

District Meeting for the Island of Cape Breton.

Thirty years ago last September, the Baptist pastors and missionaries then on the Island—five of whom have gone to their rest and reward—organized a quarterly meeting, holding their first meeting at North Sydney. For ten years these meetings were continued, but owing to removals the meetings were discontinued, until the year 1886 when they were revived, only to last one year. Although there are now but five pastors on the Island they think a revival of this means of grace will be a help to the cause. Accordingly there was a meeting called at Glace Bay for Nov. 6. The meeting was organized by the appointment of pastor M. P. Bowie (chairman of the district) as president and the undersigned secretary and treasurer. There was present but three of the five pastors; and pastor McPhie who was at the station to meet us full of hope regarding the meetings, took suddenly ill and was compelled to remain in his room to the great disappointment of all, as well as himself. But we are glad to say that he was better next morning. The delegates present were: Sydney, Rev. M. P. Bowie and Miss Dobson; North Sydney, Rev. D. G. MacDonald; M. W. Ross and Miss Clara Moffat; Mira Bay, Rev. A. McPhie and Philip Spencer; Homeville, William Holmes and Miss Isabel Holmes; Glace Bay, Joseph Martell and David Phillips; Mrs. J. B. Phillips; Fort Morison, Mrs. Spencer; Mrs. Davidson and Miss Davidson. The afternoon meeting opened with a short prayer meeting after which the delegates reported for their different churches, after which we had a general conference meeting in which quite a number took part; and the spirit of the Master seemed to be present with us. The meeting in the evening was largely attended, although there was a political meeting in the hall at the same hour. Bro. Bowie preached an excellent sermon, text John 1 and 46, after which Bro. MacDonald conducted a most spirited evangelistic service, at which much interest was manifested; many taking part in the service. Four rose for prayer and a collection of \$5.75 was taken for Convention Fund.

Lanenburg Co. District Meeting.

The regular Quarterly District Meeting of Lanenburg convened at Western Shore Nov. 5th, Pastors Shaw, Perry and Archibald being present. In the absence of the secretary J. W. Dimock acted in that capacity. Minutes of last meeting read and approved. Extracts of a letter received by the president from the secretary of the Home Mission Board, exhorting the churches to put forth efforts to raise the amount asked for this year for Convention Fund. Letter from the secretary of Foreign Mission Board to the president of District Meeting asking the churches to raise sums set opposite their names for Foreign Missions, read. The pastors spoke disapproving of charging old methods or of infringing on Convention Scheme in any way.

Pastor Archibald who had been assisting pastor Blakney at New Ross, reported from that field. Their united labors had been blessed in a revival of the church and in the saving of souls. Also reported that the Convention Scheme is being vigorously worked and that the amount assigned to them would not doubt be raised.

Resolved that churches without pastors be corresponded with, with a view to encourage them to take up their regular quarterly collection for the Convention Fund.

Resolved that if agreeable to pastor Porter the next District meeting be held either at Lapland or Lakeville. A social service was then held which nearly all present participated in.

In the evening pastor Shaw preached an earnest sermon on the "Second Coming of Christ," and the other pastors with the Christians present taking up the same theme it was felt that the Saviour was there in the hearts of his people and there was a good prospect that souls would be converted in the meetings that would follow during the remainder of the work. Pastor Archibald remained over to assist pastor Perry in special meetings.

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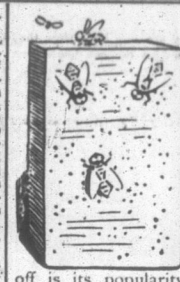
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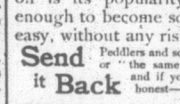
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
