THE GLOBE TURNED DOWN. The valued Globe must have been somewhat astonished at the result of the deliberations of the Board of Trade yesterday. Our contemporary on Thursday discussed the proposal to limit the preferential tariff to goods reaching Canada by way of Canadian ports.
