FEAR IN HALIFAX.
Halifax newspaper are striving clamorously to awaken the worthy but somewhat somnolent citizens of that pleasant but rather out-of-date town to a sense of the awful peril overhanging them.

Sir Wilfrid's pray-heaven-it-may-not-be-too-late pose when he introduced the Grand Trunk Pacific bill was calm and confident when compared with the attitude of those journals in the face of present reports concerning the construction of that road.

The idea that the Grand Trunk Pacific may use the I. C. R. or may come down the St. John valley route through them into distressing fits of panic, though why, it is difficult to understand since under any condition the road is bound to come to Moncton, whose distance from Halifax will be the same no matter what route the line takes before reaching there.

The Acadia Recorder especially takes the matter very seriously and daily sounds clarion notes of incoherent alarm and exhortation. A recent editorial on the subject is headed, "The Lost Hope of Nova Scotia." Its tenor, somewhat vaguely expressed is to the effect that some vile plot is on foot to defraud and ruin Nova Scotia in general and Halifax in particular in the interest of some out of the way and undeserving hole by the name of St. John and its evident purpose is to galvanize its native city into a semblance of life before the horrid conspiracy is consummated.

"Do not let Halifax rest on its oars," it cries. "Do not let Halifax wait too long till we wake up and find we have lost the prize package, that somebody has stolen it from us." "We do not need to wait for Engineer Lumsden's report," it insists. "The interim report gives all the data necessary. It disproves entirely Senator Power's, Senator MacKeen's and Senator Black's pessimistic utterances. That report has been wrongly used. Even Engineer Butler's full statement has not been used fairly—we say this advisedly and in the course of our editorial articles on the subject we shall show, as we started out by saying, that these senatorial remarks were not only ill-timed, ill-considered, but unsupported. More on this aspect we shall not say this evening than this—Halifax, get a hustle on! Move! Get the Board of Trade in other parts of the province to move! The Transportation Commissioners have in as plain words as any would wish to have dinned into their ears, told us we are sleeping while others are awake, are alive to their interests. Unless we are alive we shall rue the day."

Disturbed by all this clamor, like one awakened from a night-mare with a sense of terrible danger but a confused idea of the way of escape, some Halifaxians have been striking out in a rather uncertain fashion but with good intent. For instance, the board of trade and city council have sent a request to General Manager Hays to get him to continue the line from Moncton to Halifax, paralleling the I. C. R. all the way. Of course General Manager Hays is not concerned with the building of the eastern section of the G. T. P. and if he were he would equally of course do no such foolish thing as to build it a hundred miles or so longer than was necessary to reach tide-water; but the fact that any action at all, however wide of the purpose, came from such a source must be encouraging to those who have been applying the galvanic current.

A more sensible suggestion than this is that if the G. T. P. should adopt the St. John valley route, all the Nova Scotia members should resign. That is a good idea without a doubt. For, granted that the diversion of the road would injure the province, the benefit that would accrue from the permanent retirement of the eighteen present representatives in parliament would more than compensate.

A good solution of the problem—which apparently has not yet suggested itself either to the papers or the people—would be to get Halifax shifted a little nearer the source of traffic. Or, even better than that; why could not the citizens move to St. John?

FRENCH LIBERAL DOCTRINE.
Dominique Monot, formerly a Liberal member of parliament and now a member of the Quebec legislature, made a speech the other day at a Rhode Island picnic—it is briefly reported in another column—in which he hopefully predicted either annexation or independence for Canada in a few years.

A week or so ago Admand Lavergne, Liberal M. P. and intimate friend of Laurier had an article in Le Nationalist of similar tone, though with more emphasis on independence than annexation.

"These men are leaders of the younger French Canadians, the element which is growing every day stronger in the councils of the government, the element at whose bidding the shackles of sectionalism were riveted on the Northwest provinces."

The aldermen of the Safety Board, in their generosity and appreciation of good work done, have recommended an increase of pay for the Chief of Police, to begin when the Liberal government at Fredericton hands over to the city council the power of appointing the holder of that important office—which will be about the time of the kaleidoscope of Greece. The reserve of the aldermen in this matter is strikingly reminiscent of the cautious lady who gave her daughter permission to go out and swim on condition that her clothes should be hung on a hickory limb and that the maiden herself should not go near the water.

MR. McBRIDE NOW SAFE.
Mr. McBride's administration in British Columbia now sees clear sky ahead. After a long experience of coalitions the province started out under Mr. McBride with a straight conservative administration. Premier McBride could not after the last election claim a clear majority, as two independent members held the balance of power. But he has until now been able to carry his measures and defeat motions of want of confidence. All attempts of the liberal opposition to gain seats in by-elections have failed, and now the government has captured a seat hitherto held by the opposition. For this the Laurier government is in part responsible, as the previous member for Albert had been made chief commissioner for the Yukon. Conservative federal patronage wrecked several conservative provincial administrations between 1887 and 1898. Since the latter date the patronage of the Laurier government has had a share in destroying administrations of the same party in Ontario and Manitoba, and did some damage to Mr. Parent in Quebec—Sun.

Mr. Nichols has been travelling through the west for the past three weeks, and is greatly impressed with the possibilities of that great country, so much so in fact that he has decided to locate out there. Mr. Nichols visited Winnipeg, Calgary, Edmonton and Regina, but has not finally decided in which of those places he will receive his brother, Frank, who will continue in practice at Digby.

While coming up the harbor yesterday morning the schooner Alba, Capt. Newcomb, ran ashore on the foreshore ground below the Ballast wharf and filled with water. She was pulled off and towed up to the wharf. Otherwise she would have been full of water the Alba was undamaged.

The wedding took place on Wednesday, July 27, of Herbert King of Fredericton, N. B., and Miss Mary B. Ellis of Old Town, Maine, formerly of St. John, N. B. The bride was becomingly attired in blue silk and wore a white chiffon hat with a white ostrich feather. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. Father Frudell of St. Joseph's church, Old Town. After the ceremony Mr. and Mrs. King left for Fredericton, where they will reside.

Several members of the staff of the Savings Bank are rejoicing over an increase in salary. Messrs. Sanction, Cowan, Ewin, Blaine and Lawson have received one hundred and fifty dollars each.

The funeral of the late Mrs. Catherine E. McPeters of St. John, N. B., who died at Sussex last Saturday morning, was held this afternoon at 2.30 o'clock from the residence of her daughter, Mrs. H. H. Dryden, in the interment being at Kirk Hill cemetery. Rev. Mr. Camp conducted the services.

The lecture on temperance given by Mr. Wightman, permanent secretary of the Sons of Temperance in England, at the Church of England Institute last night was greatly enjoyed by those who had the good fortune to be present. At the conclusion a vote of thanks was accorded to the speaker, C. E. Everett being the mover.

One of the morning papers today had an account of the finding of \$100 in a sack of oats by a farmer of Belleisle Bay. These oats were purchased by W. A.
