Confidence in Europe, will not revive until after it is restored here, and the Bank of England will take no measures calculated to benefit our interests, and to advance the prices of our staple articles, so long as by a different course she can benefit her manufacturing interest, and ensure the return of the precious metals. Bills of Exchange will continue to be scarce—Credit will run—prices low—and specie will continue to flow on in a continuous stream—small by each package—but large in the aggregate—and present in as long as it will make a more favorable mode of remittance than produce or bills of exchange.
