News Summary.

DOMINION.

May 15th is to be observed by the schools of this city as Arbor day.

Montreal will hold an exhibition from the 17th to the 25th of September next.

Mr. T. W. Peters has been elected mayor of St. John by a majority of 1,356 over Mr. Lockhart.

The bill to abolish the Legislative Council of New Brunswick, as passed, provides for its continuance until 1894.

Mr. J. B. Snowball, of Chatham, has been appointed to the place in the Senate, rendered vacant by the death of Mr. Ferguson.

Martin P. Black, supposed to have been the wealthiest man in Halifax at the present time, died on Saturday last, aged 76. His estate is estimated at \$750,000.

There are suspicions of foul play in the case of the missing man, Mills, alias "murder," it is said, were held in the vicinity of Haymarket Square on the night of his disappearance.

James F. Boutiller and Richard Cleveland were drowned on Monday, April 13, at Sandy Beaches, Lunenburg Co., by the upsetting of their dory, while engaged in setting lobster traps.

A gentleman who has travelled extensively through Ontario, is authority for the statement that both fall wheat and clover have wintered well, and that the outlook for good crops is most hopeful.

Edward Corbett, who was brought to trial at Moncton for carrying dynamite on an I.C.N. passenger car, acknowledged the offence and was fined \$500 or thirty days in jail. He chose the latter.

A man named William Stewart was killed at Pugwash, on Tuesday last week. He was assisting to launch a large lighter which had been laid up for repairs, and, by the giving way of the blocks, he was caught and crushed to death some timbers.

Floods are occurring on the St. Lawrence. On Saturday the water was reported to be eight feet deep on the streets of the French settlements of Ste. Anne and Batiscan, and the inhabitants were being compelled to take refuge in the upper storeys of their houses.

A toy in Halifax named Fred, Riddell, accidentally shot and killed himself while playing with a revolver he had purchased the day before. What good use can boys, or men either, have for revolvers, and why should they be permitted to have them, should the sale of them be permitted?

What promises to be the most valuable gold mine ever discovered in Nova Scotia is that which is now being worked by D. C. Johns, of Halifax, and Mr. Sherman, of Boston, at Wallace River, Cumberland county. It says \$1,000 to the ton, and it is estimated that there are two millions tons in sight.—Sun.

There are in Nova Scotia, according to the report of the Indian department, 2,107 Indians. In Cape Breton, where the Indian reserves are more remote from the towns, and therefore from the red man's peculiar temptations, the Indians are more industrious and inclined to agriculture than they are in Nova Scotia.

The Nova Scotia Legislative Council has received three new members. Robert Drummond, of the *Trades' Journal*, George H. Murray, North Sydney, and Henry M. Kitchin, of Clare, Digby, have been appointed. Mr. Murray and C. F. McLaughlin, M. P., have been appointed members of the Executive Council, taking the places of Messrs. Fraser and McGillivray.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN.

Earl Kimberley has been chosen to succeed Earl Granville, as liberal leader in the House of Lords. He will be assisted by Earl Spencer and the Earl of Rosbery.

From Newfoundland it is reported that so far, reports indicate that 300,000 seals have been killed this year, and the chances now appear to be that the number will go up to 400,000. The catch is likely to be the largest for years.

Henry M. Stanley sailed for England on the 15th inst., taking with him, in compensation for his 100 lectures delivered in America, the sum of \$110,000. Major Pond, too, in the same direction Mr. Stanley has lectured, has not found the enterprise unprofitable. The gross receipts from the lectures are stated to have aggregated \$305,800.

A despatch from Oron says that an enormous reservoir of water, 120 feet below the surface, has been discovered at El Golea, a small caravan station in the midst of the Sahara desert. The reservoir was discovered while a number of workmen were engaged in sinking a well at El Golea. A shaft sunk already gave forth gallons of good clear water per minute, and it is expected that this amount can readily be increased. Should it be found that a large quantity is obtainable, the discovery is of the highest importance and will undoubtedly tend to develop the caravan trade of El Golea, which is one of the stopping places in the Sahara desert of the caravans which travel across that region. This is the first time that water has been found at so slight a depth in Sahara.
