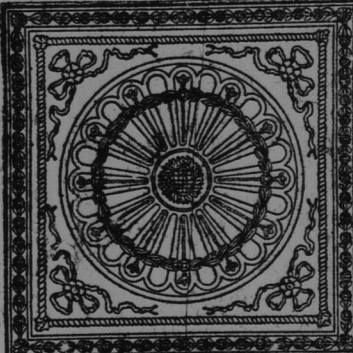

### NEW ENGLAND LABOR TROUBLES

First of May Celebrated by  
Several Strikes.

Fifteen Hundred Bakers Quit Work  
—Carpenters, Plumbers and  
Quarrymen Also Strike.

BOSTON, May 1.—With the exception of a strike of more than 1,500 bakers in this city, Cambridge, Chelsea, Lynn, Salem and Brockton, the first day of May this year passed without any serious labor disturbances at any points in New England. Not for many years has the labor situation been so peaceful and harmonious as at the present time.

Forty-five plumbers will leave their work at Malden tomorrow.

At Calais, Vt., fifty granite quarry workers whose demands for an increase of ten per cent. in wages was refused, agreed today to work three days this week pending a conference between the local quarry owners and the Barre Granite Mfrs. Assn.

The strike of the stone masons at Manchester, N. H., was settled today. The strike situation at the Fore River Ship and Engine Co. at Quincy is unchanged, although it is claimed that some of the strikers have returned to work.

A strike of 400 carpenters employed in Springfield and Chicopee was declared to night. The men demanded a daily wage increase of fifty cents, which was refused by the employers.

BROCKTON, Mass., May 1.—A scarcity of bread and pastry in Brockton and adjacent towns was reported today as a result of the strike of bakers in this district. The union men claim that 14 out of 21 master bakers have signed an agreement to sign a schedule for a sixty hour week and \$18 weekly for second hands and \$18 for foremen.

WILL HAVE NEW QUARTERS.  
St. Vincent de Paul Society will soon occupy new quarters. His Lordship Bishop Casey, in the Cathedral yesterday morning announced that the society had purchased a lot on Waterbury street upon which will be erected a building suitable for the protection of the society's charitable work.

The new building will provide ample quarters for distribution, storage, school and the auxiliary sewing organization.

DEPOPULATING IRELAND.  
LONDON, April 30.—A parliamentary return issued this morning shows that since 1861 and to 1903 nearly four million of Irishmen have emigrated. The exact total being 3,961,110, equivalent to 74 per cent. of the average population of Ireland. During the year 1903, 492,178 Irishmen emigrated, of which number the United States received 33,051.

FOUR TRAMPS CREMATED.  
COUNCIL BLUFFS, Ia., May 2.—Three men and a boy were burned to death in a box car in the Northwestern yards here today. There are believed to have been tramps trying to steal a ride, but no clue as to their identity has been obtained. Cries for help were heard by the trainmen, but all four succumbed to the flames before they could be reached.

A COSTLY CARGO.  
NEW YORK, May 2.—An engagement of one million dollars in gold for shipment on Tuesday's steamer was announced today. Goldsmith and Landerberg & Co. engaged \$500,000 worth of the previously announced engagement of \$1,000,000 by J. P. Morgan & Co., brings the total for tomorrow up to \$3,000,000.

### CHURCH UNION.

That Subject and the Park Restaurant Matter Discussed by Evangelical Alliance Today.

The Evangelical Alliance held its regular monthly meeting this morning. Rev. C. T. Phillips in the chair. Those present were Revs. Dr. Fotheringham, Dr. Wilson, Dr. Raymond, S. Howard, C. W. Hamilton, C. Combs, M. Traflet, John A. Clark, J. W. Nicholson, J. C. B. Appel, and C. W. Townsend, of St. Martins.

In regard to the Sunday opening of the park restaurant Rev. Dr. Fotheringham, Dr. Raymond, Dr. Sprague, Dr. Wilson, Dr. Phillips and J. B. C. Appel were appointed a committee to wait upon the directors of the St. John Horticultural Association at their meeting tomorrow afternoon.

Up to the present nearly all the churches in the city have taken a decided stand against the Sunday opening of the Park restaurant, and have intimated their attitude by resolutions which have been received by the alliance. A brief discussion arose this morning with respect to the old Sabbath-day law, which made it a penal offence to follow one's ordinary avocations on Sunday. In the absence of sufficient legal knowledge on the part of the members as to whether or not that law was workable at the present day, no definite opinion was expressed. It was thought that if it were workable it might have its influence in obviating the Sunday park restaurant difficulty by preventing the proprietor of the place from keeping open on Sundays.

Fotheringham read at some length from the minutes of the conference on Church Union, which was held in John fourteen years ago. This conference followed a similar conference held in London, England, by Presbyterians, Methodists and Congregationalists. Rev. Dr. Fotheringham was secretary of the conference.

Following the reading of the minutes was a general discussion, during which the practicability of church union was exhaustively gone into. There is at no attempt to fill in the place of their former employers.

The cause of the strike was the refusal of the master bakers to sign a schedule for a sixty hour week and \$18 weekly for second hands and \$18 for foremen.

Many of those present this morning felt that the union of all denominations was at the present time replete. All, however, were of the opinion that there was an unimpaired movement toward union, if not of form, at least of aim and Christian purpose.

**WISH TO REWARD CAPTAIN CROSBY.**  
The Captain He Rescued Will Bring Matter Before French Gov-ernment.

The Sydney Record of April 28 contains the details of the sinking of the French schooner Auguste Marie last week, of Scotland, and the rescue of the crew by the Battle line steamer Pydna, Capt. Crosby. The schooner was caught and crushed in the ice flow on the 28th of April. Realizing the danger, Capt. Lamey displayed signals of distress which were answered by the Pydna, then on her way to Louisa, and the captain and 15 men comprising the crew of the Auguste Marie were taken off by the schooner. The schooner was sinking within a short time after the following is taken from the Record:

"The crew (the crew) all wish publicly to thank Capt. Crosby, of the Pydna, who forced his vessel through the heavy ice at great risk to rescue them and afterwards refused any compensation whatever for his services. They are determined that he shall be rewarded in some way for his timely rescue, however, and Capt. Lamey has asked French Consul Mowbray to bring the case to the notice of the French government."

"Capt. Lamey thinks that if the Pydna had not happened along when she did he and his crew would have experienced considerable difficulty in reaching land, and perhaps would never have reached shore at all."

"The Auguste Marie was owned in St. Pierre and was 53 tons register."

**PRIEST'S BODY BROUGHT HOME.**  
Late Father McGoldrick's Remains Arrived Today—Funeral Tomorrow.

The body of the late Father C. McGoldrick, of Dorchester, Mass., arrived in the city today on the Boston express. The body was accompanied by Deputy Mayor McGoldrick, Patrick McGoldrick, father of the deceased, and Mrs. M. A. Morgan, of Boston, a sister.

Rev. Father Geary, who was curate to the late Father McGoldrick, and Rev. Father Holleran, of St. Peter's church, Dorchester, Mass., also came with the body.

The body was met at the depot by the following city clergymen: Revs. Fathers White, Scully, Wood, Bourne and Walsh. The tusket was taken to St. Peter's church, North End, accompanied by Messrs. Frank Foster, John Kelly, Richard Sullivan, Charles Ramsey, James Morgan and John Walsh as pall-bearers. Following were the clergymen in coaches.

The funeral service which accompanied the body from Dorchester, Mass., was many and beautiful, testifying to the esteem in which the deceased clergyman was held by his congregation.

The body will lie in state at St. Peter's church until tomorrow morning at ten o'clock, when solemn requiem high mass will take place. Rev. Father McGoldrick, of Holy Trinity, will be the celebrant.

**RUIED BY SPECULATION.**  
NEW YORK, May 2.—His money disappeared in speculation, Emanuel Silverblatt, a member of a wealthy family in Warsaw, Russia, who with his brother Jacob, came to this country recently, ended his life today by jumping from a fourth story window in an East side lodging house.

### RUSSIANS FLED FROM JAP STEEL.

Retired in Disorder When

RUSSIANS FLED.

LONDON, May 2.—A despatch to the Central News from Seoul says that after the Japanese charge which resulted in the occupation of Russian lines at Chong Ching, the Russians fell back in confusion. The Japanese, the despatch continues, have now secured a firm hold on the Manchurian side of the Yalu.

**JAP WARSHIPS FIGHT BATTERIES**

LONDON, May 2.—The Japanese fleet saw out today an official despatch from the admiralty at Tokyo, reporting an engagement between Japanese warships on the Yalu and Russian shore batteries. It read as follows:

"The captain of the gunboat Maya reports that a flotilla consisting of the gunboats Maya and Uji and some torpedo boats ascended the Yalu, May 1st, and bombarded the enemy, while they were returning the enemy's artillery suddenly attacked the torpedo boats. The latter silenced the enemy after a severe engagement, having thirty minutes and the flotilla all returned to Yungnampho; there were no casualties."

"Our armed launches reached Antung at the same morning and repulsed the enemy's infantry and artillery after thirty minutes of sharp fighting. Fire was seen rising from the town of Antung after setting fire to it."

**ANOTHER LANDING.**

CHE FOO, May 1, 3 p. m.—It is expected here that the Japanese will land on the Liao Tung peninsula, near Faku-shan, if they have not already done so.

It is learned from the Chinese who have escaped from Faku-shan, to which the Japanese have advanced, that on April 22 four Japanese warships, 12 torpedo boat destroyers and some torpedo boats approached the peninsula. They were discovered by the Russian coast guards, who fired upon them. The Japanese then returned to their ships, which were still off Faku-shan when the Chinese left there. April 23, there were some ground reports that a number of transports joined the Japanese fleet at a rendezvous on the west side of the Bay of Korea.

**RUSSIAN HARD LUCK.**

ST. PETERSBURG, May 2.—The new Russian battleship Orskoi, to which the finishing touches are being put, ran aground on a sand bank in the Neva yesterday.

The Orskoi has been sent from Cronstadt to assist the tugs in pulling her off.

**SALVAGED CARGO.**

The Parasho Packet is discharging at South Wharf the general cargo which was taken from this port last week by the schooner Temple Bell and considerably damaged at Bridgetown, where the Temple Bell caught on a bank and fell over.

The schooner filled the bank with her wreck and also through a rat hole in her stern. She had a deckload of lime and was found impossible under the circumstances to right her. The marine underwriters who had the insurance were notified and sent a man over to inspect the schooner. He ordered the cargo to be brought back to this port to be sold and it was transferred to the Packet.

The Temple Bell has been fixed up and is at present in port loading.

**TERCENTENARY POST CARDS.**

One of the Champlain celebration and old home week postcard cards has been received at the office of the Tourist Association and is ready for distribution. This card which was designed and printed by the Maritime Steam Lithographing Company, represents a piece of birch bark with a picture of Champlain and a quaint little residence with a pretty bit of scenery. On a wreath of leaves is inscribed, "On a hill holding in his bill a card having the words, 'Be wise and come.' Underneath is the date, June 20th to 27th, 1904."

The other card which will be ready in a few days has in the foreground a piece of rugged scenery, in the middle a vessel of Champlain's time, in one lower corner a picture of the discoverer and in the opposite corner a tent. The upper half of the card shows the St. John of today with a large ocean steamer in the stream.

**THE FRESHET.**

Steadily but surely the river at In-diantown is rising, and everything points to quite a heavy freshet. This morning the water was between six and seven feet above the ordinary summer level. It is believed that the freshet will probably last a long while. In the woods at the head waters of the river the snow yet remains unmelted, and the melting of this snow will tend to swell the river considerably.

### POLICE COURT.

A Light Docket Today — A Few  
Drunks and One Moving Day  
Squabble.

The docket at the police court was light this morning, although the occupants of the bench were on the heavy side. The three men were able-bodied, while the one female, Phoebe Dukeshire, looked as big as "Jim" Jeffries. Two men who were arrested on St. John street for drunkenness Saturday afternoon left a deposit of eight each. They did not put in an appearance to claim any part of it.

Phoebe was first called and pleaded guilty to the charge of being drunk on Sheffield street. The officers in court nearly fell to the floor when they realized that all Phoebe had to say was that one little word "guilty." She was fined \$8 with the option of two months' hard labor. Phoebe evidently realized that this was moving day as she had on the team that carried her to the station a bundle, the contents of which caused much speculation in court, and which she carried carefully into jail.

Two Hollanders, who were employed on the S. S. Nordboon which sailed Saturday night, were locked up Saturday afternoon charged with being drunk on St. John street. The magistrate expressed regret that the captain had not been notified. However, the men only went to Hopewell Cape to load, the men may yet be put on board.

Harry Garson was in court this morning to complain that Miss Swartz had broken the lock on his residence on Acadia street and injured Belle Garson's hand. Swartz explained that he had rented the house and was to take possession May 1st. Garson, the former tenant, had possession this morning and he could not get in. He had to put his goods and chattels somewhere, so forced the bolts. The magistrate told him to go and told Garson that if the woman had any complaint to make to lay the necessary information.

**STRIKES IN MONTREAL.**

Five Hundred Plumbers Out —  
Stone Cutters Also Quit Work —  
More Threatening.

MONTREAL, May 2.—Five hundred plumbers went on strike here today, demanding 55 cents per hour for an eight hour day. The men have been receiving \$15 for a 64 hour week.

MONTREAL, Quebec, May 2.—The marble workers, soft stone cutters, sculptors and carvers went on strike today, the employers having refused their demand for increased wages and reduction of hours of labor. Bricklayers and carpenters are also making demands, the house decorators are still on strike.

**BURIED TODAY.**

The funeral of the late Miss Elizabeth O'Hara, who died Saturday at her residence, 44 Camden street, after a brief illness, took place at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon. Deceased, who was a daughter of the late Daniel O'Hara, is survived by four brothers and five sisters.
