It would have been much easier to have assembled the children on that occasion than it would now, as the holidays were on and many of the children were out of the city. If the celebration was held he thought it important that the children should take some part in it.

Ald. Stockford said if a celebration was held he would like to do all he could to make it a success. He did not think there was the same enthusiasm among the people as there was prior to June 26th. Saturday was not a good day for a celebration, as it would be hard to get the merchants to close their places of business. He thought it would be almost cruel to ask them to do so. If the stores and factories did not close the torchlight procession would have to be abandoned.
