During the past few days three tons

and a half of salmon have been shipped

from Port Mady river, N. B., to Boston.

The product of salmon on the river this

season will reach 60,000 pounds.

—They are still, according to reports

for fines and costs in Charlottetown for

violation of the Canada temperance act.

—The Bridgeville Press says that the

Niagara & Atlantic Railway company have

completed their financial arrangements in

London, and that work will be pushed

forward vigorously to completion. The

rails have been purchased and will be

laid forthwith.

—A. M. Maine, who was arrested last

week by the Bank of Nova Scotia at Am-

herst on a charge of embezzlement, was

brought up before the Superior Court for

preliminary examination on Monday last,

and no one appearing against him, he was

discharged. The amount short, some

—The country is looking beautiful,

and the fine weather has enabled farmers

to make great progress in their farm

—The government will increase the

—The first crushing of the newly-dis-

covered gold mines in Kemptville, N. S.,

gave a bar of gold weighing seventy

ounces from eight tons of quartz.

—Ottawa, June 12.—The House passed

through all its stages a resolution and bill

providing for the borrowing of the 30

million dollars, about which Sir Leonard

is now in London.

—Yarmouth, N. S., celebrated its 124th

anniversary on Tuesday.

—Three places in Yarmouth—the Custom

House, the Market and J. A. Leaman's

office—were entered on the night of the

third, by a gang of burglars in search

of booty. The second were unsuccessful.

—Mr. Henry Dryden, of Caledonia, Al-

berta, received word a few days ago

that his son Alfred had died on June 3rd,

from injuries received by being crushed

by a horse of his on the Penobscot River,

Maine. The young man left home on the

22nd of April. His age was 24, and he

was active and industrious.

—Wm. Wilson, barrister-at-law, will be

the Government candidate in York

County against J. D. Hazen, barrister-at-

law, for the vacancy in the local

parliament.

—The Sun says Mr. Geo. W. Burbridge,

Deputy Minister of Justice, will shortly

proceed to Regina to watch the trial of

the "Hill" case. "Hill" (George) is the

Ottawa correspondent of the Montreal

Gazette. "Hill" will be tried before the

Magistrate Richardson, of Regina, by a

jury of six, one-half French and one-half

English. The evidence will be conflicting.

It is doubtful whether any material

change will be made in the foreign policy

of the country. The negotiations with

Russia are so far along that they will

probably go on, although the Russian press

is apprehensive. Then there is a majority

of Liberals in the House of Commons

which will be a restraint upon the "blood

and gunpowder business" to which the

Tories are a little too inclined.
