THE GENIAL FLAME.
Succulent Easy on Open Fireplaces and Gifted Firewoods.

(W. P., in New York Sun.)

One thing in the Portsmouth conference appealed to the dullest; that is their open hearth fires in the face of a driving northeast rainstorm. From cottagers on a cliff dwelling, income seven figures long, all sorts and conditions of men feel the instant power of an open fire against Jupiter's inclemencies. It is a spell, besides, whose power is in society's back lanes and nature's waste places than in the sumptuous, artificial makeup of glassed brick to date. Indeed, there is even more difference—one may push rhetoric so far in the pursuit of comparisons altogether homely—between modern luxury gatherings of the old style fireplace and the same in its pristine quaintness, than between those now classic dairy toys at Versailles and the real pastoral age as we know it for good and all by the Winter's Tale.

Not that in France, of course, they have quite forgotten the pensive smoke of Signora's chimney, they give you a foretaste a small of it in the older ways of Tours, as they kindle your autumnal beech logs with coarse pine cones from the melancholic Landais; great bursts of pine cones, as their kindred Atlantic sort is known in the Cracker reticulate of pine tract Georgia.

The south, in fact, still widely retains both the form and the actual use of genuine old time fireplace, while in the south at large, doubtless Virginia "takes the pace" for open hearth dimensions; whole cordwood lengthwise, and respectively as deep as upper little Jimmy river before he reaches the bligness of yonder mighty River James. For colonial hearths of a proud, cliffed fashion, go rather to the double winged mansions of stately Annapolis. Conservative North Carolina still affords the delightful archaic stone age spectacle of rock fire dogs in lieu of andirons; this locally at least, in those aboriginal districts where they likewise roast rocks to furnace heat and then engineer them into the aperturing vessels for scalding haws with.

As between firewood and firewood, reeking pitch pine stumps most nearly bring Tartarus upward; but seasoned hickory probably ranks all other hardwoods in staying power. White oak,

live oak and porous old black jack, with plenty of rough bark on it, stand uppermost in the oak family; whereas red oak and post oak are of plebeian mediocrity. There is this noteworthy singularity of dogwood fires, where you burn dogwood all by itself, that their subsequent ashes are very like a bed of fine, finest boiled flour, but imponderably lighter.

SCIENCE WITH A LARGE "S."

It was only a generation ago that Charles Darwin announced his theory of a continuous evolution, but now his own son, Prof. Darwin, of Cambridge, in a public address makes known a modification of that theory. He is inclined to doubt whether biologists have been correct in looking for continuous transformation of species, as judging by analogy they should rather expect to find slight continuous changes during a long period, followed by a sudden transformation into a new species, or by rapid extinction. He declares that the mystery of life remains as impenetrable as ever.

Science is obliged to modify its theories and shift its grounds from decade to decade. The recent discovery of radium has upset many of the conclusions which a few years ago it regarded as final. This is perhaps not surprising in view of the fact that the sum of what is known concerning life, as compared with that which is unknown, so small as to be infinitesimal. But science has assumed in later years a tone of authority amounting to a claim of infallibility, and the discovery that its former conclusions were incorrect and that it must form new ones every few years ought to have the effect of making it a little more humble and less arrogant in its attitude toward those outside of its sacred precincts.

DRY MAINE?
The August term of the supreme court reconvened Tuesday forenoon at 11:30 o'clock on the arrival of Justice Savage from his home in Auburn where he has been since the grand jury began its sessions a week ago. Nothing was done during the forenoon with the exception of calling the roll of the traverse jurymen and hearing the report of the grand jury which brought in a long list of indictments said by County Attorney Patten to be in the neighborhood of 250. The indictments were not made public. Judge Savage ordered capias issued in each case. The number of cases reported by the grand jury is larger than has ever been reported previously. Of this number it is supposed that over 200 are for violation of the prohibitory law—Bangor Commercial.
