NEWS OF THE WEEK.

LOCAL NEWS.

THE NORTHERN TRAIN ran off the track near Campbellton on Tuesday morning. A first class passenger car was overturned. One of the occupants had his arm badly injured.

MR. WM. RAINNE, the newly elected Councillor of Kings Ward, was sworn in at the meeting of the Common Council, held on Wednesday afternoon.

FOUND DEAD.—A man named John Henderson from Nova Scotia, was found dead on the road side at Waterford, Kings Co., on Tuesday. It is stated that he had lain there for several days from exhaustion and no attempt was made to attend to his wants.

DROPPED DEAD.—Mr. Robt. Boggs, of Lancaster, dropped dead in the Yorkshire tavern, at an early hour on Wednesday morning. He was attending a ball which was being held there. Heart disease is said to have been the cause of his death.

MR. McCARTHY.—The examination into the McCarthy case was concluded at Moncton on Tuesday. The accused was committed to Dorchester Jail to await trial at the Westmorland Circuit next July. The relatives of Mr. McCarthy are now perfecting plans to search for the body as soon as the ice breaks up in the river. An experienced sub-marine diver has offered to make a search, no pay if unsuccessful. A reward ought to be offered by the Government for the recovery of the body.
