AURORA'S ENGINEER DEAD.

There was some little excitement about the wharves yesterday when the str. Aurora from Grand Manan came in with her flag at half-mast. Room, however, it was learned that this was out of respect to the memory of the Aurora's engineer, Walter Tatton, who died on Sunday evening at North Head, Grand Manan. Mr. Tatton had been ill for almost a year, and some eight or nine months ago gave up his work in the hope that a rest would work some improvement. He however failed to gain strength and passed away. About 500 members of the club witnessed the bout. Baldwin forced the fighting throughout, but Kenney's guard was so well maintained that the Christchurch lad was able to break through but a few times. In the last two rounds Kenney did some leading, and Baldwin took advantage of his opponent to land several telling blows on the head.

CONDUCTED TRIAL OVER TELEPHONE.

Texas Youth Pleaded Guilty to Theft and Went to Prison With 1 Seeing Judge.

TEMPLE, Texas, Nov. 21.—A strange tale having to do with a lad boy and the telephone was made public here today. During a few several weeks ago a gum vending machine was stolen from in front of a local drug store. Having just loaded the silent salesman with twenty dollars' worth of gum, the drug-gist notified the police, who received instructions to keep a sharp lookout for the boy or man who had plenty of chewing gum to distribute among his friends.

PICTURE OF THE DEVIL.

A strange discovery is reported from Perugia, France. Some workmen were repairing a room in a house for a new tenant, and in doing so had to remove an old carved chair which had been fixed to the wall.

Behind the chair they found painted on the wall a picture of the devil, and their curiosity being aroused the men began sounding the bricks. SISTER'S DEVOTION.

Miss Moles, Killed by "Gould Express." Was Hoarding Money to Release Brother from Russian Army.

GREAT NECK, L. I., Nov. 21.—Investigation of the affairs of Miss Helen Moles, who was killed near here last Wednesday evening by the Howard Gould Express, disclosed a sad story of sisterly devotion for a brother who has been imprisoned into the army of the Tsar, after he had come to this country.

For months Miss Moles has been saving every penny that came into her hands, hoping that by spring she would have succeeded in saving \$700, the fee lawyers had demanded on promise to have her brother released and returned to this country. When the clothing of the woman was examined sewed in different portions of the skirt was \$48.
