FREDERICTON MAN DEAD IN THE WEST

A. S. Thompson was Formerly With the C. P. R. at Capital—To Study Agriculture in Canada

FREDERICTON, July 19.—Word was received this evening of the accidental death at Strathmore, Alberta, of A. S. Thompson, formerly of the C. P. R. freight department here. No particulars of the death have been received. The deceased lived here for about two years and last Christmas went west. He leaves a widow, formerly Miss Desale Peppers of this city, to whom he was married seven months ago.

BERGER TALKS LARGE

NEW YORK, July 18.—Sam Berger came to New York yesterday and put up at the Hotel Wellington. He was in fine shape and bore no marks of his contest with Jack O'Brien, except a cut over the left eye. He said that his eye was cut by O'Brien's elbow during the fight, and that he was not so wounded as all serious.

Upon his arrival here he found awaiting him a letter from Sam, asking him to appear in Los Angeles during August and September. There is some trouble about the dates in the west, as the fighting trust is having a hard time straightening out its affairs. Berger said that he was not going to make any reply to the offer until he got a really good proposition.

"A matter of fact," said Sam, "I am not anxious to fight for the next two or three months. I am going to devote all my time to getting into the best of shape. My ultimate goal is Jeffries, and I know that I will have to fight him before I can hope to tackle him."

"I feel much elated over the decision rendered for the bout. This was my first professional fight, and as I have not had the gloves on for a year and a half I was a bit nervous. I set to find that I could make it warm for O'Brien. I have met this man, who is generally conceded to be the cleverest man in the ring, and have beaten him at his own game. That is much satisfaction to me, and I am now going to try to do even better."

BASEBALL

In the presence of about 400 spectators last evening the St. Peter's shut out the F. M. A.'s by five runs and put a final clinch on the inter-society league championship.

The north enders played an excellent, steady game of ball, having only one error, which was almost excusable. They hit Bent for six safe ones in the first two innings and only allowed one man during the five innings to get safely to second base.

NEW YACHT FOR ST. JOHN.

The sloop yacht Vagabond arrived yesterday afternoon. She is the property of Dr. Merrill, Ernest Everett and Horace Brown. She was formerly the Helen of Boston and was bought by the St. John men from Mr. Crocker of Weymouth, Mass.

The vessel is a commodious cruising yacht, 35 feet over all, 11 feet inches beam, 22 feet on the water line, and is a five tons register. She was built in 1903.

She was called here by Mr. Matthews, who at one time sailed Irving Lovitt's yacht of Yarmouth. The trip here occupied about a week, the vessel being laid up in Cutten, Me., for two days on account of the heavy fog.

The yacht will sail under the colors of the R. K. Y. C. and although she was built chiefly for comfort, is quite speedy, and will make a valuable addition to the fleet.

CIRCUS TICKET PRICES

Chas. Hutchinson, treasurer of Barnum & Bailey, announces the following prices and arrangements for circus tickets: The admission to the show is fifty cents for adults and twenty-five cents for children, but these are not reserved seats, the latter being extra according to location. A grand stand chair costs one dollar, which includes admission; the ordinary reserved seats are seventy-five cents, which also includes admission, and the boxes, seating six people, are nine and twelve dollars, these tickets also including admission. The admission tickets are sold only on the ground when the door is open and not down town, but all other seats excepting the seventy-five cent reserve, via, grand stand chairs and boxes, can be purchased at the downtown ticket office at regular prices as above stated. These seats will be had on the grounds at opening hours. The report that the cheapest seat is one dollar is positively wrong, as the admission is only fifty cents and the reserve seats extra, as the above plainly explains.
