NEGRO WHO KILLED WAS LYNCHED. Murderous Stowaway of Schr. Olympia Meets Death. Hanged to Veranda of the Woman Who Escaped the Slaughter and Told the Tale.

NEW YORK, July 14.—A New Orleans despatch to the Times says: From Mobile late tonight (Thursday) came the news from Honduras via the Norwegian steamship Condor, that Robert McGill, the Honduras, who murdered 11 persons on the English schooner Olympia, was lynched at Utilia, Honduras, the night after the gunboat Tatumbla surrendered him to the civil authorities there, and six hours after the departure of the ship which brought the first news of his crime.

SYDNEY TO MONTREAL IN 22 1-2 HOURS; A NEW RECORD. Mail Train Averaged 43.6 Miles Per Hour—Still Montreal People Claim the St. Lawrence Route is the Faster.

MONTREAL, Que., July 14.—The special train from North Sydney with the Allan Line's Virginia's English mail on board arrived at the Grand Trunk station at 4:23 o'clock this morning having made the run from Canada's eastern-most seaport to Montreal, a rail distance of 381 miles, in 22 hours and 33 minutes actual running time.

KING OSCAR TELLS WOES TO KAISER. German-Swedish Alliance is a Possibility. Two Kings Had Long Talk Over Situation But Refuse to Say What Conclusion They Reached.

BERLIN, July 14.—The substance of the statement made at Stockholm is to the effect that a German-Swedish alliance was seriously contemplated and submitted to the foreign office today. The authoritative statement was made that the question of alliance between Germany and Sweden had never come before the foreign office nor had it been discussed to the slightest extent.

WITTE NOW CONTROLS RUSSIAN CABINET; PRINCE MIRSKY MAY RETURN.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 14.—M. Witte's appointment as chief of the Russian peace plenipotentiary was announced today in the official messenger in the following words: "Owing to the serious illness which overtook M. Muraviev on his arrival in St. Petersburg, which made it impossible for him to familiarize himself at short notice with the considerable material connected with the negotiations, his majesty the emperor has been pleased to appoint president of the committee of ministers Witte to the post of chief plenipotentiary."

SEPARATE SCHOOLS IN U. S. Catholics Will Establish and Maintain System of Free Sectarian Schools all Over the Country.

NEW YORK, July 14.—The Tribune says: Before the close of the annual meeting of the Roman Catholic Educational association yesterday the foundation of a free Catholic school system throughout the United States was laid. The plan under which the system is to be inaugurated need only the approval of the American hierarchy, headed by Cardinal Gibbons, and if the offer of the colleges is accepted a system of secondary education extending throughout the land will be established representing an endowment of not less than \$2,500,000.

SCHOONER QUARANTINED. Winnie Laurie Which Brought Smallpox to St. Martins is Here—Patient in Isolation Hospital.

The British schooner Winnie Laurie, Captain Gibson, bound from Tyne-mouth, Creek to New York, arrived here yesterday. At four o'clock this morning the ambulance brought from St. Martin's Henry Harvey, the cook of the Winnie Laurie, who is suffering from smallpox. Harvey, who is 25 years of age, has been placed in the isolation hospital, where he was examined by Dr. Ellis, who pronounced the attack to be of a very mild description.

GLD FRACTURE IN MESSENGER BOYS HEAD RE-OPENED.

On enquiry at the hospital this morning the Star was informed that the Western Union messenger boy, Herbert Pico, who was pitched off his bicycle yesterday morning on Prince William street, is resting easily. When young Pico met with a similar accident last year, it was found necessary to remove some of the bone at the top of his head, and a silver plate was placed there.

CONSPIRACY TO DEFRAUD. (Special to the Star.) MONTREAL, Que., July 14.—A conspiracy among the employes and ex-employes of the Richelieu and Ontario Navigation Co. has just been discovered.

The funeral of the late Mrs. Mary P. O'Connor took place this afternoon at 2.30, from 164 Brittain street. The service was conducted by the Rev. Father Chapman in the Church of St. John the Baptist. Interment in new Catholic cemetery.

MURDERED WOMAN KNOWN; HER HUSBAND SUSPECTED.

BROCKTON, MASS., July 14.—It is now definitely known that the woman murdered in Belmont and whose body was found yesterday was Emmanuelle Schidlosska, the wife of a Pole who was employed in a barber shop in Braintree, Mass. The police are searching for Schidlosska, who is missing and who is believed to be on his way to California. The couple resided here, Schidlosska is 23 years of age and his wife was 32 years old. Charles Greelish of Braintree, who employed the man, says the last he saw of Schidlosska was on Saturday night last when the latter bade goodbye to his employer and told him that he was going to California within a few days. Several persons who knew him, however, saw Schidlosska board a Boston bound train at Brockton on Tuesday afternoon.
