JUDGE HAYWARD HAS EXPRESSED HIS SYMPATHY

Following are the texts of both speeches:

MR. JUSTICE HAYWARD

"I think it is eminently fitting and proper for me to point out to you that the Town of Edmundston, the County of Madawaska, the bar of this Province, the Parliament of Canada, and the public life of our common country, have suffered an irreparable loss in the sudden and lamented death of the late Max D. Cormier, M.A., C.R., M.P., on January 14th last; and without attempting to amplify or improve upon the full and excellent biography printed in 'Le Madawaska', to refer to certain salient features of his life and character, basing in premises upon a personal friendship and professional companionship of over 30 years.

His untiring industry. Born in the county of Westmorland, he learned in his acadian home the first mother tongue of Canada; after attaining the age of 16, by studious application he acquired the second; and he was eloquent in both. His first speech in the House of Commons, judged from the literary standpoint, measured up to the best traditions of Canadian parliamentary oratory.

His broad-minded tolerance. He held pronounced economic and political views - without economic or political prejudices. He upheld these views on the hustings and in the forum, strenuously and manfully, but without sacrificing the personal esteem of those who thought differently.

His public-spirited generosity. In the Town Council, the Union of Municipalities, on the House of Commons, his time and talents were devoted to the public welfare, and his purse was over open to the demands of those in need.

JOHN M. STEVENS, K. C.

"I wish on this occasion to express the deep sympathy of the Bar of this County over the recent loss of one of our distinguished members, and to extend that sympathy to his widow and orphans.

Mr. Stevens was a good citizen and a great fighter. He was Mayor of this Town for several years. He fought many a political battle in the provincial and federal field, meeting defeat after defeat but never discouraged, until finally he won the confidence of the people of the electoral district of Restigouche-Madawaska, and became and died a honoured representative in the House of Commons of Canada.

He was chosen on his first official visit to parliament to move the address to His Majesty, which in itself was a very high honor and which he performed in a very creditable manner. He died a comparatively young man with a bright future ahead of him, but the sojourn of time has out of his career in the midst of his usefulness, leaving a large circle of friends to mourn his departure to a far happier and more restful harbor.

N. B. GRAINS TO BE EXHIBITED AT REGINA

The World's Grain Exhibition to be held at Regina July 24th to August 5th - Different Varieties of New Brunswick Grains to be Exhibited There.

Frederick, N. B. - According to announcement made by the Hon. Lewis Smith, Minister of Agriculture a comprehensive exhibit of New Brunswick grains and grass seed have been entered in the competitive classes at the World's Grain Exhibition to be held in Regina during the coming summer.

Fifteen exhibits of grain and grass seed grown by various farmers in the Province have been shipped by the New Brunswick Department of Agriculture to Regina for competition in the World's Grain Exhibition which is to be held July 24th to August 5th next. The high quality of this material as exemplified by various characters is a tribute to the men who grew it and at the same time is evidence of the facts that good seed pays and that as good grain can be grown in this Province as elsewhere in Canada.

Three exhibits of wheat were included in this shipment, four exhibits of rough buckwheat, exhibits of Oat of the Alaska variety, hibits of large white beans, an exhibit of grass seed and one of early Corn, from the Experimental Station. This is not generally considered a corn district, but the sample indicates that good corn can be grown in the St. John river valley. The cooperation of the New Brunswick Department of Agriculture has been available to farmers who desired to participate in this show.

"WORST RIDE" OF LIFE, ESTABLISHED NEW SPEED RECORD



Sir Malcolm CAMPBELL, auto speed king, reviewing his giant racing car "Bluebird II", which he piloted at Dayton, Ohio, to a new world record: 272.108 miles per hour, Campbell was banking record of 284 miles an hour, established by himself last year. The "Bluebird II" is a weird appearance. The car weighs about four tons and has a Rolls Royce, Schneider Cup type of aeroplane engine with 12 cylinders with a maximum capacity of 2,600 horsepower. It is water-cooled and has four wheel brakes. Its drive is in the two rear wheels. The body is completely streamlined design with a huge directional fin protruding from the rear to hold it steady on the course. It is only one seat so narrow that Sir Malcolm can barely squeeze into it.
