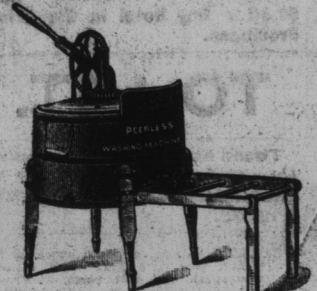

Gardner, a broker, and that she had been deserted by him soon after they registered at a hotel here, has been sent back to Montreal at the expense of the poor department.

SHOOTING AFFRAY.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 2.—Adolph Biets shot and killed a woman known as Rose Thomas or Rose Temple, in a Taylor street lodging house, shortly after 8 o'clock last night.

AN AMERICAN CONTRACT.

LONDON, March 2.—The war office has made a contract with an American merchant to supply 2,000 felling axes for the British troops in South Africa, English firms being unable to make sufficiently prompt delivery.

U. S. CONGRESS.

Talks About Supplying Intoxicants to Savages. WASHINGTON, March 2.—The house re-commenced at 9 o'clock this morning. The speaker recognized Mr. Sperry (con) to move the passage under suspension of the rules of the senate bill to prohibit the sale of firearms, opium, and intoxicating liquors in certain islands of the Pacific.

MUTINY QUELLED.

CHICAGO, March 2.—A special to the Tribune from El Paso, Texas, says: The mutiny among the recruits en route to the Philippines has been quelled. The volunteers left for San Antonio last evening, under guard of regulars from Fort San Houston.

A HORRIBLE TRAGEDY.

DEMINGTON, Iowa, March 2.—Henry Warn, a German farmer living six miles south of Demington, killed his son, William, cremated the body in the house, which he fired, set fire to his cattle sheds, corn crib, barn and every building on the place and then shut himself in the burning barn, where his headless and charred remains were found by searchers yesterday afternoon.

MRS. NATION'S MESSAGE.

TOPEKA, March 2.—Since Mrs. Carrie Nation's return from Peoria Thursday night, she has occupied her cell in the county jail here. Asked last night as to her future plans, Mrs. Nation said: "You just tell the people that Carrie Nation will attend to her knitting, the same as usual. I will go to smashing as soon as I am released. This is my mission in the world at present, and I am going to fulfill it to the best of my ability."

STOLEN CHECKS.

CHICAGO, March 2.—Checks to an estimated value of \$75,000 have been stolen from various livestock firms with offices in the exchange building at the stock yard. The thief's operations have covered the period of a week.

THE KING AND QUEEN.

LONDON, March 2.—It is asserted that King Edward and Queen Alexandra will go to Denmark about the middle of March and remain there a fortnight. That they will then visit the Duchess of Anhalt-Bernburg at Ballenstedt, and that afterward they will visit the Dowager Empress Frederick and the court of Hesse-Darmstadt, returning to England toward the end of April.

IRELAND.

NEW YORK, March 2.—The Earl of Cadogan has definitely decided to resign the lord-lieutenancy of Ireland, says a special cable to the Herald from London. The Duke of Marlborough is mentioned as his successor.

TRAINING SHIP AGROUND.

WASHINGTON, March 2.—The training ship Dixie, now on its way to Washington to participate in the naval display, ran aground off Maryland Point yesterday afternoon. At last reports she was still hard and fast.
