WAS IT ANDRE?

CHICAGO, Sept. 3.-A despatch to the Tribune from Kankakee, Ill., says Walter Cobb and G. W. Shields, well-known men of Kankakee, who have just returned from a 45 days' trip to the Hudson Bay region, bring back a story told by Indians of the far north that may relate to the missing explorer Andre and one of his two companions.

At Moose Factory, a Hudson Bay Trading Post at the mouth of Moose River, the men stationed there reported that a party of Indians who came down from the north last spring told of the finding of the bodies of two white men at a point 300 miles north of Moose Factory.

The story of the Indians was that the bodies were found in a basket, and that the bodies had been buried by Indians. The Indians brought nothing in support of their story, but the men at Moose Factory, Cobb and Shields say, are inclined to believe the tale.
