CROWD PRAYED AS BOY DROWNED.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Sept. 11.—For Egan, Jr., sixteen years of age, son of a Philadelphia family living here for the summer, was drowned yesterday in the surf. He was taking his farewell dip, as the family was to leave tomorrow. The efforts to reach and save the boy were watched by thousands from the boardwalk and created the greatest excitement and many women wept and others became hysterical when it was seen the life guards had to give up.

While the crowd was still commenting on the accident the boy's father while looking for him heard what had taken place. He collapsed on the beach from an attack of the heart. He has not yet recovered consciousness, and is very ill. Three months ago he lost a daughter.

During the efforts of the life guards to reach the boy battling with the waves a white haired man dropped on his knees on the board walk and began to pray, an example that was followed by many near him.

The boy was a strong swimmer and was the wonder of the beach. He seemed as much at home in the water as ashore. He could swim almost as long and steadily as a life guard and could travel as fast as most of them. He was constantly with them and was a great favorite.

SCHOONER WRECKED, CREW DROWNED.

TACOMA, Wash., Sept. 12.—A despatch from Valdez says that a three masted schooner is ashore about three miles from Kakagrage Bay, Alaska. Her name was not visible but a bill for goods was found made out to the schooner Prosper. The wrecked vessel is apparently of foreign build, but answers the description of the San Francisco vessel of that name.

Four bodies have been washed ashore. One is that of George Fanning but the others are unknown. The steamer Excelsior brought the news to Valdez and wired to Sitka for the assistance of the revenue cutter.

ANOTHER CRISIS IN HUNGARY.

VIENNA, Sept. 12.—All hope of peace between Hungary and the United Kingdom in the Hungarian diet, seems to have come to an end. It is understood that Emperor Francis Joseph, who was at first apparently inclined to acquiesce in the plan of the Hungarian ministers for the granting of universal suffrage as one way of bringing about the defeat of the United Kingdom, has been induced to change his mind by the Austrian ministers, who feared the effect on political conditions in Austria if universal suffrage should be granted to the Hungarian people. It is not considered likely that Premier Fejervary's consultation with his colleagues will lead to any modification of the Hungarian ministerial programme, and it is thought that at the audience tomorrow the Emperor will reject the idea of universal suffrage and that the Fejervary cabinet will resign.

NEW YORK LIFE EXPOSED

NEW YORK, Sept. 12.—Selling \$300,000 in bonds in one day and buying them back the next but one, a holiday intervening, in order to keep within statements made in the New York Life Insurance Company's report to the superintendent of insurance, was the sensational disclosure made today at the session of the legislative insurance investigation committee. The fact was drawn from Edmund D. Randolph, treasurer of the New York Life Insurance Co., late in the day, after Attorney Chas. E. Hughes of counsel to the committee had labored for over an hour to get a direct answer from Mr. Randolph to a direct question.

The inquiry had dragged through a mass of figures during almost the entire day, but it was not until near the hour for ending the session that the sensational feature was brought out.
