He died shortly after at the infirmary.

Baltimore was the scene of a most au-  
gust demonstration on Sunday, the  
3rd instant. About three thousand per-  
sons from the town and the surrounding  
districts of Rossmore and Galley, headed  
by the local Catholic clergy, and acting  
under the auspices of the local Tenants,  
Defence Association, met to declare, and  
did most emphatically declare, in favor of  
the popular demand for a reform of the  
act and laws, and for "the policy of action"  
initiated by Mr. Parnell and the advanced  
section of the Home Rule party.

John Curran, alias Robert, is thought to  
be the checkiest thief living. He is  
now under arrest in New York for steal-  
ing diamonds and a case of razors.  
Robber has the reputation of being the  
most dexterous jewelry thief in the  
country. He peddles counterfeits and  
presence of mind upon all occasions is re-  
markable. He has walked out of court  
and escaped during trials for robbery in  
Philadelphia and San Francisco, and in a  
recent Chicago case took French leave of  
the jail consulting-room in the guise of a  
lawyer.

A writer in the Leeds Mercury, de-  
scribing the Manchester Saturday half-  
holiday, one of the established observances  
of Cotonopolis:—"When one o'clock  
strikes, pens are taken behind ears, yard-  
measures thrown aside, and customers  
left unattended. The half-holiday sys-  
tem, first brought into an institution  
there, flourishes in all its pristine vigour,  
and it may be doubted whether the biggest  
foreign buyer presenting himself at the  
doors of a warehouse after the above  
hour on the last day of the week, even in  
these days of keen competition, will  
find anybody to wait upon him. All  
warehouses are deserted and locked up."

A London thief arrested for stealing  
birds proved a satisfactory alibi by showing  
that he was serving a sent once in jail  
for another offence at the time. The  
Court refused him compensation for the 2  
days during which he was locked up wait-  
ing trial. On the 22nd day a boatman  
asked for his expenses for loss of time.  
The magistrate said: there was no fund  
available, when the waterman observed  
that if she had been dropped he would  
have received 5s. 6d. for finding the body.  
The Justice said if she was worth 5s. 6d.  
dead she was worth a good deal more  
alive, and ordered his expenses to be  
paid out of the poor-box.

**WILL OF THE LATE EARL OF LEITRIM.**  
The will of the late Earl of Leitrim has  
been lodged in the Probate Court by the  
executors. The assets of his lordship are  
sworn to be under £200,000. The de-  
ceased left all his real and personal estate  
to Colonel Clements for life, with remainder  
to his issue. And in the event of  
Colonel Clements falling issue the property  
should go to Mr. John Madden, of  
Hilltown, Clons, who is married to the  
niece, and his children in succession. The  
bequests in the will were only a few,  
amounting to about £5,000. The present  
Earl of Leitrim, who was not left any-  
thing, had entered a caveat against the will  
being proved.—*Irish Times.*

No more wonderful instances of self-  
sacrifice is anywhere recorded than that of  
a French priest at present living on a  
desert island in the South Sea, and devoting  
himself to the spiritual care of the most

loathsome, repulsive, and dangerous ob-  
jects of affliction and suffering humanity.  
Where in the whole history of philanthropy  
can be found a more striking example  
of the noble, the devoted and chivalrous  
than that of this brave and generous  
priest, who thus separates himself from  
the world, and devotes his life to the  
relief of the most miserable of his kind,  
and buries himself, as it were, in a living  
tomb, under the circumstances and sur-  
roundings from which ordinary humanity  
shrinks with loathing and abhorrence.

His Lordship Bishop Duhameau writes  
from Paris giving interesting particulars  
of his travels in the old country. One  
of his first visits while in Ireland was to  
the grave of the late Apostolic Delegate,  
in the cemetery attached to the Convent  
of Mercy, opposite the Cathedral, Lecor-  
ford. Here he was received by Father  
Maddy, who, it will be remembered, ac-  
companied Monsignor Conroy, as Sec-  
retary. Leaving Ireland he proceeded to  
Scotland, calling at Edinburgh and Glas-  
gow, and celebrated the feast of All  
Saints in the Cathedral of the former city  
with the venerable Bishop Ryan. From  
Paris his Lordship intends to make a  
pilgrimage to Lourdes, and the other re-  
markable shrines of France. It is great-  
ly to be regretted that he reports his health  
as excellent.

"A writer in the Boston Herald says:  
"There are upwards of 5000 Catholic  
Germans in Boston, but Father Neppes,  
S. J., pastor of their church on Shaw-  
mut Avenue, says there ought to be 8000,  
if those should be counted who for want of  
church accommodation and from other in-  
fluences, have neglected the practice of  
their religion. This is nearly one-half of  
all the Germans in Boston and vicinity.  
The Catholic Germans who attend their  
church here, as a class, notably steadfast  
and precise in all matters of religious  
duty. They are from all parts of the  
Fatherland, from the borders of Dan-  
mark to the newly-acquired province of  
Alsace, from Glimmerthal Point to the  
very seat of the Kaiser and Emperor.  
Wesphalia, which is wholly Catholic,  
and a large proportion; Bavaria, another  
Catholic centre, is well represented; and  
Galicia and Baden and all the Rhine  
provinces send their quota. Their residences  
in Boston and vicinity are also scattered,  
and it is an small testimony to their  
earnest faith that their congregation should  
gather from sections that are miles apart  
to maintain one of the finest churches and  
parochial schools in the city."
