THE PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT.
Some people who claim to be observ-
ers of the signs in provincial politics,
expect a general provincial election
this year. It is not easy to find any
reason for such an appeal to the gov-
ernment unless a reorganization of the
government is contemplated. The legisla-
ture has two years to run after next
February.

Occasionally it is suggested that Mr.
Tweedie will be appointed to the
bench and that the attorney general
will succeed to the leadership. As
against this there is the fact that the
supreme court is complete, and that all
the judges of that bench are in good
health. Mr. Tweedie could not be
thrust into the supreme court until
there is room for him. There is a
county court available, but it is not
supposed that such an appointment
would satisfy Mr. Tweedie's aspira-
tions. Unless some position other than
one on the bench is open to Mr. Twee-
die we need not expect him to retire
from the one he has. He is not un-
mindful of his own interests. This
truth Mr. Blair discovered some five
years ago, and used the knowledge
for their mutual advantage.

If Mr. Tweedie remains only the
other reorganization that would be
noticed is the retirement of the attorney
general. It does not matter much
how the other members of the admin-
istration come and go. Few in the
province could give the full list of
provincial ministers if they were asked.
All know that there are too many
of them, that they claim travelling ex-
penses, indicating that they are con-
tinually on costly expeditions, and that
most of their time is given to other
matters than their public duties.

It is not likely that Dr. Pugsley will
go out. The attorney general finds of-
fice a bonanza. He is just learning
how to work that mine of wealth.
When he began he was content with
two or three times his nominal salary.
Now he gathers in one way or another
five times the nominal salary of the
attorney general. His ingenuity is not
yet exhausted. This year we may ex-
pect Dr. Pugsley to cost the country
\$12,000, next year \$15,000. There is no
limit except the limit of the credit of
the province.

The attorney general need not be
expected to resign. There is no office
in the gift of any government on this
continent which will better his con-
dition.

MANCHURIA.
Today's news from Portsmouth is
hopeful. The question of Manchuria
appears to be out of the controversy.
Russia gives up everything there, ex-
cept the privilege of proceeding by
rail to Vladivostok through a por-
tion which shortens the dis-
tance. The railway from Harbin to
Daly and Port Arthur goes to China.
With the terminals it cost some \$120,-
000,000, all paid by the Russian govern-
ment. It is possible that China may
pay a large part of this price, not to
Russia but to Japan. That is one way
of collecting indemnity. Daly is a
good port, but it was better before the
Russians tried to destroy the piers and
dock, when they left the place.

Japan promises to withdraw from
Manchuria altogether and at once af-
ter peace is made. But it is doubtful
whether China alone will be able to
govern the province, or whether the
Chinese Government as now constitu-
ted will be equal to the task of op-
erating the railway. In case peace
should be made on these terms China
would need some tutelage. It is sus-
pected that Japan considers herself
the best schoolmaster for the Mongo-
lian race. That is the yellow peril as
it now presents itself.

The Grand Trunk Pacific Company
is asking for tenders for the Lake
Superior branch of the railway. This
is the road which diverts traffic from
the alleged main line and takes it to
Lake Superior and Portland, Maine.
It is expected that the Lake Superior
connection will be completed next year,
and the government is invited to
build the main line eastward far
enough to allow the branch to be used.
The remainder of the eastern section
does not trouble the Grand Trunk
people.

Marshall Field, of Chicago, is said to
be the largest municipal taxpayer in
the world. He pays city taxes on an
assessment of \$73,000,000, or three times
the total assessed valuation of the prop-
erty in the city of St. John. Besides
he is a large taxpayer in other cities
and states. Mr. Field is commonly
supposed to be worth \$150,000,000. He
made his money in the dry goods trade
and industry and in real estate invest-
ments.

Russell Sage is eighty-nine and says
that he expects to live to be one hun-
dred. There is another broker who
looks at things in a stock jobbing way.
He does not see why death should wait
for Russell Sage to reach par when
he can have him at eight-line.

There will be no new wharves at
Sand Point for the coming winter busi-
ness. But the C. P. R. has access to
eastern St. John and may easily annex
the Long Wharf. The intercolonial
seems to be able to spare it and the
steamer too.

POOR ST. JOHN!
The most unkind cut of all has been
given the city of St. John by the Tor-
onto Globe. The other day that large
and influential newspaper issued a
special edition beautifully illustrated
and printed on heavy paper. In a brief
paragraph devoted to New Brunswick
the Globe has this to say of the metrop-
olis of this province:

"St. John's will be found a city well
worthy of a visit—not only for its own
attractions, but also as a convenience
as a centre from which to take short
excursions to the many charming
places in its immediate vicinity. Point
de Chene, two miles below, is the deep
water terminus and port of shipment."
After all the work of the Tourist As-
sociation, the Board of Trade, and
goodness knows how many more agen-
cies, all of which have combined to ad-
vertise the city as the winter port of
Canada—that a leading paper should
make such a statement as the forego-
ing, must be heart-breaking to St. John!
But just like as not this is one of the
results of voting against Mr. Emmor-
son, who knows—Summerside Journal.

Senchulitch, the eminent Polish
novelist, is under the care of the
police. He has been protesting against
the charges which the government of
Russia is making in the school system
of Poland. St. Petersburg does not
mind the great author's reflections on
Nero, but when he attacks Nicholas it
asks "Quo Vadis!"

It is still declared by Russia, that
she will never consent to pay any in-
demnities to Japan. But M. Witte says
that he has already yielded seven
points on his own responsibility, and
intimates that no other Russian would
have done so. He is not the first party
who, swearing he would never consent,
consented.

The forest fire are doing some good.
Even a small allowance of smoke is
said to modify the effects of frost on
the green crops.

UNIVERSITY APPOINTMENT.
It will be seen by the statements
printed elsewhere that an appointment
has been made to the position of dean
of the engineering school of the Uni-
versity of New Brunswick. Professor
Perrott comes with high testimonials,
both from the university of which he
is an alumnus and from the contract-
ing firms with which he has been en-
gaged as a practical engineer. He is a
graduate in the arts and science de-
partments of the other Russian univer-
sity from which university our own
institution has on several pre-
vious occasions obtained teachers of
marked ability and conspicuous
scholarship. It was desirable that the
head of the engineering school should
be a man of practical knowledge and
experience in engineering work. As
Professor Perrott has been for some
seven years in practice as a civil en-
gineer in construction work he should
meet that condition.—Sun.
