THE SUMMER EXODUS.

The churches are half deserted and the Sunday schools have more vacant seats than full ones these days. It is worse this year than last and last year was worse than the year before, clergymen and Sunday school teachers say.

This summer exodus is only a fad, many declare; it may be a necessity in some cities where to stay in the seven times heated streets means suffering and, maybe, death. But the summer weather in St. John is more comfortable and healthier than it is ten miles outside and what other reasons exist for the migration are not sufficient to cause people to persist in the trouble and expense of moving out of town. Still, there are the starting facts that the migration is growing, that few families who spend one summer in the country spend the next in town, unless forced to, and that every summer sees new cottages going up along the beautiful and so easily accessible shores of the St. John and Kennebec rivers. These are not the symptoms of a fad but of something very apt to become a settled custom. Also there is more reason for it than the weather.

The city is attractive but it does not satisfy like the places God made. In nearly everybody there is a hankering for the wide out-of-doors, where the air is sweet and unadulterated and the trees grow uncramped by brick walls and you can walk on soft, fragrant, green stuff instead of asphalt. Few there are whose blood heredity has not charged with something from his forest or plain dwelling forbears, away back when there were no cities.

This and the realization of every parent that the city is no place for children, idle in the school holiday, are the chief reasons why more of those who can by hook or crook afford it are pouring every year from the streets to the shady, scented lanes. In St. John the lack of one moving motive so strong in other cities—the intolerable heat—is compensated by the great accessibility and attractiveness of the places open to summer suburbanites.

Within from five to twenty minutes of St. John are spots unexcelled anywhere for beauty of scenery and the pleasures of river and field and wood which they offer, and such is the cheapness of living there and of travelling to and fro that they are open to people of very moderate incomes for whom, if they lived in the majority of cities, country life would be an impossibility.

So it is apparently a permanent condition which those who are preaching to half-empty pews these summer Sundays must face. And it is a condition which does not promise well for the churches containing those pews. Already there are too many churches for the church contributing people of St. John and many have difficulty in making ends meet. A falling off in attendance makes it difficult greater. The majority of the clergy believe that the condition is threatening in a spiritual sense also. They say that this three months absence from church has weakened the religion of many once devout members of their congregations, has made them careless regarding attendance at church when they return to the city and, what is even more dangerous, has inculcated careless Sunday habits and an indifference to religious matters among the young.

The summer falling off in congregations is comparatively unimportant—the city would be no worse off with fewer churches—but if the other result is correctly judged the problem before those whose desire it is to increase Christian religion is a serious one. Since they cannot prevent the migration they must meet it in other ways, in their wanderings those of their flocks whose religion is dependent upon forms and ceremonies must be coddled by constant instruction.

Fortunately for the churches the religion that thrives only under stained glass and fades in the sunlight is not the religion of all. It is strange that it should be of any, strange that one should be devout in a house he built himself and not be more so in God's own house where:

"The blue sky is His ceiling,
"The grass the soft green carpet for His feet."

MILITARY CONVICTS' DARING ESCAPE.

SPOKANE, Washington, July 24.—Five military convicts have escaped from the guard house at Fort Wright. All of them were men sent to the fort to serve sentences for desertion of other army posts. The names of the men are, Frank Burton, Joseph Carroll, James Collingwood, Herman W. Lamp and Harry Linden.

The outbreak was one of the most daring ever attempted at Fort Wright. With the whole post out of doors enjoying the cool evening air and from six to ten guards in an adjoining room, the five desperate men saved their way through two iron bars three quarters thick and escaped through a window.

SEISMOGRAPHS REPORT GREAT EARTHQUAKE; NO NEWS YET.

NEW YORK, July 24.—A Vienna dispatch to the World says that one of the most violent earthquakes ever known was indicated by the seismographs of the hydrographic instruments at Lajochan Amplex yesterday. Between 3.55 and 4.17 a. m., the instruments showed extraordinary movements in waves signifying an earthquake catastrophe at a distance of 6,000 kilometers (about 3,700 miles) at 7 a. m. The instruments were still vibrating. The distance indicated by the seismographs would locate the earthquake in Central Asia (the most probable point) or in mid Atlantic or in the Arctic regions, or in South Africa.

THE DEADLY AUTOMOBILE.

CHICAGO, July 24.—The Tribune today says—Seven persons killed and 44 injured in the recent auto accidents for this year by the automobilists in Chicago. Although the year is but little more than half over, the figures show an appalling increase over last year's record of one killed and 72 injured.
