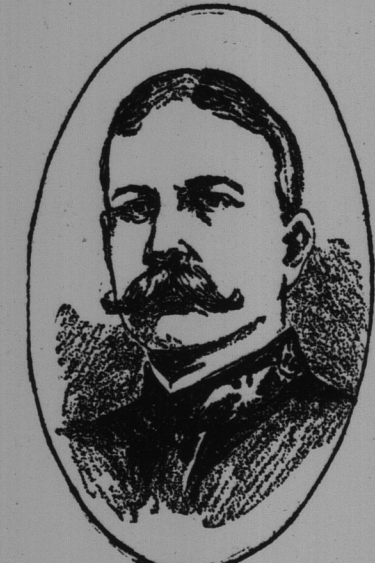

JAPAN MAY ASK A BILLION DOLLARS. Indemnity Must Cover Whole Cost of War.

Russia Will Absolutely Refuse to Discuss
Viadrivostok—Japs Will Demand the
Surrender of Sakhalin.

WASHINGTON, July 26.—Whether there is to be peace in the Far East or a continuance of the war will practically be decided at the first business meeting of the Washington conference which will convene at the navy yard, Portsmouth, N. H., about August 6. Baren Komura will on that occasion communicate to M. Witte the essentials of Japan's peace terms for further negotiations. This, it is declared, will not be done in a spirit of defiance, indeed, there are many evidences in the possession of the neutral governments that Japan is coming to the Washington conference, not imbued with a desire to humiliate Russia, but only to exact terms which will insure a lasting peace in the Far East, and which will in a measure compensate Japan for the financial losses in the present conflict.

It is known that Japan will demand an indemnity that will approximately cover the cost of the war to date. This was communicated to Russia early in the preliminary negotiations. The amount is still a secret, but it is based upon the most careful estimates of the war and will be accompanied by a more or less detailed statement showing the method by which the final figures were computed. It will not fall far short of one billion dollars, according to advice reaching here from well posted sources. Besides the indemnity it is believed Japan's other essentials to the continuance of negotiations are the cessation of Japan of Sakhalin, of the Liaotung peninsula, and of the railway as far as Harbin; the recognition of Japan's predominance in Korea, and the return of Manchuria to China.

As for subjects remaining to be discussed, a tedious one, it is believed, and one which Russia will be disposed to negotiate with the greatest caution, is the programme for the restoration of Manchuria to Chinese control. Because of the confusion and general disorder likely to ensue in the province after the withdrawal of the foreign armies, Japan believes that a certain time will be required in which to restore public order and to establish a regular system of Chinese police administration. During the period Japan will insist that she remain in control of the administration of the province.

at the same time giving a definite pledge finally to evacuate as soon as China shall be in a position to take up the reins of government there and maintain order.

A second subject for the plenipotentiaries to settle will be the surrender of all Russian ships now interned in neutral ports. Some officials are inclined to believe that this demand will form one of the "essentials," while others claim ground for believing that Russia may induce Japan to take these in part payment of the indemnity. Europe believes Japan will demand the neutralization of Viadrivostok. In official circles here the statement is made without hesitation that such a demand would not be "moderate" or "reasonable," and it is known that Russia will not permit the subject of Viadrivostok to come before the conference. Rather than submit to Japan's dictation on this point Russia has let it be known that she would certainly continue the war.

Little progress has been made in the direction of an armistice. Japan has, in the most determined manner, indicated its unwillingness to consent to an armistice until her plenipotentiaries have met the Russians in the conference room. The object of this, it is now explained in an authoritative quarter, is because Japan wishes to be assured that Russia is prepared to negotiate in seriousness for peace before the Japanese plenipotentiaries yield any of their ground in the field or give of the Russians time to increase their forces at the front.

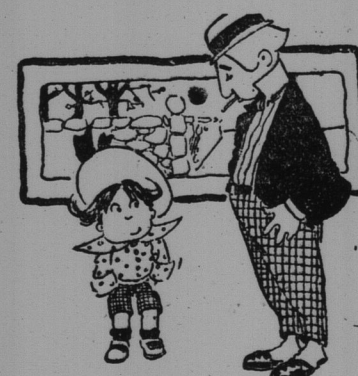

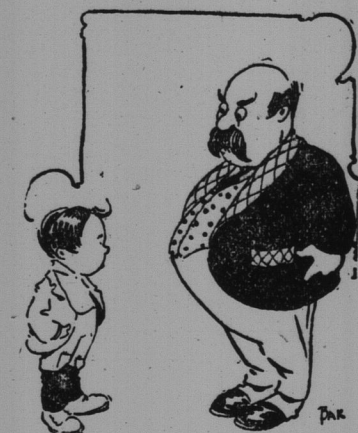

N. B. DENTIST SUED A KING.

Dr. McLean of Cambridge Relates Some Peculiar Incidents of His Dental Practice in West Africa.

Dr. E. G. MacLean, who enjoys the distinction of being the first qualified dentist to penetrate the miasmatic wilds of the west coast of South Africa, arrived in the city yesterday and is a guest at the Royal Hotel.

Dr. MacLean is a New Brunswick boy, having been born at Cambridge, Queens county, and after three years of roving adventure, which have not been without profit, decided to pay a visit to the land of his birth.

Dr. MacLean has not been troubled with much competition in his line during his residence in Africa. One or two quacks have been there, but he is the first qualified dental practitioner that ever visited the west coast. During the three years he has spent there Dr. MacLean has practiced in the city of Sierra Leone, the gold coast towns of Axim, Sekondi, Cape Coast and Accra, and the city of Lagos in the colony of the same name, spending a few months in each place. In the course of his practice Dr. MacLean ministered to the molar ailments of a native king, who gave him considerable work, but who had to be sued for the amount of his bill.

On another occasion a native chief came to his office seeking relief from the toothache, bringing with him about twenty retainers of varying rank and dignity, who ranged themselves outside the door of the operating room until the offending tooth was removed.

Dr. MacLean says the climate is the worst imaginable, but he gets very high prices for his work, and intends returning in about two months, during which time he will visit his friends in this province and possibly take a trip out west.

FEAR EARLY CLOSING OF FAIRVILLE MILLS.

Some of the Fairville farmers have already finished haying, but the majority of them are just beginning. The crops in that vicinity will be good. Final arrangements for the annual Sunday school picnic were made last evening. It will be held at Westfield Beach and not at Watters' Landing as previously stated.

The pulp mill company will erect a small saw mill on the site of the old saw mill which was destroyed by fire. The pulp wood will be sawn into proper lengths and barked ready for the other mill.

There has been considerable talk among the employees of the different mills to the effect that many of them will close down this year much earlier than usual. The reason for this is the scarcity of lumber. It is said that Baker's mill will close down next week, while Cushing's have only their box mill logs left. If these rumors prove true it will mean a serious loss to many of the citizens of Fairville, who have hitherto found work in the mills until late in the season.
