GOVERNMENT RAILWAYS.

A correspondent asks for more definite information regarding the statement made by the Star yesterday that the result of public ownership and control of railways in various countries were such as to encourage Canada to build and operate for itself the transcontinental line demanded by growing transportation needs.

The state of Belgium, which was mentioned as one instance, owns 2,533 miles of the 2,846 miles of railway in that country. In 1900—no later date are at hand—the operation of these railways resulted in a profit of more than \$11,000,000 in spite of the fact that freight and passenger rates had been reduced over 40 per cent.

And these roads, being run in the interest of their owners, the whole people, are not run with the idea of making any profit. Traffic charges are placed at the lowest possible point, consistent with operating expenses.

And government railroads only are operated on this plan. No company goes into it to provide the best transportation at the lowest price.

A RACE FOR LIFE.

Kuropatkin and his battered army are fleeing with all speed toward the walled safety of Mukden. Close at his heels hangs the main body of the Japanese forces, worn with the work and strain of an awful battle but doggedly persistent.

That is the situation in Manchuria today and seldom has any race been run for such a prize. If the Japanese flanking column wins, it means capture or slaughter for the bulk of Kuropatkin's force.
