SUBWAY CLAIMS TWO MORE.
NEW YORK, March 30.—Freeman Samuel Lillie was killed and several other firemen were injured by a cave-in in the subway at the 184th street station which was burned yesterday. Lillie and four others had been sent into the tunnel to wet down the smoldering embers of the fire, when a rock fell from the roof and crushed Lillie. The others were only slightly hurt.

The fire in the subway was still burning today, but was under control. It extended into the tunnel several hundred feet from the 184th street station. All night the timbers supporting the ceiling gave way and there were heavy falls of masonry at intervals.

PITTSBURGH, March 30.—Michael Novakovich, an American laborer, was murdered by his wife at his home while he lay asleep early today. The woman used a hatchet. The crime was discovered by a boarder, who notified the police. The woman and seventeen foreigners were arrested and locked up in the Penn Avenue station, where the police later obtained a confession from Mrs. Novakovich. The motive of the crime is not known.

QUEBEC, March 30.—The preliminary survey of the Grand Trunk Pacific on the section from Levis to Edmundston, N. B., is now completed and every thing in readiness for location work to be begun shortly. The route has been found to be most advantageous and the necessary grade of four-tenths to the mile attained.

TORPEDO BOAT TRIAL.
SEATTLE, Wash., March 30.—Torpedo boat destroyer Goldsborough made an average of 25 knots on its final trial today in Elliott Bay. On the fifth lap of the mile course the craft made 23.4 knots for a half mile, but she failed to keep it up. From the report of the trial board there is little hope that the Goldsborough ever will be able to develop an average of more than 25 knots.

VALUABLE FOSSIL FOUND.
BERKELEY, California, March 30.—A valuable fossil ichthyosaurian recently discovered in the middle triassic limestones of Nevada, is announced in a new geological bulletin from University Press. It shows the anterior half of the vertebral column, one side of the pectoral arch complete, the first two segments of a pectoral limb and nearly the entire skull. It is said that the type of limb in the present specimen is more primitive than any yet discovered.
