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CHILD STRIKERS
PICKET SCHOOL.

Seven Hundred Went Out on Strike.

And Guard Class Rooms With Armed Pickets—Said Teacher Was a Negro.

CHICAGO, Ill., Sept. 30.—Fifty boy pickets, stationed about the McCallister school, Thirty-sixth and Lake streets, prevented pupils from entering today.

Outside the picket cordon a crowd of seven hundred boys and girls hooted and yelled at the teachers looking from the school windows.

It is the second day of the strike, which was called by the "union" boys of the children that Miss Leah Stonebaker, assistant kindergarten teacher, was a negro.

Miss Stonebaker is swarthy, but has not a trace of African blood. She has been greatly embarrassed by the children's mistake.

On the playgrounds yesterday little Josie Baratta attracted excited attention when she leaped "I know stumps; my teacher is a colored woman."

"Are you sure?" asked the children. "Oh, yes," replied Josie, sweetly; "I know."

Then Arthur Block, Sigmund Kaufman and George Costello, acting as a self-appointed committee called upon the boys and girls to strike, and the entire school, seven hundred strong, walked out of the yards, and could not be persuaded by their teachers to return.

The children held a meeting and organized the union, of which John Evans, fourteen years old, No. 2737 Wallace avenue, was elected president.

The school is suffering from a growth among the strikers like a labor leader, posting pickets and cautioning them not to allow the line to be broken by any child or parent.

In the crowd about the school were many parents who have encouraged the strike.

The school is in the stock yards district. The parents of a majority of the children were thrown out of employment by the stock yards strike.

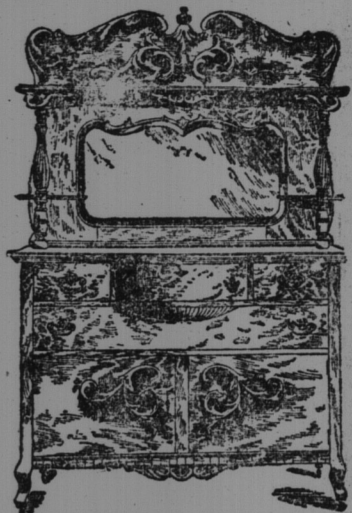
