OTTAWA, Aug. 15.—Wesley Upton has been arrested. A cablegram from the office of the high commissioner brought the news to Colonel Sherwood, chief of the Dominion police. Upton has a record in the West which should make things interesting for him when he gets back. He was agent of the Canadian Pacific at Coleman, Alberta, and went with a hundred dollars and a ticket of the company. He became Dominion Express agent at Yorkton, Alberta, and left with \$300 of the company's funds. He was postmaster at Dummer, B. C., and before disappearing from there a number of remittance letters were missing. He will be tried for stealing from the express company.
