HERESY HUNTERS DISCOURAGED.

Broad Principals Govern the
General Assembly.

Motion to Have a Watch Kept Over
College Professors' Instruction
is Turned Down.

The Presbyterian, Methodist and
Baptist church pulpits in this city were
occupied by some of the ablest of the
Presbyterian division in Canada, who
were at present in the city in attendance
at the general assembly. Despite the
terrible downpour of rain, the congrega-
tions assembled in the different churches
were large.

The subjects handled by the vari-
ous preachers were as varied as they
were instructive and in all cases were
listened to with the greatest attention
and appreciation.

Those of the visitors who preached
were Prof. Falconer, of the Theologi-
cal College, Halifax; Rev. R. E.
Knowles, Rev. Clarence Mackinnon,
Rev. J. C. Herdman, Dr. Walker, Dr.
Scrimger, Rev. J. A. Macdonald, Dr.
Byrne, Principal Forest, Dr. E. D. Mc-
Laren, Dr. D. Strachan, Rev. J. A.
Simpson, Rev. Dr. Nicholson, of Queen's
College, and Rev. J. A. Sutherland.

The eighth session of the Presby-
terian General Assembly opened this
morning at 10 o'clock with the usual
devotional exercises, after which the
minutes of the last meeting were read
and adopted.

Dr. Armstrong presented the report
of Ottawa Ladies' College, which was
satisfactory in every sense of the word.
The attendance of pupils has been gra-
tifying, the total number being 122, the
average attendance 115. Of these 44 were
pupils in residence.

The teachers have worked hard and
the utmost harmony has reigned. The
board would gratefully acknowledge
the liberality of the general assembly
in according a grant of \$3,000 from
the Century Fund, whereby the finan-
cial position of the college has been
greatly strengthened. The estimated
revenue for the year 1903-1904 is \$14,
250, and the estimated expenditure
\$14,000. This expenditure includes
\$1,150 spent in repairs and furnish-
ings, which have added greatly to the
appearance and comfort of the resi-
dence. The board is desirous of estab-
lishing a number of endowed schol-
arships entitling the holders to the gen-
eral tuition. The amount required to
endow such a scholarship is \$1,000. The
donor of a scholarship may have the
privilege of stipulating conditions un-
der which it shall be assigned.

At the close of the present session,
Mrs. Ross, who for the past five years
has rendered valuable service to the
college, retires from the principalship.
Mrs. J. Grant Newman has been named
as her successor.

The adoption of the report was moved
by Rev. Dr. Fletcher, seconded by
Prof. Boyce, and the motion carried.
The next item of business was an
overture from the committee on col-
leges. He thought that those who
are to go out from the colleges to the
pulpits should be taught the doctrines,
which they as a church believed. When
a person at the present time charged
another with heresy, he was at once
called a heresy-hunter, but nevertheless
there was great danger that too much
liberty was being given in regard to
doctrinal subjects. He believed that
the board should move that the prin-
ciple of the overture be adopted and that a
committee be appointed to define the
duties of the committee on colleges. The
motion was seconded by Rev. J. W.
Clamer.

Principal Forest thought more in-
formation should be received before
even the principle of the overture
was adopted. He believed that
the harm that good would be done
by appointing a committee to inquire
into and report on the subject. When
different professors in a college. More
ought to be known by the assembly
before the overture was adopted.

Mr. Turnbull objected to some state-
ments of Principal Forest. He be-
lieved a professor in a college should
teach the doctrines most heterodox and
it would hardly be convenient to carry
the matter to the assembly. It
should be taken to the General Assem-
bly.

The motion was lost.

The assembly proceeded to resume
consideration of the amalgamation of
the aged and infirm ministers' fund,
eastern and western sections.

J. K. Macdonald, of Toronto, on be-
half of the committee reported that
two meetings had been held. Dates
showed that the number of ministers
in active service was 92 in the western
section; 241 in the eastern section.

The average age of ministers in the
west was 46; in the east 48.

The average length of service in the
west was 20 years; in the east 18 years.

The probability of attaining the
age of 75, in the west, 49.53; in the
east, 49.86.

In regard to the slight difference in
the average age it was decided to ig-
nore it and deal with the matter of
equal average age, and also to accept
the capital of the eastern section as
it now stands, namely, \$55,000; also to
recommend that the two committees
and funds be amalgamated and that
the funds, capital and ordinary, be trans-
ferred to Dr. Woodman, agent of the
church; also that in the eastern section
annuities be paid up to the 30th of
June instant and that the transfer of
the funds be made on July 1st, of the
present year. The age limit was not
extended beyond fifty-five years.

In respect to rule nine, it was decided
by the committee to amend it so as to
read: "Four years—following ordina-
tion or induction—shall be allowed
within which connection may be made
and failure to do so will forfeit right
to connection"; also that the number
of members on the standing committee
be limited to twenty-one.

ANOTHER RUSSIAN SHIP SUNK BY TORPEDO BOAT

Gunboat Blown Up at Port Arthur— Jap Merchant Vessel Sunk— Sharp Fighting in Korea.

TOKYO, June 6.—11 a. m.—The de-
stroyer flotilla engaged in watching
Port Arthur from the east ward re-
ports that at 7.40 p. m. on June 4, a
Russian gunboat of the Giliak type
was caused by a Japanese torpedo.
Chentao Shan. The vessel, with an-
other gunboat and other steamers were
evidently engaged in clearing the vic-
inity of mines. When the explosion
occurred the others hurried back to
Port Arthur. Vice-Admiral Togo ex-
presses the opinion that the explosion
was caused by a Japanese torpedo.
The name of the gunboat sunk is un-
known by the Japanese, but it had
been seen on several occasions acting
as guardship at the mouth of the har-
bor.

JAP MERCHANTMAN BLOWN UP.

NATIVES ATTACK RUSSIANS.

SEOUL, June 5.—Reports from Gen-
sen say during a skirmish which took
place on the third instant, thirty Jap-
anese soldiers and one lieutenant were
killed and three men were severely
wounded. The Russians in retreating
burned a number of Korean villages.
The natives, seizing old flintlocks and
weapons of all sorts, attacked the Cos-
sacks, killing two and wounding sev-
eral. There are about 2,000 Japanese
troops now at Gensan. The merchants
there have not left.

A JAP DEFIBANCE.

PORT ARTHUR, June 5.—Among
the documents found on the steamer
Yaddo, one of the vessels sunk at the
mouth of the harbor was the following
defiance which was discovered fasten-
ed to the rail of the bridge:

"Remember my dear Russian sailors,
my name is Lieut. Commander Keris.
This is my second visit. My first was
on the Kasuke. I will come again."
This threat was not carried out, how-
ever, as Keris was found among the
dead.

MARK TWAIN'S WIFE DEAD.

FLORENCE, Italy, June 6.—Mrs.
Samuel Clemens, the wife of Mark
Twain, the American author and lec-
turer, died of sinople here yesterday
evening. Half an hour before her death
she had conversed cheerfully with her
husband. The body will be sent to the
United States for interment.

Mrs. Clemens was married in 1870.
Her maiden name was Mary L. Lang-
don. She was born in Elmira, N. Y.
Mr. and Mrs. Clemens arrived in Flo-
rence November 8 last, and a month
later it was announced that Mrs. Cle-
mens had been so indisposed since her
arrival that no one outside her family
had been allowed to see her, but in the
latter part of January it was said that
a notable improvement had taken place
in her health.

DYNAMITE BOMB KILLS 16 MINERS

Awful Outcome of the Colo-
rado Strike.

Bomb was Laid Under Station Plat-
form and Arranged to Explode
When Train Arrived

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., June 6.
An explosion at the Independence
station of the Florence and Cripple
Creek road, in the Cripple Creek dis-
trict, killed 16 miners and injured nine
others fatally, according to the best
information obtainable at this time.

The explosion was caused by dynamite,
which had been laid under the cen-
tre of the depot platform and which
was set off by the incoming train.

Officials of the company and special
detectives are now working on the
case. The militia has been ordered
out and trouble is expected. The
miners killed were all employed on the
Friday property and had just come
off shift. They were waiting to take
the train home. It was their custom-
ary hour for departure and it is the
theory of the officials that a plot was
laid by some one to catch them. A
special train was sent from Cripple
Creek as soon as the explosion was re-
ported, but barring a full confirmation
of the explosion and of the death of
between fifteen and twenty men, no
details have been learned.

LATER.

The special train has unloaded the
remains of the killed at the depot in
Victor. Three wagons and a railroad
truck were required to transport them
to the morgue. The identified dead
are: Alex. McLain, shift boss; J. Har-
lock, M. Schaelein, George Sinclair.

MONTREAL'S DEMANDS.

Board of Trade Lays Big Programme
of Improvements Before the
Transportation Commission

MONTREAL, Que., June 6.—The
government commission on transporta-
tion, which for the last six months
has been meeting in various centres
in Canada, today held its first session
here, at which the Montreal Board of
Trade made recommendations for the
improvements of Montreal harbor, St.
Lawrence River and the Gulf; the ex-
tension of the Intercolonial to Geo-
rgian Bay, the building of the Grand
Trunk Pacific from Northern Ontario
eastward; the removal of all part
charges at Montreal; additional grain
elevators here, as well as the building
of a dry dock and the provision of ele-
vated railway tracks along the entire
harbor front.

A hydrographic survey of the Gulf,
a re-survey of the Gulf and River St.
Lawrence, the deepening of the chan-
nel between here and Quebec, the
deepening and canalizing of French Riv-
er, an immense undertaking, and the
establishment of additional Marconi
wireless stations were also recommen-
ded.

SYDNEY STRIKE STILL HOLDS.

HALIFAX, June 5.—There have been
no new developments in the strike sit-
uation. Acting Manager J. Dix Fraser
says he is satisfied with the way
things are going. The secretary of
the Board of Trade received a tele-
gram from Hon. Wm. Mulock, min-
ister of labor, stating that he had ef-
fected his services in an endeavor to bring
about a settlement of the strike, but
both sides were unwilling to accept
government intervention.
