FOR SOUTH AFRICA.

This city will have but a small representation in point of numbers in the contingent which will shortly leave for South Africa, but it is made up of young men who may be relied on to do credit to themselves and the province of New Brunswick.

The Star is of opinion that Canada should pay the cost of the contingent, but there appears to be an influence at work to prevent this patriotic contribution for the good of the empire.

A CLEAR STATEMENT.

The attitude of the British government with regard to South Africa was very well put in a recent speech by Austen Chamberlain, M. P., to his constituents.

The policy of the government was to see the war prosecuted with the utmost vigor, so that the sacrifices which the country had made in blood and treasure should result in a satisfactory peace in South Africa.

SOUTH AFRICA.

Lord Kitchener has sent his promised statement specifying 37 instances in which natives have been shot by the Boers. This statement was issued by the war office last night. In some cases an informal court martial was held, but in numerous instances the natives were shot in cold blood in order to hide traces of the Boers' movements.

DREAMED OF HER DEATH.

DIED ON MONDAY.

And Was Left Lying in His Bunk Till Thursday. (Chatham World.)

Chong Chow, a Chinese laundryman doing business here at the sign of Chong Lee, died on Monday, and nobody in town knew of it till Thursday, when a Chinese laundryman came down from Newcastle and made arrangements for disposing of the remains. The dead man had a partner, and this man had telegraphed the death to the Chinese headquaters in Halifax and kept it secret here. The dead man lay in his bunk, curled up, just as he had died, when the physicians were called in to see him. His companions, in reply to questions, said, "Chong eats big dinner, get sick and die." This was all the information to be obtained from him. The bones will, in due time, be shipped with those of others to China, and be laid to rest in the mother land. The Newcastle Chinaman said the remains were to be forwarded to Lee Wah, Westville, N. S., and gave H. Paragan \$20 to have them coffined and forwarded. Then he said he must attend to business, and he and the dead man's partner drove away to Newcastle, leaving poor Chong Chow alone with darkness and the rats in his bunk in the deserted laundry. The dead man was shipped to Westville to Lee Wah, who used to run a laundry here.
