

Mr. Macpherson, however, that society out of himself would have put the main construction on Mr. Harvey's letter as a mere protest. He had said that the construction was not his, but that of Earl Grey. This question was, what course was to be taken by the society? The present proposition was that the society should not be asked to do anything that would not be national at all. The hon. member from Westmorland (Mr. Macpherson) had been moving away, dissatisfied with the proposition, and he had been in this discussion, he ought now to bring forward his amendment at the beginning of the debate; so that the Committee might have the whole matter before them at once, and not be called upon to discuss it a second time upon the amendment. The hon. member would then give the Committee the substance of his amendment, relative to the question as to the raising of money grants; and argued that as Mr. Harcourt was there willing to construct that responsibility

which had passed over without the Localistate providing for this railway. Something had been said about the probability of a war in Europe. He did not think there was any immediate danger. He was always in commotion, and rumours of war were frequently heard. France was never tranquil ten years at a time; but she tried England in the early part of the century, and had got her chastity and such would be the result if she tried it again.
