CABINET WILL BE ANNOUNCED DEC. 11  
Irish Nationalists Take a Strong Stand.

Will Support No Government or Party Not Upholding the Policy of Home Rule For Ireland.

LONDON, Dec. 6.—The appointment of Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman as premier is accompanied by the removal of a curious anomaly in English court ceremonies. A royal order was gazetted tonight authorizing that the "premier shall in future have place and precedence next after the Archbishop of York.

Hitherto in court and state ceremonies the premier was not recognized, and only took rank by virtue of his membership in the privy council. Thus he was preceded by several of his ministers.

The following official announcement was made tonight: Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman informed King Edward that he would be unable to submit his prepared arrangement in connection with the formation of a new government until December 11. King Edward left London this afternoon to visit Lord Allington at Crickel Wharfe.

WHAT MRS. HUBBARD FOUND IN LABRADOR.

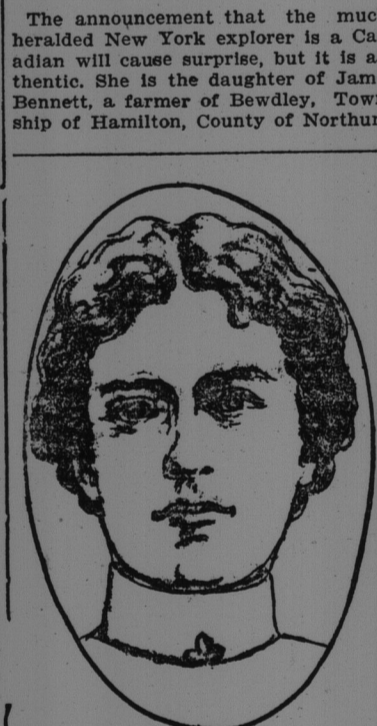
Some Sensational Matter in the Book She is Preparing—Gold Find Reported—She is a Canadian
