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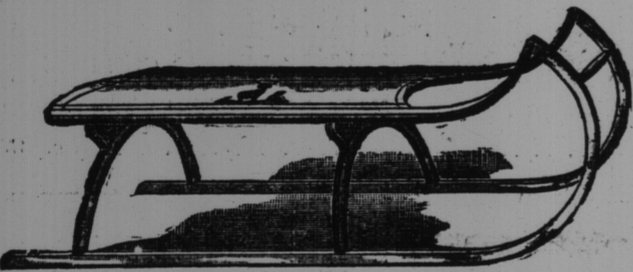

**SAINT VINCENT'S
CLOSED BY DIPHTHERIA**

Epidemic Threatens Catholic Orphanage and School.

Six Bad Cases Have Already Developed and More Are Feared—400 Children Endangered.

St. Vincent's Orphanage and School were closed yesterday on account of a number of cases of diphtheria breaking out. The discovery was made yesterday that diphtheria of a serious type was spreading among the orphans and day pupils and the buildings were ordered to be closed by the institution's physician, Dr. J. P. McInerney. At present six children are suffering from the disease and it is feared more will take it. The disease is believed to have been carried there by a girl belonging to Fairville, who applied for admission to the orphanage last week. Following her arrival a number of the children complained of illness, but at first it was not suspected that diphtheria was the cause. However, yesterday the illness of the children had reached such serious proportions that the mother superior deemed it imperative to have medical advice. Dr. McInerney was summoned and his diagnosis showed that the children were suffering with diphtheria. The children were immediately isolated and other precautions taken to prevent the spread of the disease. It is feared, however, that an epidemic may ensue. There are two hundred orphans, all girls, at the institution, and besides about two hundred more children attend the public school in connection. The orphanage is a very large building and there is every chance for contagion.

**SIX ELECTION FAKERS
COMMITTED FOR TRIAL**

MONTRÉAL, Dec. 17.—Judge Deschênes today committed the six accused in the St. Antoine Dominion election conspiracy to stand trial. He held that it had clearly been proven that they conspired to "telegraph" votes and in other ways to maintain a corrupt election. They were arrested at the instigation of Ald. Ames, who defeated Mr. Peter Lyle, for the seat.

F. S. SHARPE DIED TODAY.

F. Sterling Sharpe, a prominent accountant, died at his residence, No. 249 Charlotte street, this morning of heart failure. His death was a surprise to his friends and relatives. He is survived by Mrs. Sharpe and two children, G. H. Sharpe, manager of the Bank of British North America, at Fredericton, and Miss Louise W. Sharpe, living at home. Mr. Sharpe was born at Norton fifty-nine years ago. With the exception of a period of five years spent at Toronto, he has lived in St. John for the past thirty years. In disposition he was courteous and humble and his friends could be counted by the hundreds. The funeral will take place on Monday.

CATHOLIC CHURCH BURNED.

BELLEVILLE, Ont., Dec. 17.—St. Michael's church, which was burned here this morning, is the only Roman Catholic church in the city and the members are heart-broken at its loss. When the firemen reached the scene the entire interior of the edifice was in flames. The roof fell shortly afterwards and only the massive stone walls are left.

JAMES CAIE DEAD.

The death of James Caie, one of St. John's best known citizens, occurred at an early hour this morning. The deceased was a son of the late Hon. W. S. Caie, of Kent county and for a number of years carried on a wholesale grocery business in this city. In saving a young man from drowning a couple of years ago Mr. Caie received injuries which eventually caused his death.

**NINE DIE IN BURNING STR.
IN LONG ISLAND SOUND.**

Two Passengers and 7 Sailors of Str. Glen Island Burned to Death or Drowned—Fire Started While They Slept

NEW YORK, Dec. 17.—Nine persons, including two passengers, lost their lives today in the burning of the steamer Glen Island, bound from New York to New Haven. The steamer drifted aground on Captains Island in Long Island Sound and was burned to the water's edge. The vessel left her pier in North River at nine o'clock last night with ten or twelve passengers and a heavy cargo. The fire was discovered before midnight off Execution Point, on the Sound. How it started is not known, but suddenly the whole vessel seemed to become filled with smoke and the electric lights were extinguished. Boats were hurriedly lowered and all put two passengers and seven members of the crew escaped. One of the lost passengers was a man and the other a woman, residents of New York, whose names have not yet been learned. A tug, which sighted the Glen Island, dashed to the scene and picked up the passengers and crew from the small boats. They were placed aboard the steamer Erastus Corning, and brought back to New York. The Glen Island belonged to the Starin Transportation Co. The fire started in the hold at her usual speed when the fire was discovered. It is believed to have started in a dynamo located below and near the centre of the vessel. The passengers were nearly all in the berths when the vessel suddenly became filled with stifling smoke and the lights went out. Captain McAllister sent men

**BRUTALLY MURDERED
DAUGHTER AND SON-IN-LAW.**

Because Daughter Rejected Him For Abusing His Wife, Enraged Italian Stabbed Two Fatally.

WASHINGTON, Pennsylvania, Dec. 16.—Angelo Giardini and his wife are being held at Westland, the result of a murderous assault by the woman's father, Giuseppe Varino. The attack on the father, because he had refused to approve her father for abusing her mother. Varino went to his son-in-law's house and, calling Giardini to the door, stabbed him several times in the breast, one cut going through the left lung. Leaving his victim unconscious, Varino went to his daughter's room, where she was in bed. Seizing her with his left hand, he held her upright and while he plunged the knife three times into her breast, penetrating the pleural cavity. Varino then took to the hills and escaped.

THE CAT CAME BACK.

Turkeys, however, were scarce and were grabbed up at 25 cents per lb.; eggs brought 35 cents per dozen.

SCHOONER SOLD FOR \$250.

The schooner E. A. Lombard, registered in Albert county, was sold on Chubb's corner this morning by R. J. Coughlan, marshal of the admiralty court for the small sum of \$250. The vessel was knocked down to Harry J. Garson, the Hebrew junk dealer. Auctioneer Lantulum sold one first mortgage bond, \$500, bearing interest at five per cent, of the Tobique Valley Railway Co. for \$450. He offered two other properties, but owing to the small bids withdrew them.

GAYNOR-GREENE CASE ARGUED.

LONDON, Dec. 17.—The privy council which yesterday began hearing the appeal of the United States against the decision of the Justice of the crown at Quebec in the case of Greene and Gaynor, adjourned at the conclusion of the arguments today. Judgment will be rendered Dec. 21.

**GENERAL KUROKI
IS ALIVE AGAIN.**

Russian Report is Proven to Be False.

Stoessel Shows Negl. Location of Russian Hospital's So Japanese Will Not Bombard Them.

TOKIO, Dec. 17.—General Stoessel has opened negotiations with the Japanese forces surrounding Port Arthur providing for the protection of the hospitals of the city. He has furnished General Nogi with a map showing the positions of the different hospitals. MOJI, Japan, Dec. 17.—The Japanese transport Marabishi and the hospital ship Rohilla were in collision today off Shimoseki. Both were damaged. The Rohilla was beached and the sick and wounded soldiers were safely landed. SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 17.—Captain P. C. March, of the general staff of the United States army, one of the officers selected by the department to accompany the Japanese army in the field for the purpose of taking military observations, has returned by the liner Mongolia. Captain March brings absolute refutation of the report that General Kuroki was killed by a Russian shell. He says "General Kuroki is said to have been killed on October 5. All the reports agreed as to the date and I am glad to say are mistaken rumors. I was with General Kuroki on that day and every day until I left the front, Oct. 30, when I started for home. Although exposed on numerous occasions, he received no wounds." "He is one of the healthiest men I ever saw. General Kuroki is particularly keen and energetic. He inspires his officers and men with his own enthusiasm and his death would be a serious loss." Capt. March admires the Japanese infantry and brought away with him a wholesome respect for them. "Any nation on earth," he declares, "that undertook to whip Japan would have its hands full."

**GREEKS AND BULGARIANS
KILLING EACH OTHER WHOLESALE**

CONSTANTINOPLE, Dec. 17.—The massacre by Greeks of the wedding party near Monastir, Nov. 23, thirteen persons being killed and five wounded, has led to a number of sanguinary conflicts between Bulgarian and Greek bands, which culminated Thursday last in a stubborn battle, lasting five hours. A Greek band of 25 men and a body of Bulgarians met near the village of Sarakinevo and the Greeks left 24 men killed. Many assassinations of Bulgarians by Albanians have been reported in the Utkub district. The local authorities, as usual, have taken no action in the matter.

**KILLS FATHER TO
SAVE THE FAMILY.**

PORT JARVIS, N. Y., Dec. 16.—To save mother, brothers and sisters from the attacks of a murderous husband and father, John Harder, aged seventeen, sent two charges of buckshot into his father's body last night, killing him instantly. The dead man was the father of twelve children and lived on a small farm near White Mills, Pa. It is said that for the last fifteen years he had been very cruel and abusive. He came home about eight o'clock last night intoxicated and started to put into execution threats he had previously made to kill the entire family. He was armed with a carving knife and pocket knife, which it is said he had recently sharpened for the occasion. Terror-stricken, his wife and children ran in all directions to escape his fury. Some hid about the house, and the mother and other children sought refuge in the barn. The maddened man started for the latter place, and so fearful was John that he would kill them that he sprang from the door with a double barreled gun and sent one charge in his father's back. The man turned around at eight o'clock last night and received a second charge in his right side. He fell to the ground dead.
