LIBERAL LOSS.

Within a space of little over a year the Liberal government has driven from its association four men, the weakest of whom was a loss the government could ill afford to bear. And to the direct loss of the services of capable men is added a greater loss in the esteem of the public, for the departure of each one of the four has been caused by circumstances which have turned popular favor, in every instance, away from the government.

First it was Mr. Tarte who had to go because he held the heretical doctrine for Canadians; then Mr. Blair because he opposed the giving away of a railway costing hundreds of millions to a company of capitalists and dared to hold the opinion that what the people paid for the people should own and operate in their own interests; then Lord Dundonald was hurled forth with contempt because he insisted that the Canadian army existed for the defence of the Canadian people and not for the benefit of a few politicians; and now it is J. Lorne McDougall, auditor general of Canada for a quarter of a century, who is being driven out because he has done his duty protecting the public treasury and because an honest and fearless man as auditor general would be very much in the way during the construction by the government of the eastern section of the Grand Trunk Pacific with its expenditure of sixty or seventy millions of dollars.

The forcing out of any one of these men would have aroused public resentment; the cumulative effect of the four departures is impossible to estimate. Certain it is that the circumstances attending Lord Dundonald's discharge have caused keener and more general indignation than anything the government has done during its term of office.

But the auditor general's retirement will create something more than indignation; it will create suspicion, and though indignation may die with the lapse of time suspicion grows.

Under three governments J. Lorne McDougall has guarded the interests of the tax-payers against the attempts of unscrupulous politicians. Now, at a time when it is proposed to give the government power to spend more money than ever a Canadian government spent on one undertaking before this removal of the people's security that would be spent honestly will give rise to thoughts, which, added to other thoughts of the same kind caused by Yukon scandals, dog biscuit emergency foods, G. T. P. deals, etc., will increase the public distrust of the present government to an extent that much sunny smiling and many eloquent speeches cannot assuage.

A CHANCE FOR GRAFT.

Discussing the grafting possibilities of the "dumping" clause of Mr. Fielding's tariff, the Winnipeg Telegram says: "Whenever goods are sold to a Canadian importer at a lower price than the same goods are sold to a purchaser in the country of production, then Mr. Fielding would add to the existing duty a sum equal to the difference in selling price as above, with the proviso that the sum so added shall not be greater than 50 per cent. of the duty, or, in some cases, than 15 per cent. of the price of the articles."

For example, a Winnipeg implement dealer might purchase certain agricultural implements in the United States for \$30 apiece, and the manufacturer might be selling the same implements to a dealer in Fargo for \$30. Then Mr. Fielding would add \$10 to the duty.

But how would Mr. Fielding know of this difference in price? Some one would have to tell him, of course. Or, rather, perhaps, some one would have to tell the minister of customs.

Who would tell the minister of customs? Why, the Canadian manufacturers of implements.

Now the minister of customs would have to judge whether his informant furnished satisfactory information, and here is where the graft could be worked.

The minister of customs might be very easily satisfied in some cases and very hard to satisfy in others. With such a minister in office the manufacturers of Canada would have to stand in while the government because the minister would have it in his power to increase their protection by 50 per cent. or to leave them open to the competition of "dumped" goods.

This is the device the local Liberal organs praise so highly and characterize as "ingenious" and the public can now see the reason.

THE CROWD AT ST. LOUIS.

ST. LOUIS, June 26.--The total attendance at the world's fair for the week ending last night, June 25, as officially announced tonight, was 549,485, an increase of over 85,000 over the previous week, and 463,777 over the total attendance for the first week.

THE BIBLE AND OTHER BOOKS.

Three Hundred Million Copies of the Scriptures Circulated in a Century.

On Wednesday, March 7, 1894, "a numerous and respectable meeting of persons of various denominations" was held at the London Tavern, and a society formed "to promote the circulation of the Holy Scriptures in the principal living languages." At that time the Bible, or portions of it, could be obtained in about forty living languages, spoken by two-tenths of the race. During the century since the meeting at the London Tavern adjourned, and very largely from the machinery then and there started, the Scriptures have been translated into 450 languages and dialects, understood by seven-tenths of the race. By the London society alone 180,000,000 copies have been distributed, at an expense of \$70,000,000. If we add to this total the 70,000,000 copies already distributed by the younger American Bible Society and the unknown millions printed and sold by private enterprise, we find ourselves inside a safe estimate if we hold that certainly that 300,000,000 copies of the Scriptures, in whole or separate books or portions, have gone into circulation during the last century.

Amazement attends the study of the Bible, whatever the point of view of the course pursued. But nothing about the Bible is more amazing than its continuous, universal and utterly unparalleled popularity. In nearly every, if not every, country on earth where books are sold, more Bibles are sold than any other book. Last year the British and Foreign Bible Society alone distributed 5,943,775 copies, the majority by sale, in 370 languages, covering every part of the globe. And the issue by the American society for the year amounted to 1,993,558 Bibles and portions.

PEN PICTURES OF MEN.

John Hay, secretary of state, is thus described by a Washington correspondent: "A short man, extraordinarily punctilious in dress, with an attentively combed beard, an attractive face, a pleasant voice, a voice of singular precision and sibillancy; a man of aristocratic tastes and ways and democratic manners and language; a man who uses slang in private conversation and wields the English language like a musical instrument in his public utterances and who always wears evening dress in his own house after 6 o'clock." That is the outward man. The inward man is the impression. The impression is abroad that Hay is an aristocrat. In his tastes he is, but not in his confidential, though always dignified. He sometimes, when talking to one he can trust, discusses great international questions in pungent idioms and with a Yankee rough-and-readiness that is proof positive of his authorship of "The Country Ballads." He is sensitive to criticism; there is no man in public life more sensitive.

Daniel O'Connell, the Irish orator, spoke in Covent Garden, London, many years ago and John Coleman, an English actor, pictured him as follows: "The audience hung spellbound on the words of the great orator. His recitation of the Irish ballad, 'The Olden Days,' with its rich Irish accent, held both soul and senses captive. As for me, my Celtic blood took me into the man who, with passionate indignation or melted into tears as he dwelt upon the wrongs of his people, seemed to me a very, was such a born orator! Stern men cried one moment and laughed the next. Strange as it may seem, I never laughed in the wrong place, though once at least he afforded them a unique opportunity. As he approached the front of the stage, he took a great step forward, he took his wig off (a brown 'Jockey' hat, put it in his hat and mopped his forehead with a great handkerchief, he appeared so natural and appropriate that he seemed to think it absurd even incongruous."

King Peter of Servia, according to a recent writer, is a tall, spare, military-looking man, with a slender, hawklike face, marked by deep lines, gray hair and mustache, shifty eyes. He would pass on any stage as the typical decayed officer who haunts gambling halls. Whether or not his creditors are right in supposing that he was the murderer of the late king, it seems certain that the event did not take him by surprise.

We who dwell in these sun-smitten plain-lands, And work under tropical skies, Where never the East wind blusters, And never a sea-breeze sighs, And never a white sail quivers Wind-driven and flecked with the foam, We dream in the silent night watches Of England our Home.

WITNESSES AGAINST PICKPOCKETS.

D. R. Jack, Count DeBury and Baron d'Halewyn will Give Evidence in Fredericton

D. R. Jack returned this morning from the St. Croix tercentenary celebration which he says was an excellent one and passed off without a hitch. In referring to the arrest of the three men at McAdam, who are now at Fredericton, accused of pocket picking, Mr. Jack says he had some little trouble in getting the officers there to take the men into custody. Two of the men alighted from the train at McAdam and the constable after considerable talk got them into a room in the railway buildings. Mr. Jack with two other officers went back to the train and there he pulled out the third man to the officials. They invited him to go with them and he at once commenced to ask questions. He wanted to know why he should leave the train? What was he suspected of, etc.? When Mr. Jack insisted they should take him he wanted to know what business it was of Mr. Jack's and finally refused to leave the train, saying he was an American citizen and they dare not touch him. Mr. Jack called his attention to the fact that he was on Canadian soil and would go into custody if it was necessary to side-track the car. He then got up and with many threats that they would be made to pay for it went with the officers.

It was after this that Premier Treadwell, who was in another car, instructed the officials to take the three men to Fredericton. Mr. Jack says there was much excitement about the depot and among the passengers. He expects to go to Fredericton tomorrow to Count de Bury, who was present at the depot when the secretary of the French consul missed his pocket book and also stated his willingness to appear as a witness. The consul's secretary will return to the province any time he is wanted in connection with the case.

FARMERS GET TOGETHER.

Milford, president of the association. 10 a. m.--Visiting orchard, where practical demonstrations of pruning, grafting and spraying will be carried out and discussed by Dr. Fletcher. 2 p. m.--Continuation of practical work in both field and orchard. Address in Temperance Hall upon Live Stock and other topics.

LOCAL NEWS.

Mrs. W. E. Staver of Mount Pleasant met with an accident on Saturday afternoon. She was about to enter her carriage near the depot, when the horses started just as she was mounting the steps. As a result Mrs. Staver was thrown somewhat to the ground. Fortunately she was not badly hurt, and was at once driven to her home, where it was ascertained that she sustained only a severe shaking.

C. J. Haley of Charlton, son of Capt. Frank Haley, a student at the Sulpician Seminary, Montreal, appears in the prize list as winning first prize for Latin, French and Greek grammar; also a prize for memory, and success in elocution, history and geography.

SOME EGG RECIPES.

Scotch Woodcock--Boil half a dozen eggs twenty minutes, then lay them in cold water. When cool enough, handle slice into a soup plate, at a chop fine with a silver knife. Put two tablespoonsful of butter into a smooth frying pan, and as soon as melted add one tablespoonful of flour. Stir until the mixture is frothy, taking care that it does not brown. Now stir in little by little a half pint of warm milk, using the back of the bowl of the spoon and not the egg. Add a grain of cayenne, salt and a dash of pepper. Cook just a moment, add the chopped eggs, cook three minutes and serve on toast.

This is an excellent recipe for the chaffing dish. If hard boiled eggs are difficult to digest, the addition of a dash of anchovy, it is a good plan to taste before salting.

Eggs With Tomato Sauce--Heat together one cup of cooked, strained tomato, three tablespoonsful of tomato catsup, one tablespoonful of Worcester's sauce and a speck of cayenne. If too thick dilute with half a cup of hot water. Put into a saucepan three level tablespoonsful of butter and three of flour and cook until "bubbly." Add the heated tomato and stir until the sauce is smooth and creamy. Break in three raw eggs constantly until a fork for two or three minutes, until the whites thicken slightly and the mixture is creamy. Serve on toast.

Lyonnese Eggs--Put two tablespoonsful of butter into a frying pan, and when hot add two tablespoonsful of minced parsley. Cook until the onion raw eggs may be substituted, stirring them like scrambled eggs. As there is a great difference in the saltiness of anchovy, it is a good plan to taste before salting.

As announced by the Sun a few days ago, Caleb Belyea, the veteran letter carrier of this city, was among those to receive imperial service order medals as a King's birthday honor. Mr. Belyea was at the time of his suppers one year ago, the oldest letter carrier in the Dominion of Canada, and has seen many changes in the postal service of this city since he first entered. He was appointed to the position of letter carrier in 1871, and it was not until the 24th day of June, the same year, that this department was opened up, but Mr. Belyea's appointment was on the former date. Since then he has served under five postmasters, John Howe, J. V. Ellis, S. A. King, Ed. Willis and Thomas B. Hamilton, the present postmaster. He has also seen three post office inspectors, John McMillan, S. A. King and Dr. Colter.
