ROMANCE OF YALE IN DIVORCE COURT

Suit Brought to Free Edwin K. Norton, Former Student in Science, From Salesgirl Wife.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Sept. 14.—The romance of Edwin K. Norton, who surprised his freshmen friends in Yale by marrying Miss Josephine C. Birney last January, is to end in the divorce court. It proceedings that were formally begun today end in a dissolution of the marriage he will return to Yale.

Norton is now in Europe, and has been there for several months by orders of his father, Edwin Norton, of New York. He came here a year ago and entered Sheffield Scientific School. In a dancing school he met Miss Birney, a tall, pretty blonde salesgirl in a dry goods store, who acted as a clerk because of her fine physical proportions. She is about two years older than her husband, who is only nineteen.

After a brief engagement Norton and the girl were married on January 23 to Bradford and were married by a justice of the peace. The justice agreed to keep the wedding a secret until after Norton should be graduated from Yale, but the statute which requires reports of such ceremonies to be made months to towns clerks of the main towns of contracting parties forced publicity. Then Norton's father and Carl Danby, his father-in-law, came here and took him away.

Mrs. Norton, 37, remained at her home and returned to the store where she sold dry goods. Detectives have kept close watch of her movements, and more serious offences committed on several dates in Hartford are set up in the complaint. Through her attorney she said today that she had been aware that she was being shadowed, and that she was innocent of any misconduct, but was the victim of a conspiracy. She threatened to sue her father-in-law for alienating her husband's affections.

TO STAMP OUT POLYGAMY.

Mounted Police Keeping Strict Watch on Mormons in Alberta.

WINNIPEG, Sept. 14.—A despatch from Salt Lake City, Sept. 14, says that the Utah Mormon church is being crushed in this province, and proof of the same has just been furnished by the North-West Mounted Police. Utah Mormon came here with one of his wives, leaving another well provided for in the United States. He came with wife No. 2, and No. 1 followed. The child of No. 1 fell sick, and he visited his other household. The police forbade this custom, but agreed to take no action provided he would live with No. 1 only. This he refused to do, and matters were this week referred to Ottawa. Other instances have been referred out by the North-West Mounted Police. Several Mormons have left the country in a hurry. The village of Taylorville, 15 miles from J. I. Taylor, a chief of the Mormon Church in Canada, and an apostle in Utah until recently. He was deposed a short time ago. It being known that he had five wives.

NEW BRITISH ARMY ORDER.

General Staff in Accordance With Recommendations of British Military System Formed.

LONDON, Sept. 14.—War Minister Haldane last night issued an army order formerly constituting a general staff in accordance with the recommendations of the British military system. It will be judged by the men it produces. If they prove themselves pedantic theorists, failure will result, but if they show themselves capable of mastering the science of war and imparting their knowledge to the army at large, the influence of the staff will become as far-reaching as it is in Germany or Japan.

THE PREFERENTIAL TRADE QUESTION

Discussion of Old Question Being Revived in England—Trade With Canada.

LONDON, Sept. 14.—At a meeting of the Bristol Chamber of Commerce, while discussing preferential trade within the Empire, Davies Bristol said that while having due regard to our foreign trade, we ought to give our attention to colonial trade, as it was this trade which could most helpfully be developed. Joseph Walton, M. P., argued that there was no practical basis on which we could set up a preferential trade with even Canada. E. Parkes, M. P., replied that the preference given by Canada had increased our exports thither by over a hundred per cent.

A. J. Hobson argued that we could give Canada no preference without raising the price of our people's food and Canadian manufacturers would stoutly resist the admission of their goods on any terms which would bring them into real competition with their own. Any such operation would not strengthen the bonds of the Empire. Among the resolutions reaffirmed was one in favor of cheaper postage with Canada, so as to afford British merchants and manufacturers the same trade opportunities as that enjoyed with the United States ones.

WON'T AGREE TO UNION STATION AT REGINA

Sir Thomas Shaughnessy Refuses to Join With the Canadian Northern—Dr. Pugsley's Old Line Must Find New Terminals.

REGINA, Sept. 14.—A sensation caused in the city this afternoon was caused by the publishing in the Standard of a story to the effect that Sir Thomas Shaughnessy had communicated to the city his opinion on the union station project, to the effect that such a proposition could not be entertained by the Canadian Pacific, which had already ample facilities for doing business in the capital city of Saskatchewan. Asked as to whether the report was correct, the president said it certainly was. His company, he said, possessed all the facilities, the requirements and are at present the only company bringing trade into Regina. William Whyte, second vice-president and the directors present spoke to the same effect. This is a matter which the citizens of Regina have very much at heart, and the news is a severe blow especially as a notification was received today from the Railway Commission to the effect that that body has no jurisdiction along these lines.

Reminded that William Macdonald, president of the Canadian Northern, claims half the Regina yards by reason of his purchase of the Regina Alkali works, Mr. Whyte said that there was no foundation for such claims. The Qu'Appelle and S. R. Railway of the party present, Henry Joseph said that he had not been in the West for eighteen years, when the line was in its infancy. Much as we have heard in the East of the wonderful development of the West, what we have seen altogether bears our expectations. When I was here before Regina was a mudhole. Now you have splendid streets and buildings, and are the wonder town of the West.

RICHMOND, Va., Sept. 14.—What might have been a matrimonial tangle in the narrow kind of a margin, was averted today by Judge Mason all but married Miss Scott to Miss E. N. Elliott, who was present to act as maid of honor to Mrs. Donahoe Gary, the bride. As Miss Elliott is younger than Miss Gary the judge assumed that she was the bride and addressed all his questions to her. The judge did not notice that Miss Elliott failed to answer, and was surprised when the bridegroom interrupted the ceremony near its conclusion to designate his bride. The marriage service was then begun all over again.

PUBLIC PLAYGROUNDS.

(Toronto News.)

Children in Boston appreciate the action of the City Service in creating playgrounds. The Transcript says, in a recent number: "Hundreds go to the Public Garden playground every day to stay until the last possible moment, as if never expecting to have another chance to play until spring." In this playground there are large sand-boxes where the little ones can shovel and dig to their hearts' content, and to their bodies' betterment. There are many swings, and many other devices suitable for children of all sizes and tastes. The playground is in charge of a kind but firm superintendent, who subdues roughness when it becomes too violent.

So far in Toronto there has been an inability among aldermen, as well as citizens, to distinguish between playgrounds and parks. A park of twenty acres may be very beautiful, but it can never be more for children than a place for decorous loafing. On the contrary, the playground invites to physical action, and provides a substitute for the street. Children must play if they are to become useful members of society, and it should be the duty of a municipal council to provide suitable places for the expression of surplus energy.
