PROGRAMME.

Entertainment for Old Home Re-visitors.

From June 20 to 25 St. John Will be En Fete—Every Day's Attractions.

Ten days from now the Old Home Week will begin. Next week will see the arrival of the first of the great crowd of visitors who are coming to enjoy St. John's hospitality for a spell. Keenly all are looking forward to what will be a very eventful week, and naturally there is much desire to know what is to take place. The following have been definitely settled upon, but the programme is by no means yet complete.

MONDAY.

On Monday, the 20th, the members of the Royal Society will arrive by the noon train and hold their preliminary meeting.

TUESDAY.

Tuesday will be given up to the Royal Society, and the High School building will be the scene of the evening's entertainment. A public meeting will be held at 8 o'clock, and an address will be delivered by the president of the society, Col. Peniston.

WEDNESDAY.

In the afternoon of Wednesday a baseball match will be played on the Victoria grounds. It has not yet been settled between what teams the game will be played, but there is some talk of bringing an outside professional team to meet all St. John.

On the same afternoon the members of the Royal Society will be entertained by a drive about the city and suburbs and the most features of the city, including the falls, will be pointed out. The drive will be followed by a picnic to the grounds of Dr. R. J. MacDuff, where those of the party who are not given down will go by special train from the West Side and all will return by train in the evening in time to hear the lecture to be delivered by Professor Ganong. The driving party and picnic are being given by the ladies' committee of the Royal Society, Natural History Society and Historical Society and participation in both will be by invitation only.

THURSDAY.

FRIDAY.

Friday will be the great day. The landing of Champlain, deMonts and Poutrincourt will take place at the Market Slip. After the landing there will be a procession through the streets, in which the visiting map-makers and local militia will take part. The procession will proceed to Riverview Park, where the memorial monument will be unveiled.

The battleship will arrive Wednesday evening and will remain outside of Port George until the following morning, when they will proceed up the harbor.

In the afternoon of Friday, sports will be held on the Victoria grounds. The competitors will be the winners in the recent collegiate sports, and prizes are expected from Moncton, Halifax, Charlottetown, Fredericton and St. Stephen.

In the evening the harbor will be illuminated and there will be a parade of yachts. Fifteen steam yachts, illuminated and decorated, are expected to take part. The fire department will hold a large parade during the evening.

On Friday evening a large number of visitors will leave for St. Croix Island, where, on Saturday, there will be the unveiling of the monument lately erected there. At this function addresses will be made by George Chamberlain, one of the most distinguished orators of Maine, Prof. Ganong, and Hon. James P. Baxter, president of the Maine Historical Society, and an address will be read by Henry N. Rideout, who was the leader of his class at Cambridge. Suitable preparations have been made to accommodate the crowd expected at St. Croix.

Gov. Myron T. Herrick, of Ohio, writing of the late Senator Hanna in Harper's Weekly, gives the following story which was used by Sen. Hanna to illustrate his state of mind when utterly exhausted by a strenuous political campaign undertaken after a period of sickness. One evening after making a long speech, he got into a corner seat with difficulty, where he lolled in sheer exhaustion and tried to smoke. Looking at the end of his cigar he told this story: "I feel like the soldier in the Civil War, who, while leading a charge, was knocked over, stamped on, rolled in the mud, and kicked by a mule. Gaining himself up, he followed his regiment with a sore mind and a aching body. As he limped along, he said: 'I love my country. I have fit fur her, I have bled fur her, an' I stand ready to die fur her. But when this blame war is over I ain't never-a-goin' to love another country.'"

JAPANESE HURLED FROM
PORT ARTHUR'S WALL.

Russian Paper Claims Victory—Angry at the Americans—Kurapatkin And His Work.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 11.—The Russian paper, in concluding an article on the military situation in the Far East, inclines to the belief that fighting has already occurred in front of Port Arthur and that the Japanese sustained a reverse.

D. S. MUST EXPLAIN.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 11.—The Novoye Vremya, discussing the report that the submarine boat Protector had been shipped from New York, for the Japanese, expresses the hope that the United States government will make a detailed explanation of why the boat was allowed to leave the United States.

RUSSIANS LEAVE KOREA.

SEOUL, June 11.—4:30 p. m.—The Russian demonstration in Northeastern Korea, in the province of Ham Heung, seems nearly ended. It is believed that Gosen with a reinforced garrison is in no further danger. All the Cossacks have retired north of Ham Heung. A body is still at Sanjung. Several engagements have occurred west of there. It is thought the Russians are making a gradual retreat to Vladivostok, gathering provisions on route.

GENERAL KUROPATKIN.

LIAO YANG, June 11.—The entire Russian plan for the campaign in Manchuria, from a railway carriage here, in which General Kurapatkin works, eats and sleeps. The car is divided into a saloon, a study and a bedroom. The commander-in-chief passes most of his time in the study at work, surrounded by his aides.

Although small of stature, Kurapatkin is at once distinguishable among his entourage, however brilliant may be their uniforms, by his determined features and sturdy figure. He has the reputation of being severe, but just, and his word is law. His officers express the fullest confidence in him and the ideal of the common soldier and the foreign attaches find him most pleasant.

He takes little or no rest except a half hour's siesta after lunch when the heat is excessive and he occasionally indulges in the stimulation of smoking. He rises at 7 o'clock and makes a tour of inspection of the camps and military works around Liao Yang, sees the Russian troops during the afternoon and subsequently receives the reports of the generals at the theatre of operations.

LONDON, June 11.—The Daily Mail assumes "two infernal machines were found on the night of June 7 concealed in tobacco boxes in the Tatarokye Hotel." The Russian Emperor is now residing. One of the machines was in the dining room, the other in the kitchen. The mechanism in each was working when discovered. The strictest secrecy is observed, and this statement, although true in detail, is sure to be categorically denied.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 10.—The Emperor has received from General Kurapatkin the following telegram dated June 9:

"The Japanese bombardment June 8 of the coast between Souchan and Kaiping caused no loss of life nor material damage, although a considerable number of shells were fired. One man doing hospital duty was slightly wounded and two wagons were damaged during the attack on the coast this morning, but several Japanese ships were cruising in the offing.

"June 9 the Japanese continued slowly their march toward Suifu by the Takushan and Feng Wang Cheng roads. Their advance guard did not approach nearer than five miles south and east of Suifu. On the morning of June 8 a Japanese infantry brigade, with two mountain batteries and five squads of cavalry, marched against Suifu. About 11 o'clock the Japanese appeared before the town on the south side, but were checked by a very successful fire from our batteries.

"The Japanese then began advancing against the town from the east by the Feng Wang Cheng road, and came in contact with the Cossacks holding the pass. After two hours' fighting the Cossacks were obliged to retire, and our artillery opened fire along the pass, not allowing the Japanese to establish themselves. At this moment a Japanese mountain battery arrived and took a position to the south, but after firing a few rounds was silenced by our battery. A second Japanese battery did not succeed in getting into action, but was compelled to evacuate its position under the fire of our guns.

"In the afternoon of June 7 at Vanfang we had one rifleman wounded, but the Japanese sustained considerable losses. According to the testimony of residents they had forty killed or wounded."

Details of the affair at Salmatze follow: "June 7, at 6 a. m., an outpost company on the Alyang was attacked by the enemy. A detachment of Chassours was sent as a reinforcement. More Japanese then appeared, one battalion with a mounted battery positioned before Salmatze. The Chassours at first pressed the Japanese, inflicting losses and taking rifles and equipment from the killed, but the ac-

vance was checked by a very severe fire. Reinforcements now joined the enemy, bringing up their strength to a brigade of infantry, two batteries of artillery and three squadrons of cavalry. Thereupon the commander of our detachment ordered a retreat towards Penchulin Pass. The detachment withdrew slowly and in good order, holding successive positions. Our wounded included Captain Makharoff and Lieut. Bonjitski. Both officers, however, remained in the ranks. About 100 men were killed or wounded. The enemy suffered severely. Accretments taken from the Japanese dead show they belonged to the twelfth division.

"The commander of our detachment compliments the calm courage of our troops, and reports that the conduct of the Red Cross company was above all praise."

C. P. R. DISCRIMINATION.

Passenger Rates From Montreal to St. John Higher Than to Other Summer Resorts.

There is considerable complaint in some quarters that the C. P. R. are discriminating against St. John in the matter of summer rates from Upper Canadian points, and it is understood that a member of the board of trade called the attention of President McNeill to the matter when he was here a day or two ago.

The rates from Montreal to all New England summer resorts, good for three months, is \$10.55, to St. Andrews \$12 and to St. John \$12.50. The I. C. R. rate is the same as that quoted by the C. P. R.

In view of the cheap rate to St. Andrews, Boston, and the St. John fare is considered excessive.

THE HALF HOLIDAY.

Great Weather But Not Very Many to Enjoy It.

Fine and delightful weather characterizes the second half holiday of the present summer. It is only the privilege of few, however, to enjoy the weather. There are numerous ways in which the afternoon can be passed. WAR AGAINST UNIONS.

CRIPPLED CHECK, Colo., June 10.—As a result of the recent strike and anarchy, every employer of labor in this city has signed an agreement to employ no union men in any capacity. Employees now connected with unions must leave the organizations or their jobs. This war against unions is to be extended, the organizers say, to every city and town in the district. The mine owners declare they would only work for ten years rather than employ one member of the Western Federation of Miners.

NEW VICEROY
APPOINTED.

Earl Grey to Succeed Earl of Minto.

Former Colonial Minister and Prominent Statesman Will be the Next Governor-General.

LONDON, June 11.—It is announced that Earl Grey, Lord of Northumberland has been appointed to succeed the Earl of Minto, as governor general of Canada.

The Rt. Hon. Henry Grey, K. G., was born in 1802, and was educated at Trinity College, Cambridge. He was a member for Northumberland from 1831 to 1841, and was also for some years under secretary for the colonies. Resigning, he in 1853, became secretary for war. He succeeded his father as third Earl Grey in 1846, and in 1846 accepted the position of secretary of state for the colonies, which he resigned in six years' time. Lord Grey was not included in the coalition cabinet and did not approve the policy of Lord Aberdeen's cabinet in declaring war against Russia. Lord Grey is the author of "Colonial Policy of Lord Russell's Administration," and of "Easy on Parliamentary Government to Reform."

THE UP-TO-DATE BATHING COSTUME.

The bathing costume has in these days of extravagance achieved rare attractiveness. It is no longer the unsightly garment of heavy blue flannel with several rows of white braid as its only trimming, but is fashioned from mohair that is almost as lustrous and fine as silk, or of fine serge and chevrot. These silky bathing dresses with broad trimmings or bands of contrasting color, are very attractive, and points in their favor are that they readily shed the water and dry quickly.
