REDMOND AND KRUGER.

William Redmond has visited Paul
Kruger and conversed with him. The
old Boer hypocrite says he regards the
Irish as "brothers in oppression," re-
peats the stale falsehood about British
trickery and cruelty, and piously re-
affirms his faith that God will deliver
his people. Kruger says the Boers
never employed armed natives, but
natives with arms in their hands have
been found in the Boer ranks. Mr.
Kruger should be provided with a copy
of the Boer's letter which is printed in
another column of today's Star. The
writer of the letter is apparently as
pious, and a trifle more honest than
Oom Paul.

SOUTH AMERICAN AFFAIRS.

The despatches stated yesterday that
an active rebellion is in progress in
Colombia, and that a Colombian force
has also invaded Venezuelan territory.
There is also a boundary dispute be-
tween Colombia and Ecuador that is
not yet settled. The three South Amer-
ican republics above named are in
almost constant turmoil. In 1819 they
were one state, known as the Republic
of Colombia, founded by Simon Bol-
ivar, under whom they gained their in-
dependence from Spain. In 1830 the
republic was separated into the three
above named. Since then each one of
them has undergone many political
changes, being apparently unable to
complete a governmental system that
would suit the restless ambitions of
the people.

Colombia has an area of 430,000 to
500,000 square miles, and a population
of about 4,000,000, including 230,000 un-
civilized Indians. Venezuela has an
area of 523,347 square miles, and a popu-
lation of 1,237,527, including 225,000 In-
dians. The area of Ecuador is 129,000
square miles and the population 1,270,000,
of whom only 100,000 are whites.

President Castro of Venezuela issued
a statement on Saturday in which he
declared that the conservatives of Col-
ombia had resolved on a revolutionary
movement against Venezuela, and that
his government had massed 10,000
troops on the frontier. A despatch
from Caracas yesterday stated that
President Castro had sent arms, am-
munition and men to seize those Col-
ombians who are in revolt against the
Colombian government.

RE ADMITS WHOLESALE LOOTING AND DESTRUCTION OF PROPERTY.

Remarkable Letter Found After the
Dispersion of a Commando.

Among the number of letters and
papers picked up by our troops after
the dispersion of a Boer commando,
says the Cradock Letter, was the fol-
lowing (unpublished) letter of which
we give a translation, and the original
may be seen at this office.

VAN REBBEREN'S PAGE.

12th March, 1900.
To my beloved wife, Johanna Olliers.
My dear wife, I wish to let you all
know how we are this morning. We
all live and move by God's grace to
such unworthy sinners, for which we
ought to praise and thank Him. The
living God has wonderfully led and
guided us so far. When we look back
upon the way we have lived we can
then see how great the King is who
has protected us, and hides our heads
with shame. When we see how un-
believable our sins are, my dear wife, let us
throw ourselves at His feet, and ask
for forgiveness for the wrong we have
done in His eyes, and let us be up-
right and keep nothing back, but act
as the publican who confessed all, and
where we have done wrong, let us be
merciful to our hearts. Be merciful to
us, O God, and bring this bloody and
unholy war to a speedy end! Accept
our confession where we have sinned,
and we fear not, but our prayers will
be heard. My dear wife, I have no
doubt whatever, that God will hear
and bring us safe out of the hands of
our enemies, and give us the peace we
long for, because God listens to pray-
ers; my dear wife, let us in another
holy light of the fact that God is a
holy God, and those who look upon
Him must pray to Him in spirit and
in truth. Let us come before Him as
children, because out of the mouths of
babes come the truth. In another
place the Lord says, "Suffer the chil-
dren to come unto me and prevent
them not, because of such is the king-
dom of heaven."

My dear wife, I am afraid there is a
desire for loot which does not belong
to us, and plundering of beautiful
dwellings, and not alone these, but
splendid music which cost £70 to £80,
broken to pieces, and we regarded as
a civilized nation. This is also wrong
in the eyes of God, and what does
not belong to us. We read in God's
word how Agan also took what did
not belong to him, and the whole na-
tion suffered for it. I fear that we
shall also be punished for the wrong-
doing by some of us taking things not
belonging to us and destroying houses
and furniture. Where the Lord is, this
is forbidden. Is it not a great shame
that people should behave like Kaffirs?
I never imagined that we Afrikaan-
ders could be so shameless. Oh, my
dear wife, I can't think the Lord en-
dure where the Lord has kept my
hands off and I have not taken loot,
and then comes the thought in me that
it is not good, I am not entitled to it,
and therefore I can continually thank
the Lord for the mercy shown me.

Hallelujah, if you could see all that
happens here, then you would class
your hands and say, "Is our Afrikaan-
der race so? I never thought it." That
would be your answer. It is terrible
to see what they did to the splendid
dwellings. If you saw it you
would thank the Lord with me that I
am innocent. Oh, my dear wife, this
is a great mercy vouchsafed to us by the
Lord that we can see that this is
wronggoing to take things, and I think
it is because of this that the Lord has
punished us, where there is now such
a dark cloud before us which we can-
not see through, but the dark cloud
can also perhaps show that the Saviour
is close at hand. My dear wife, a tele-
gram has come to us today from
D. S. Marquand to all the ministers of
the state to make confession of our
sins, also that the Lord will return with
His friendly face to us, and give us
peace again in our land. And my
dear wife, if you could see all that
before the Lord, let us try at least to
throw all aside especially that sin of
our conduct.
