### MR. SKINNER'S REPLY.

To Report on Fire Escapes at Opera House.  
In reply to the report of Chief Kerr and Director Wisely on the Improve ments made at the York Theatre and Opera House for safety of patrons in case of fire, A. O. Skinner has written the following letter:  
Robt. Wisely and John Kerr: Gentlemen—I received your copy of report in regard to the Opera House, and I beg to say that the alterations at the Opera House would have been carried out as understood between you and the directors if your inspector, Mr. Maher, had not told us that it would not be wise to put up fire escapes, which we did, after submitting the plans to him, which he approved. In your report you state that the windows would have to be smashed out in order to use the fire escapes. I beg to say that the windows all hold on pulleys, the same as any windows leading to fire escapes. You also report that the ladder from escapes was hoisted off the ground. This is only so when we are getting scenery along the passageway, and then the ladder is lowered to the ground. As this ladder is only six feet long, you will see it is not much difference whether it is up or down, as no doubt you are very few would use it, I preferring to jump the six feet. Now, I beg to say we will be glad to put in windows where you suggest and put stairs or fire escapes from them, which ever you may order, but must be assured of the approval of the inspector before we start to work.
