A small-pox is prevalent at
ombay and Madras.
Probably the Austrians will not attempt
to occupy Mitrovitz and Nova Bazar this
year.
Herr Forckenbeck has been elected
President of the German Parliament.
All the soldiers on furlough at Athens
are ordered to join their regiments immediately.
The receipts of the Paris Exposition for
entrance to the 4th of Sept. amounted to
7,412,219 francs.
At the Doncaster September races the
St. Legers stakes were won by Lord Fal-
month's bay filly Janette.
To lessen the accumulation of stock the
cotton spinners of Northern France have
resolved not to work by daylight.
It is stated that Kusan has promised to
continue her substitutes to Servia.
The Austrians entered Trebinge on
Saturday. No opposition. The Turkish
troops surrendered the citadel and quitted
the town the same evening.
A Berlin despatch says that the Libera-
ls are not much pleased with the Speech
from the Throne, which they regard as
partly an indictment against them-
selves.
A grand fete was held at Boulogne-
sur-Mer, in honor of the passage of the
law at the last Session of Chambers, ap-
propriating 17,000,000 francs for the con-
struction of a deep sea harbor at that
place.
Over 600 bodies have been recovered
of persons drowned by the disaster to the
steamer Princess Alice. The majority
have been recognized; 83 bodies, not
identified, were buried at Woolwich on
Monday.
Schooner Adria, of Amherst, N. S.,
from St. John for Queenstown, deal laden
sunk on Gannet Rock on Friday night
during a thick fog. Her bottom was
smashed and it is probable she will be a
total loss.
A frightful collision explosion occurred
on Wednesday at Alwanee, near New-
port in Monmouthshire. There were 271
men in the pit, 60 of whom were rescued.
It is feared that no others will survive as
the pit was on fire.
The ravages of yellow fever continue
without abatement. At Memphis, the
deaths yesterday reached 100, and 400
new cases have been discovered by the
physicians of the Howard Association. 95
more were reported from other sources.
The elections to the Provincial Councils of
Spain indicate a large Government major-
ity. It is announced that a conspiracy
was discovered in Seville to establish
a federal republic. Several arrests were
made and some important papers seized.
The East Indian budget shows a deficit
of 10,000,000 rupees, whereas 9,000,000
was expended in 1890. The
budget estimates the coffee crops at 83,
000,000 piculs, and the anabale price at
48 cents (Dutch) per half kilogramme.
The fever has broken out at Senetolia,
Miss. Over thirty cases are reported
there and the alarm is very great. The
citizens are preparing to abandon the city.
Senetolia and Calhoun, Miss. have been
raised of Granada. Two deaths and eight
new cases are reported.
A letter from Disco, Davis Strait, 12th
of July, says that not one vessel of the
Arctic Whaling Fleet caught a single
fish. It was expected that the season
would prove a complete failure. No
vessel has been able to pass through Mel-
ville Bay, which is unprecedented.
A Constantinople despatch says Mecha-
met Ali Pasha, who was sent to pacify the
Albanians, has been killed at Yacora, 67 miles
northwest of Scutari, that from that place
took refuge in a shed, but was pursued
by the Albanians and he and 30
members of his suite were massacred.
The Turkish troops continue to arrive
from Salonica, at Mitrovitz and Nova
Bazar. It is estimated that 10,000 regular
troops and 10,000 irregulars are encamped
at those places. The insurgents in the
North-east of Bosnia are estimated at
50,000, including 15,000 Bedvis and
Nizams.
The German Government recently sent
a circular to the signatories of the treaty
of Berlin asking them to take common
steps with a view of bringing the Powers to
execute the stipulations of the treaty.
Austria, France and Russia replied af-
firmatively. Italy and England will
doubtless reply affirmatively soon.
Ten more men were taken out alive at
Abyrome, but they were much injured.
The dead body of a boy has also been re-
covered. The fate of the remainder may
be judged from the fact that the explorers
found fourteen horses dead only a few
miles from the foot of the shaft. The air
in the mine was found to be very im-
pure.
In his speech from the throne read at
the opening of the Reichstag on Monday,
the Emperor expressed the hope that the
anti-Socialist bill will be adopted, the
spread of the pernicious socialist move-
ment arrested, and those who have been
incited by it may be brought back to the
right path. There is no reference to for-
eign affairs.
Advices from Belgrade state that the
insurgents have fortified the banks of the
river Sava, and will not open the Austrian
steamers even when conveyed by gun-
boats. The town of Beas is now almost
entirely entrenched, to complete which armed
insurgents from the surrounding districts
are constantly marching and have re-
solved on desperate resistance.
The London Times states that there is
not a single encouraging feature in the
cotton trade of North Lancashire. The
condition of the markets is worse than
ever, and the outlook is most gloomy.
Goods are not only being piled up in Man-
chester warehouses, but are fast accumu-
lating in the mill warehouses. Small
manufacturers are obliged to sell at almost
any sacrifice, and before the crisis is past
there is no doubt many will succumb.

Public News.
A small-pox is prevalent at
ombay and Madras.
Probably the Austrians will not attempt
to occupy Mitrovitz and Nova Bazar this
year.
Herr Forckenbeck has been elected
President of the German Parliament.
All the soldiers on furlough at Athens
are ordered to join their regiments immediately.
The receipts of the Paris Exposition for
entrance to the 4th of Sept. amounted to
7,412,219 francs.
At the Doncaster September races the
St. Legers stakes were won by Lord Fal-
month's bay filly Janette.
To lessen the accumulation of stock the
cotton spinners of Northern France have
resolved not to work by daylight.
It is stated that Kusan has promised to
continue her substitutes to Servia.
The Austrians entered Trebinge on
Saturday. No opposition. The Turkish
troops surrendered the citadel and quitted
the town the same evening.
A Berlin despatch says that the Libera-
ls are not much pleased with the Speech
from the Throne, which they regard as
partly an indictment against them-
selves.
A grand fete was held at Boulogne-
sur-Mer, in honor of the passage of the
law at the last Session of Chambers, ap-
propriating 17,000,000 francs for the con-
struction of a deep sea harbor at that
place.
Over 600 bodies have been recovered
of persons drowned by the disaster to the
steamer Princess Alice. The majority
have been recognized; 83 bodies, not
identified, were buried at Woolwich on
Monday.
Schooner Adria, of Amherst, N. S.,
from St. John for Queenstown, deal laden
sunk on Gannet Rock on Friday night
during a thick fog. Her bottom was
smashed and it is probable she will be a
total loss.
A frightful collision explosion occurred
on Wednesday at Alwanee, near New-
port in Monmouthshire. There were 271
men in the pit, 60 of whom were rescued.
It is feared that no others will survive as
the pit was on fire.
The ravages of yellow fever continue
without abatement. At Memphis, the
deaths yesterday reached 100, and 400
new cases have been discovered by the
physicians of the Howard Association. 95
more were reported from other sources.
The elections to the Provincial Councils of
Spain indicate a large Government major-
ity. It is announced that a conspiracy
was discovered in Seville to establish
a federal republic. Several arrests were
made and some important papers seized.
The East Indian budget shows a deficit
of 10,000,000 rupees, whereas 9,000,000
was expended in 1890. The
budget estimates the coffee crops at 83,
000,000 piculs, and the anabale price at
48 cents (Dutch) per half kilogramme.
The fever has broken out at Senetolia,
Miss. Over thirty cases are reported
there and the alarm is very great. The
citizens are preparing to abandon the city.
Senetolia and Calhoun, Miss. have been
raised of Granada. Two deaths and eight
new cases are reported.
A letter from Disco, Davis Strait, 12th
of July, says that not one vessel of the
Arctic Whaling Fleet caught a single
fish. It was expected that the season
would prove a complete failure. No
vessel has been able to pass through Mel-
ville Bay, which is unprecedented.
A Constantinople despatch says Mecha-
met Ali Pasha, who was sent to pacify the
Albanians, has been killed at Yacora, 67 miles
northwest of Scutari, that from that place
took refuge in a shed, but was pursued
by the Albanians and he and 30
members of his suite were massacred.
The Turkish troops continue to arrive
from Salonica, at Mitrovitz and Nova
Bazar. It is estimated that 10,000 regular
troops and 10,000 irregulars are encamped
at those places. The insurgents in the
North-east of Bosnia are estimated at
50,000, including 15,000 Bedvis and
Nizams.
The German Government recently sent
a circular to the signatories of the treaty
of Berlin asking them to take common
steps with a view of bringing the Powers to
execute the stipulations of the treaty.
Austria, France and Russia replied af-
firmatively. Italy and England will
doubtless reply affirmatively soon.
Ten more men were taken out alive at
Abyrome, but they were much injured.
The dead body of a boy has also been re-
covered. The fate of the remainder may
be judged from the fact that the explorers
found fourteen horses dead only a few
miles from the foot of the shaft. The air
in the mine was found to be very im-
pure.
In his speech from the throne read at
the opening of the Reichstag on Monday,
the Emperor expressed the hope that the
anti-Socialist bill will be adopted, the
spread of the pernicious socialist move-
ment arrested, and those who have been
incited by it may be brought back to the
right path. There is no reference to for-
eign affairs.
Advices from Belgrade state that the
insurgents have fortified the banks of the
river Sava, and will not open the Austrian
steamers even when conveyed by gun-
boats. The town of Beas is now almost
entirely entrenched, to complete which armed
insurgents from the surrounding districts
are constantly marching and have re-
solved on desperate resistance.
The London Times states that there is
not a single encouraging feature in the
cotton trade of North Lancashire. The
condition of the markets is worse than
ever, and the outlook is most gloomy.
Goods are not only being piled up in Man-
chester warehouses, but are fast accumu-
lating in the mill warehouses. Small
manufacturers are obliged to sell at almost
any sacrifice, and before the crisis is past
there is no doubt many will succumb.
