A NARROW ESCAPE.

Charles McGregor, the druggist, had a very narrow escape from a serious accident on Friday evening last about six o'clock. He had just stepped onto the street and was waiting for a car to pass when Puddington & Merritt's delivery team knocked him down, the horse striking him on the shoulder and the horse and sled passed over him. He was pretty badly shaken up and was taken home on the sled. The only injuries he received were to his right side and arm and a cut on the back of his head. He expects to be out in a few days.

PHOTOGRAPHS WITHOUT LIGHT.

It has recently been found that if sections of wood are placed in contact with a photographic plate and both are kept in absolute darkness a picture of the wood is obtained. These photographs usually show the annual rings of the stem section; sometimes it is the spring growth which is most active on the plate and sometimes it is the denser autumn growth which has the greater effect. The wood of all trees does not show the same degree of activity, some woods being nearly inert; thus the wood of oak or beech is active, that of elm or horse-chestnut comparatively inactive. The wood seems to be the part of the tree which has this peculiar power, since no pictures are given by the bark and stem.

Experiments have shown that it is the resinous principles of the wood which are the effective agents in this phenomenon. The common resins are all active on the photographic plate in the dark, although the true gums, like gum-arabic or cherry gum, are quite inactive. It is also said that if resins dissolved in alcohol are spread on a plate and painted on to paper, the paper will be active on the sensitive plate.

If a section of wood is exposed to bright sunlight for five or ten minutes and then allowed to act on a plate its power is found to be greatly increased. This increase in power persists for several days and even weeks. An artificial light has the same effect to a smaller extent. If the wood is exposed to sunlight which has passed through colored glass instead of to the full white light, the results obtained differ with the different colors. Red light has no activating power on the wood, green light but little, whereas blue light is but little less effective than white light. It is worth noticing that the colors which have the most effect on the photographic plate are the ones which have little or no power to increase the picture-making power of wood.

Mrs. Jones had been for some time a sufferer from cancer, but displayed great fortitude during her long illness. She was born in St. John 64 years ago and was a daughter of the late Rev. Ezekiel McLeod. She leaves four children, Mrs. J. R. Vanwart of Albert street; Miss Mabel Jones and C. W. Jones, living at home, and Mrs. H. A. Webster of Boston. Mrs. Jones is also survived by four brothers, Rev. Dr. Joseph McLeod of Fredericton; George in Wisconsin, and Ezekiel and Albert in Manitoba, and two sisters, Mrs. Mercereau of Rustagorish, and another now residing in Boston. The funeral will be from J. R. Vanwart's Albert street.

TEMPERANCE ADDRESS.

Rev. P. J. Stackhouse delivered an admirable address yesterday afternoon in the Union Hall. The meeting was the usual Sunday afternoon temperance gathering held under the auspices of the W. C. T. U. Mr. Stackhouse repeated the biblical parable of the man who fell among thieves and whom the Samaritan took pity upon, after the priest and Levite had passed along on the other side. The liquor traffic, said Mr. Stackhouse, is a robber, and too many people are adopting the method of the priest and Levite, in letting the question alone, and not doing their utmost to stamp out the evil. If viewed only from a utilitarian standpoint liquor drinking should be condemned. Reports to the labor bureau at Washington showed that out of 7,000 employers to whom inquiries had been made, 4,000 preferred the total abstinence even to the moderate drinker, and 2,000 would not have an employee who was known to drink at all.

MORE IMMIGRANTS

The C. P. R. steamer Lake Champlain arrived here from Liverpool yesterday morning between ten and eleven o'clock. She carried 300 passengers, 100 of whom were steerage passengers—nearly all English. These latter were mostly mechanics and men with trades, bound for Toronto and Montreal. None of these, however, have positions secured in these cities, and it is expected that the majority of them will ultimately drift off farther west. None of the number were detected.

The immigrants are on the whole an exceptionally well dressed and respectable looking class of people. They all have sufficient funds to last them till they get work and are well provided with clothing. A dozen or more of the steerage passengers are located in St. John. The others left by a special train at 7 last evening.

CRUISER WENT DOWN In Two Minutes After Striking A Russian Mine.

Officers and Crew Displayed Splendid Bravery in the Face of Certain Death—Capt. Sluck to His Post.

TOKIO, Feb. 18.—Commander Okuda, second in command of the ill-fated Japanese cruiser Salyen, when a Russian mine sent her to the bottom, has given the first detailed statement of the disaster. His recital, which follows, shows that the officers and crew displayed splendid bravery in the face of death, special instances of patriotic heroism being the rescue of the portraits of the Emperor, Empress and crown prince, and the ship's secret signal book. The commander said:

"The Salyen was in Louisa bay, Nov. 20, co-operating with the army which was then engaged in an attack against the enemy's strongholds on 203 Metre hill. At 2.24 p. m. there was a sudden explosion and almost immediately the ship listed to starboard.

"Capt. Tajima and all of us realized at once that all hope of saving the vessel was lost. The ship had struck one of the enemy's mines. The mine hit below the forward engine room, killing the five men on duty in the forward engine room and three of those in the after engine room.

"The ship made water very fast but our captain remained on the bridge and directed me to take steps to save the crew. As the ship was sinking, I sank down before the captain did. I sank, I advised the captain to take to a boat, but he declined to do so, and remained at his post until death came to him.

"When the ship sank the captain was on the port side of the bridge and I on the starboard side, and as the ship listed to starboard I must have gone down before the captain did. I sank very deep, but fortunately gained the surface and caught hold of a hammock, which kept me afloat until I was picked up.

"While in the water I did not feel the cold, which was very intense, but was chilled when lifted aboard the vessel which picked me up. Of the rescued, five died from exposure. Only two minutes elapsed between the explosion and the sinking, but I am glad to say that no confusion of any kind occurred.

"Our only thought was for the safety of our ship, but when that hope was gone we determined to save the portraits of Their Majesties and the crown prince. Navigating Lieut. Nashimoto went into the cabin and with difficulty succeeded in bringing out the Emperor's picture and, entrusting it to the keeping of Chief Signalsman Yamaguchi, again went below to recover the other two.

"The ship was then fast filling, but Nashimoto succeeded in getting them out, and regaining the deck, sprang into the sea just as the ship went down.

"Previously Nashimoto had instructed Engineer Tame to save and preserve the signal book. Tame being the nearest man available. The signal book was already well under water, but Tame, knowing its value, dove into the flooded room and brought the book to the surface.

"It was due to the valor of our comrades ships that 12 officers, 6 warrant officers and 140 men were rescued. Capt. Tajima and 30 others were lost.

"As the ship went down, our thoughts were for the captain and our men cried out, 'Captain, captain, where are you?' but the rollings of the sea was the only response."
