LOCAL NEWS

DROWNED.—A lad named Thos. Williams, was drowned while bathing in the Stewiacke river, on Friday last week.

CORRIGERS CONDUCT OF A LAD.—We take the following description of the heroic action of a boy from the St. Croix Courier. We agree with our contemporary that "such courageous conduct on the part of a lad so young as Campbell is deserving of something more than newspaper notices" and hope to hear at an early day of some steps being taken to reward him as he deserves.

ON Friday evening last, a small boy named James Barry, fell over Whitlock's Wharf, St. Andrews, into the water which was at the time ten feet deep. A boy aged fifteen years, named Wm. Campbell, threw off his coat and one boot and jumped overboard, and diving down seized young Barry, who was lying on the bottom face downward, and brought him to the surface. Some person threw a fishing pole to Campbell, it struck

him on the cheekbone and partially stung him when he caught Barry again, but struggling once more to the surface, of the water he reached a boat which had been hauled and came to the rescue, picking both lad up.

He left them about midnight, it being their custom to go to other parties went off in the direction of the Seaboard bridge. There is little doubt that a man has been found who makes some statement similar to this, but as he is said to be from Prince Edward Island, where some absurd stories respecting the murder originated, much confidence may be put in it by the Crown. If the counsel for the prisoners produce the man it will lead to additional interest to the trial.

A DESTITUTE LEAF.—OJ Wellesley evening a middle aged woman named Ellen Shea, a widow, came to this city from Sussex, N. B., in search of employment. On the train she fell in with a gentleman living on Russell Street, who after examining her credentials, and the hope of recommendation which she had offered her employment in his family. She accepted his offer, and went to the house, where she remained yesterday. Nothing peculiar was noticed about her until twelve o'clock last night, when she astonished the household by declaring that two men, residents of Sussex, were in the house, and had designs on her. All efforts to calm her fears were in vain, and it is probable that she was in the house, she jumped from the window, a distance of some thirty feet to the ground, where she lay when found in an almost unconscious condition. The police of the house immediately sent for the police; messengers were then taken to restore her to consciousness, and she did not appear to be much hurt, although complaining of her back. She persisted in saying that her enemies were in the house, and it was deemed advisable to take her to the Police Station, whither she was brought by Policemen Francis and Condon. The woman appears rather excited, but sticks to it that the men were in the house, which, of course, they were not. The City Medical Officer has been summoned to look after her. —Halifax Paper.

A CITY MARSHAL ASSAULTED BY HENRY P. BOWIE.—The Globe of last evening contains the following particulars of an assault made on Constable Hancock by Contractor Bowie.
