TO RESUME SEARCH FOR LOST CHILDREN

Moncton (Iron Will Go Back to Bayfield to Look for Creamer Tots.

MONCTON, N. B., Aug. 21.—Constable C. H. Thomas and ex-Police Constable will return this week to Bayfield for another week's search in an effort to solve the Creamer mystery. Melvin Stevens, foreman of the L. C. R. freight shed, has placed at the disposal of Messrs. Scott and Thomas sufficient funds to pay their expenses at Bayfield for another week's search, and is confident in their ability to find the missing tots. Mr. Thomas, who has been the idea of the Woodstock hypnotist who claims that his subjects located the children while under his hypnotic influence. The hypnotist, it will be remembered, claimed that the children walked twelve miles in twelve days, while Mr. Thomas says that there are not twelve miles of woods in which they could walk, the woods being only five miles long.

NEW TRANSCONTINENTAL TRAIN FOR THE C. P. R.

Will Be Made up Entirely of Sleepers and Will Make the Journey in 96 Hours

MONTREAL, Aug. 21.—The Canadian Pacific "ambassador" announced today that beginning with the arrival of the steamship Empress of Britain at Quebec on Aug. 31st, a new transcontinental train will be put on. The new train will be made up entirely of sleepers and will run from the wharf at Quebec to the wharf at Vancouver, where close connection will be made with the Empress sailing for the Orient once every three weeks. The new service will be possible for a passenger to leave London every three weeks and reach Hong Kong in thirty days, traveling all the way from Liverpool on the C. P. R. ships or train and making the journey with only two changes in five days better time than is possible by any other route. The new train will make a run between Quebec and Vancouver in 96 hours. The equipment will be the best used on the road. The new service is the result of an arrangement made to carry the British mail, and is expected that it will result in securing a very large proportion of the British travel to the East for the C. P. R. route.

HOW THEY PROTECT FORESTS IN MAINE.

System of Mountain Stations Being Established, From Which Fires are Located and Instructions Given for Extinguishing Them.

(Bangor Commercial.) The system of forest protection which is being maintained through the state land agent's office and the large timberland owners of the state is constantly being extended and made more valuable every year by the building of new mountain observatories. The observatories already located on Squaw mountain, Ateon mountain, and Mt. Bigelow have been the means of saving millions of dollars worth of standing timber from being devoured by the forest fiend.

TELEPHONE CONNECTION.

This station is connected by telephone with Charlie Randall's camp at Touch pond and from there connects with Greenville over the Moosehead Telephone Co. line. It was from this station that the fire on Touch pond, near Crawford pond, was discovered two weeks ago and reported to Greenville. A gang of men was sent to the fire and checked it. The high wind on Sunday, Aug. 13, started the fire up again and the station reported it and sent a crew to fight it. The station is in charge of Emery G. Bell of Milo, who has a neat little camp less than a mile from the top of the mountain, with a telephone in the camp and also near the highest peak. The topographical chart for the use of the man at the station was drawn by St. B. Crowley of Greenville. Next year it is expected that the station at Whitecap will be connected by telephone with the Katahdin Iron Works from which place men can be sent to a fire located by the station quicker than they could be sent from Greenville. These mountain observatories are becoming a great factor in the protection of the Maine forests. The expense of installing the stations is not great, averaging about \$750. All the stations are equipped with the most improved range-finders, and with a topographical chart of all the country that can be seen. If the man at the station sights the smoke of a forest fire on his territory he can locate its distance by means of his range-finders, and by means of his topographical chart can tell with remarkable accuracy where the fire is. When he telephones news of his discovery to the nearest point from which the men can be sent he can tell the man in charge of the fire fighters the location of the fire so closely that no time is lost in getting to it. There is still a vast expanse of valuable timberland in the state which is not protected by one of these stations but it seems as if the time is not far distant when every elevation commanding a view of forest country will be topped with a signal station for the discovery and location of forest fires.

MONCTON CHICKEN THIEVES WANT TRIAL BY JURY.

Made Their Choice Before Judge Wells Yesterday—Former Dorchester Boy Killed in Boston.

DORCHESTER, N. B., Aug. 21.—Judge Wells was in Dorchester today and had the three prisoners recently rounded up by the police of Moncton for the alleged stealing of poultry and vegetables brought before him. He gave them the choice of a trial under the "speedy act" or by jury. In each case they elected to be tried by jury and were remanded to jail to await the September sitting of the court. Charles Smith, a former Dorchester boy but of late a resident of Boston, who reported accidentally killed in that city today. The telegram announcing the affair did not give particulars. His stepmother, Mrs. John Smith, is a resident of Dorchester.

DOVIE AND VOLIVA MAKE PEACE.

Elijah Will Be Boss Prophet of Zion and Voliva Will Be Business Agent.

CHICAGO, Aug. 21.—John Alexander Dowie and Wilbur Glenn Voliva have agreed to withdraw their differences and will unite in the government of Zion. By the terms of an agreement reached today Dowie will for the remainder of his life be the "First Apostle," while temporal affairs will be in the hands of Zion. Dowie will drop all attempts to get possession of the assets of Zion. He also agrees to assist Voliva for the office of General Overseer at the election ordered by the court for next month. In return Voliva and his followers promise that as soon as the office of general overseer is vested in Voliva he will proclaim his faith in the teachings of Dowie and acknowledge his supremacy in all matters pertaining to the church.
