DEATH SEQUEL OF
UNREQUITED LOVE.
Body of Woman Found in Fall River Boat
 That of M. Rollins, of Brooklyn.

NEW YORK, Sept. 18.—Through a check issued to her by the Remington Typewriter Company, for the repair of a typewriter, the identity of Miss M. Rollins, of No. 218 Carlton avenue, Brooklyn, who was found dead in her stateroom on the steamship Priscilla, of the Fall River line, at Fall River, on Sunday, was definitely established yesterday. The young woman had registered at M. Rollins, of Brooklyn. Inquiry at the address named last night elicited the information that Miss Rollins had lived there infrequently of late. Subsequent to an extended visit to Philadelphia and Baltimore, she returned to her Carlton avenue home recently, but only for a short stay. Last Thursday, she packed her valise and stated that she was about to leave the city.

This last sudden departure of Miss Rollins is attributed to her learning of the recent marriage of Dr. Eldred, of No. 389 Bergen street, Brooklyn, with whom she had for a long time been infatuated. Dr. Eldred married five weeks ago and left this country soon thereafter with his bride for Puerto Rico. Miss Rollins met Dr. Eldred several years ago while the latter was confined in a hospital in Brooklyn with a severe attack of rheumatism. Her attention to him was so insistent, he alleged, that he caused her arrest. The case caused considerable comment at the time.

SCHOONER MAY QUEEN
IS A TOTAL WRECK

NORTH SYDNEY, Sept. 18.—This morning Messrs. Joseph Salter Sons received a telegram from Port aux Basques, stating that the schooner May Queen, owned and commanded by Capt. John Gillan, of Channel, Nfld., had, during a heavy sea on Friday struck at high tide on the submerged rock known as the "Sunkers," at Isle of Miramichi, about 10 miles east of Port aux Basques. Although a heavy sea was running there was an absence of wind, which caused the vessel to drift towards land. The schooner, which was fifteen years old and valued at about \$1,000, had only \$400 insurance.

STONED MARQUESE
DE CASTELLANE

Mother of Comte Jean Severely Injured in Automobile Between Padua and Venice

PARIS, Sept. 18.—The N. Y. Herald has been informed by a letter dated Venice, Sunday, of an outrage of which the Marquise de Castellane was a victim while she was travelling by automobile. The marquise, accompanied by her son, Comte Jean de Castellane, was returning on Saturday from Padua to Venice, when a stone about as large as an egg was thrown by some miscreant who was hidden at the side of the road.

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YOUNG ACTRESS IN
AN INSANE ASYLUM
Miss Pansy Lowthian, Heiress of Mining
 Expert, Now on Ward's Island

DENVER, Colo., Sept. 18.—Miss Pansy Lowthian, an actress and singer and heiress to part of the estate of Thomas Lowthian, a Denver mining expert, is insane in New York city. Warren D. Woodman, her attorney, was appointed conservator of her estate today, on representation to Judge McCall that she had been adjudged insane in New York and placed on Ward's Island.

Miss Lowthian is to inherit a trust fund of \$10,000 if she lives to be twenty-five years old. In case of her death the fund will revert to persons living in England. She was the foster daughter of the late Thomas Lowthian, who provided in his will that \$10,000 be set aside and the income paid to her until she is twenty-five years old, two years hence.

The girl was told by friends after the death of her foster father that she was an adopted child. She asked her foster mother, now Mrs. O. B. Liddell, about the story, and when she learned the truth she was broken hearted. This was the beginning of a breach between the girl and Mrs. Liddell that gradually widened until there was complete separation.

Miss Lowthian spent a short time in a convent in Council Bluffs, and then decided to go upon the stage. She had an excellent voice and sang a year in Italy cultivating it.

Miss Lowthian's friends were shocked by the announcement in November, 1901, that she had been committed to the asylum. She was taken there by the chief of police of Toronto, Ont., saying Miss Pansy Lowthian had been murdered in the Canadian city. It was learned a few days later that Miss Lowthian was alive and well in Rochester, N. Y., and had never been in Toronto.

Miss Lowthian had been supposed to be quietly living in New York since the incident, her salary as an actress being supplemented by an income of \$50 a month from the trust fund in Denver.

LIMBLESS HINDOO
IS STILL DETAINED
The West Indian Freak Not Allowed to
Enter a Museum in Boston.

The following paragraph from the Boston Post tells of the armless and legless Hindoo who was turned away from St. John last spring.
