NEWS OF THE WEEK.

LOCAL NEWS.

The ENGLISH OPERA COMPANY now performing at the Institute are to give performances in Fredericton, May 5th and 6th.

DRAMATIC.—St. Dunstan's T. A. Society Dramatic Club, will produce 'Fruits of the Wine Cup' on Monday evening next.

INTER-OCEANIC.—On Monday next the Summer arrangement of trains on the I. C. R. comes into effect.

CARELESS BLASTING.—An expensive pane of glass was broken by a blast in the Bank of New Brunswick lot, Wednesday.

VARIETY SHOW.—A Grand Variety and Athletic Festival will take place in Dack-rill's Hall, No. 293 Union street, on Tuesday evening next.

SEVERAL DEATHS.—Mr. Geo. A. Wood, who at one time represented Prince Ward, as Councillor died suddenly on Wednesday evening.

The IRISH FRIENDLY SOCIETY turned out in large numbers on Tuesday afternoon to attend the funeral of their late brother member, Mr. Wm. S. Martin.

Mr. Z. RING long and favorable known in business circles in this city, died at Liverpool, England whither he had gone to recruit his health, on Tuesday.

ATTEMPTED ROBBERY.—A young man named Murphy, tried to rob Cornelius Harrihan who keeps an applestand, on money on Water street, Wednesday afternoon.

BODY FOUND.—The dead body of an infant enclosed in a bag, was found off the railway wharf foot of Clarence street, Monday afternoon and brought to the Dead House.

OVERBOARD.—At a late hour on Wednesday night, John McKenzie fell off the Point Wharf into the water, when he remained some time but was eventually rescued.

SALE OF SHANTIES.—At the auction sale of shanties on King and Charlotte streets, Monday, five were purchased by John Rutledge for \$18 each. P. Nasc and Son paid \$13.50 each for four, and E. H. Lester secured one for \$7.

REU.—A drunken squaw made things lively around the Marsh Bridge on Wednesday evening. She was taken in charge by Policeman Stevenson and a resident, and marched off to Ward 1 lock-up, followed by a gang of youths of both sexes who acted as if the occurrence was unusual to that section.

PORTLAND TOWN COUNCIL.—At a special meeting of Portland Town Council, held on Wednesday evening, the Town officers committee submitted a report recommending street appropriation for the ensuing year as follows:—Ward 1, \$1,275; Ward 2, \$1,075; Ward 3, \$1,275; Ward 4, \$1,375; Ward 5, \$975. A motion to enlarge the street committee by adding the third member from each ward was voted down.

FIRE.—A fire at Calais, Me., early on Monday morning, destroyed \$30,000 worth of property. Mr. Sterling's house on White street, was damaged by fire on Monday morning. The basement of a house on Brussels street owned by Mr. Yeoman, was damaged by fire on Thursday morning.

ON Saturday night a house belonging to Edward Wood, Spring Hill, York Co., was destroyed by fire. Uninsured home burners rubbish was found piled up against Dr. Holden's residence Wellington Row on Wednesday. It is believed that some one was endeavouring to start a fire.

MURDER.—At Manner Sutton, York Co., Wm. Nicholas Glavin was lately bitten on the thigh by a bear pig, and died on Monday morning. A little girl, living at Union Mills, St. Stephen, was instantly killed by falling on a pair of scissors stuck in the floor, and which pierced to her heart. A lad named Marshall fell off a Charlotte street extension on Tuesday and was seriously injured. Samuel McCready, foreman of the Police office, while moving a press on Thursday morning had his hand injured by the press and wall. James Barry, acting as brakeman on a special freight train between Anson and Sussex, while ascending the latter place replacing a switch, Monday morning, got his foot caught in a frog and a car passed over it crushing it badly. Thos. Mullin, while working at Mr. Mackey's house, Leinster street, inflicted a severe wound on his wrist with a chisel on Wednesday. A little son of Mr. Roger Hunter, while sitting on a swing bench on the newly a board falling from a scaffold, and was severely injured. A lot named Perry, while working around the staging of the new ship in Lynch's Bay, Portland, fell to the ground and had his head and breast injured. A Mr. Knollin of Mountain Hill down stairs in a Brunswick street house, Thursday afternoon and broke his leg. Mr. Jos. Reed had one of his fingers nearly cut off on Thursday while cutting kindling wood. Rose Broad fell on Waterbury street, Monday and broke her leg. Next to the Hospital.

MEMORIAL.—An outgoing occurrence, if the facts are as alleged, took place in this city, on Wednesday evening last, at about 9:30 o'clock. A daughter of Mr. S. Piercy, owner of No. 2 the engine, accompanied by her sister, a young girl of about thirteen years of age, was proceeding to their home near the corner of Pitt and E. among streets, and as they were on the point of entering the gate leading to the house, which stands on the rear of the lot, they were approached by a man who jumped out of a carriage which was brought to stand at the curb-stone opposite the gate. The young woman was seized and held, her assistant endeavouring to carry her to the carriage, but this her resistance and the facts of her sister's presence for a time. He struck the girl across the face, knocking her down, and effrantly stopping her efforts to aid her sister. Immediately upon seeing the latter, the abductor rushed off, and a young man, who up to this time had remained in the carriage, went to her assistance. The two men carried the woman to the carriage, into which they forced her, and then the party drove off, since which time nothing has been seen of her. In the struggle, the young woman's dress was badly torn, and an umbrella that she carried was smashed. She is about nineteen years of age. The principal in this affair was recognized by the young girl, as a man named Tom Scott, who runs a bar-room on Union street. The horse was of a grey colour, and some of the residents in the neighbourhood for several evenings previous to the night of the occurrence. Scott is a married man. A warrant was made out for his arrest yesterday.—Freeman.

Scott has since been arrested and put in goal. Yesterday morning he was remanded until Monday afternoon, at 2 o'clock. A little girl went to the Station yesterday and gave information that a girl named Alice Piercy was locked up in a house on Adelaide Road, Portland, and wanted her parents to come and get her as she was starving. Police-man Alexander was sent to the house indicated by the girl, but before he arrived there Scott's brother had come with a carriage and taken Miss Piercy away, stating that he was going to bring her home. Up to a late hour on the afternoon she had not arrived there. Edward McNell, Scott's accomplice is still at large. From information received from parties who well acquainted with Scott and the girl Piercy, it appears the pair last summer were together in different parts of the States, and that an intimacy existed between them. It is said that this intimacy caused his wife to separate from him, and that it is not improbable that the girl will come forward and deny that she was taken away of her own free will.
