LAWYERS' LAWS.

The presence of lawyers in the Do-
minion parliament is easily evident in
the fact that so many of the laws made
are capable of half a dozen interpreta-
tions or distortions, and so are fruitful
ground for law suits and appeals.

A notable instance of this is afforded
by the anti-trading stamp bill, passed
just before the close of the recent ses-
sion. The ostensible purpose of the bill
is to prevent the merchants from offer-
ing as an attraction to purchasers, stamps
which, when a certain amount is ac-
cumulated, entitle the holder to some
prize or reward, and so induce people
to buy goods that they do not need
or want for the sake of getting these
premiums.

But the new law as framed will, if
enforced, prevent much more than this
trading stamp evil, if it can be so called,
as will be seen from the following
sections:

(a) The expression "trading stamps"
includes, besides trading stamps com-
monly so-called, any form of cash re-
ceipt, receipt, coupon, premium ticket
or other device, designed or intended to
be given to the purchaser of goods by
the vendor thereof, or his employe or
agent, and to represent a discount on
the price of such goods, or a premium
to the purchaser thereof, which is re-
deemable either

(1) by any person other than the ven-
dor; or,
(2) by the vendor in cash or goods
not his property, or not his exclusive
property; or,
(3) by the vendor elsewhere than in
the premises where such goods are pur-
chased, or which does not show upon
its face the place of its delivery and
the merchantable value thereof, or is
not redeemable at any time.

This clearly provides against the issue-
ing of any premium coupons such as
the manufacturers of soap, cigars, etc.,
often offer, against tickets carrying
with them a cash discount used by
some merchants, and may be used
against newspapers which publish cou-
pons that when clipped out and return-
ed, together with a guess at a simple
puzzle or phrase or something of the
kind put in to arouse interest, give the
sender a chance at a prize.

Probably all this was not intended
by members of parliament who voted
for the bill, but there is the written
law, and all over the country are the
lawyer friends of its framers ready to
make a contention, to prove that you are
violating it or to prove that you are
not.

PEACE NEGOTIATIONS.

If Witte and the Czar are bluffing
they are doing it well. If they are not
the peace conference to open at
Portsmouth, N. H., in a few days will
certainly end without accomplishing
its object.

Japan has given it unmistakably to
be understood that she will surrender
no Russian territory she has seized, and
no Russian territory she has practically
that Russia must pay practically the
whole cost of the war. The Czar em-
phatically declares that he will not
cede a foot of Russian territory nor
pay to Japan a cent of Russian cash.
Clearly there is no common ground
there for negotiation.

But it is hardly credible that having
allowed matters to go this far Russia
will refuse to make peace if her enemy
offers terms which her allies or neu-
trals consider fair. For Russia is clear-
ly beaten and, equally clearly stands to
be beaten more decisively if the war
goes on. The payment of an indemnity,
however great, and even the cession
of territory would not lower her
prestige any more than the capture
of Vladivostok or another defeat.
In March, St. Petersburg des-
patches offer the theory that the pre-
sent government dare not risk increas-
ing its unpopularity with the Russian
people by accepting terms that admit
defeat. But there can be no doubt
that the Russian people want peace
and that nothing would strengthen
their hatred for the bureaucracy more
than its refusal to accept it on fair
conditions.

So the evidence favors the bluff
theory. And though they are doing it
well, a bluff is not very effective when
your opponent knows your hand. Japan
knows she has her enemy in her
power and already has settled sub-
stantially the terms upon which Rus-
sia may purchase peace. If Russia is
not suited with the terms the war will
go on and next year the price will be
raised. Unless the Russians are seized
with the madness sent by the gods to
preclude destruction they may argue
and parley and bluff for a time but
having beaten the Japs down to the
easiest conditions possible, they will
accept them and be thankful they
were no worse.

GET THE WORK DONE.

The contracts for the Loch Lomond
extension provide for the completion of
the work this fall.

The contracts provide that if the con-
tractors are not advancing the work
at a rate which will bring it to an end
within the specified time the city may
demand that more men and apparatus
be employed and, in event of the con-
tractors' refusal to comply, may take
the work out of their hands.

Engineer Harbour, under whose su-
pervision the work is being done, says

it is behind schedule time in several
sections, and, unless extensive addi-
tions are made to the mechanical appli-
ances and the number of laborers, the
extension will not be completed this
year.

For the city's protection from fire
and for the preservation of the citizens'
purses from the present demands of the
fire insurance companies it is necessary
that the work should be completed as
soon as possible. It is the business of
the mayor and the council to see that
it is. If the present contractors will
not provide the conditions necessary
for the completion of the work within
the specified time it will be a matter
for regret; and the work should be com-
pleted. The interests of the whole city
come before those of three or four pri-
vate citizens, however estimable and
deserving they may be.

WON'T SEND COOLIES TO PANAMA.

TOKIO, Aug. 3.—The immigration
companies object to sending laborers
to Panama to work on the canal on the

no allowance of passage money. They
also assert that the drinking water and
sanitary conditions are bad. The gov-

over the Central railway, and that if

ton-Charlton branch of the I. C. R.,
and is giving good satisfaction.
