CONTRACTORS TALK BACK TO ENGINEER HUNTER.

Some Lively Correspondence Read at City Hall Yesterday--To Improve Sewerage on Douglas Avenue.

There was a special meeting of the Water and Sewerage Board yesterday afternoon. The mayor presided, and there were also present: Ald. Vanwart, Mr. Arthur, Filley, Haman, Christie, Holder, Baxter, Sprout, Frink, McGoldrick and Pickett, Supt. Murdoch, Director Cushing, Engineer Hunter, Geo. McArthur and the common clerk.

Engineer Hunter's resignation was read. A letter from McArthur and McVay was also read, in which the contractors claimed Hunter's letter was misleading and full of prejudice. There has been no wrangling. They said that once Mr. Hunter advised them to throw up the contract and let the city finish it, as he was most anxious to get his hands on the city treasury. He is sore over the fact that he was obliged by the city to give a written order for the extra chamber sewer. Hunter's resignation was ordered laid on the table until Engineer Barbour could be consulted.

On motion of Ald. Christie Engineer Murdoch was requested to examine the city water and also, if necessary, find out how much it cost to connect the Douglas avenue sewer with the Bentley street sewer. The mayor, Ald. Frink and Ald. Macne were chosen a committee to take necessary steps to remove a building on North street that projects on the street.

Ald. Baxter said Mr. Schofield had asked him in regard to the warehouse and its terms. The agreement, he said, should be drawn. The mayor said the agreement was in Montreal now awaiting the signature of the C. P. R.

The Thomson people want to lease the southern face of the Reed's Point wharf for the Seneca. There was other business of this nature, and the mayor suggested the public works department hold a meeting.

Ald. McGoldrick said the first steamer had left Liverpool today for St. John, and an allotment of berths should be made soon. The board then adjourned and transferred itself into the board of works.

Ald. Baxter moved the director call for plans and specifications for heating in offices and in the gear rooms, and also for No. 4 warehouse. Ald. McGoldrick seconded this--Carried.

The Thomson request for the southern side of Reed's Point wharf was read, offering rental at \$600 per year. The company would like a drop put in, about 60 feet long. Bart. Rogers and W. Quinn and others also wished to get the Anchor Line offices.

Percy W. Thomson said his firm was offering \$200, to use the wharf for one day a week. A drop would be required and the shed must be water tight. The drop would cost \$40. If the line give up the wharf in a year they would pay

BRITISH S LDERS LEAVE HALIFAX NEXT W. K

Matters are gradually being straightened out for the taking over of the Garrison by the Canadian Militia Department. It is now stated that as many as possible of the 6th Royal Garrison Regiment will be sent home by the Canada leaving here on the 13th so as to leave as much accommodation as possible on the second steamer a week later, in the hope that the greater part of the two companies of Royal Artillery bound home can be taken by her. About sixty of the men of the R. G. A. will remain and enlist in the Canadian service. Good inducements were offered these men and with master gunners and sergeants of the Imperial service, these trained men will be of great benefit to the Canadian Artillery as they know "all the ropes" and are familiar with the forts and the arms and equipment. It is understood that the steamer Alfreda of the transport service has been secured by the Militia Department, and her crew been engaged to continue in the Canadian service as they had been doing in the Imperial. The steamer Lily of the same service, and her crew have likewise been secured. It is thought unlikely the Canadian service will do much with the mine operations.--Halifax Echo.

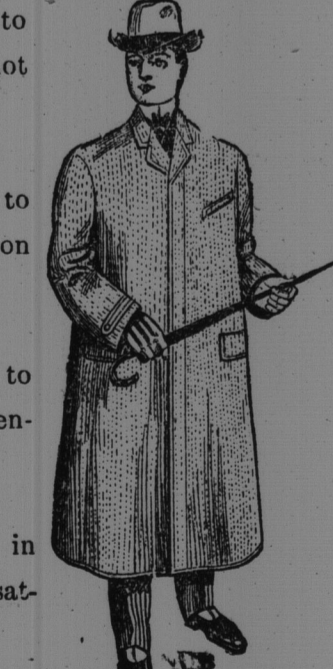
