G. T. P. DEBATE.

OTTAWA, April 26.—In the discussion of the G. T. P. amendment act in committee this afternoon, Clarke of Toronto made a most vigorous speech. In the course of which he earnestly pleaded for St. John and Halifax as against the government's programme to sacrifice those harbours in favor of the abiding place of the G. T. friends in Portland, Me. Clarke held the floor for two hours up to six o'clock, with one of the most practical speeches of the session on this question. His arraignment of the government's gold brick scheme was almost absolutely unanswerable and was cheered time and again. Clarke said that the leader of the opposition was being alarmed by the grite in the maritime provinces, as well as by the grite of Manitoba, but wherever the country had heard Clarke's argument for extension of the Intercolonial they were with him almost to a man.

Before the house rose for dinner Wade of Annapolis declared there was no truth in the report that he was to be chairman of the commission to construct the eastern extension of the Trunk Pacific. He had not applied for the position and it had not been offered to him. Clarke of West Toronto, continued after dinner one of the ablest speeches of the G. T. P. debate. He moved the following amendment to the motion to not read the bill a second time, but that it be resolved: That the bill be intended to ratify the agreements providing for the construction of a trans-continental railway system, a large portion of which is to become the property of a railway corporation to whom the remaining portion is to be leased for fifty years on terms burdensome to the country. That under the proposed agreement Canada must incur the obligation of the whole direct and by guarantee, while the obligation assumed by the other guarantors is comparatively small.

The house believed that before committing the country to such enormous obligations the government ought first to submit to the people the whole question, and especially the question whether Canada should not rather assume the entire obligation and thus own and control the entire proposed line of railway from the Atlantic to the Pacific.

The amendment was defeated by a vote of 68 to 47.

The debate continued until 1:35 a. m.

**BOARD OF WORKS.**

At a meeting of the board of works yesterday, the director stated that repairs to the extent of between four and five hundred dollars will be made to the March road.

Ald. Baxter advocated the purchase by the city of the Carleton Electric Light Co.'s plant, claiming it would give the city the sole right to operate lights on the West Side. The matter was referred to a committee.

R. P. & W. F. Starr's tender of \$55 was accepted on the York Point slip-page. The tender of the Messrs. Patterson Co. for 460 barrels of the best Trinidad asphalt at \$4.85 per barrel was also accepted, as was the tender of the St. John Railway Co. for coal tar at \$2.40. Law & Co. will supply the city with cordwood at \$3.50. Tenders for hemlock deals and plank spruce deals and paving blocks were considered. C. T. White and Sawyer & Co. will supply the paving blocks. J. M. Tricoll the hemlock plank and Hilyard Bros. the hemlock deals.

Ald. Bullock said the committee which was named to inquire into the rearing of the McLeod building to T. McAvity & Sons had made a careful investigation. They advised that it be rented to this firm for two years at \$450 a year, with an option of three years after that, the firm to give it up on six months' notice after the expiration of these two years.

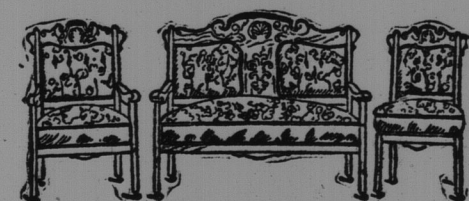
