

EVIDENCE MAKES COLLINS SHAKY

Accused Murderer's Composure Shaken by Damaging Testimony—Miss McAuley's Property in His Possession—Watch He Carried Resembled Hers—Examination, Resumed Yesterday, Will Be Continued Today.

HOPEWELL CAPE, Sept. 22.—The preliminary examination of Thomas Collins, charged with the murder of Mary Ann McAuley, adjourned from September 11th, was resumed in the court house at 2 p. m. today before Squire Magistrate Stuart. Hon. Mr. Tweedie and Clerk of Peace Dixon for the crown and J. C. Sherran, the prisoner's counsel, were in their places, and as usual a large assemblage of visitors were present, including many ladies, who pretty well filled the galleries. Miss McDonald, court stenographer, was in attendance, enabling the work of the examination to proceed with considerable dispatch.

A Liverpool chap. The witness referred to the festivities of the evening as described by last witness. He (witness) did not stay long in the house and did not see any watches. Maggie Goggin, the next witness, being sworn said she belonged in Moncton, but in August last lived at Mr. Martin's at Spruce Lake. She first saw the prisoner on Tuesday, August 21st, at Mr. Martin's house, when he asked to stay all night. She next saw him on Wednesday, 22nd, with young Dean and Messrs. Lynch, McCann and others at Martin's. They were in the room. When she saw Collins, Lynch and witness, Collins took a watch from his pocket, and she asked him to let her see it, which he did. There were three initials on it. She could not say what they were.

BETTING ON RACES RUINED BANK CLERK

MONTREAL, Sept. 22.—Betthing on the races was the cause of the downfall of J. S. Cather, the Bank of British North America clerk who disappeared on Monday with about \$25,000 of the bank's money. The direct cause of his detection was a bet he made of \$3,000 on a New York race, which he lost. Hitherto his bets had been modest, but this was apparently a do or die effort to regain what he had lost and square his books. The loss came to the ears of a city detective and he informed the bank authorities. The teller immediately took Cather out of the teller's box and placed him at other work pending an investigation made for the purpose of discovering if there was anything wrong. It was while this was on that Cather gave the city detective who had him under surveillance the slip and went off, it is said, to New York.

APPRISERS APPOINTED

Centenary Church Trustees Will Consider Rebuilding Question Tonight. The trustees of Centenary church relieved the members of the salvage corps of their responsibility and took over the charge of the church yesterday morning. They met later in the day to consider the selection of an appraiser to estimate the damage caused by Wednesday's fire. The matter was referred to Messrs. McLaughlin and Sealy. They appointed James Myles to represent the church. The insurance men appointed Edward Bates, Mr. Myles and Mr. Bates will commence their work in this connection today.

DETECTIVE KILLEN'S SERVICES NEEDED

Flippant Remark of a Speaker at Waterloo Street Church Meeting Caused Trouble. The members of the Waterloo street Baptist church held a meeting last evening to decide upon a new pastor. Rev. Mr. Prosser was in the chair. The meeting was not very well attended, and many of the members present expressed their views on the question of amalgamation, which was recently voted down. Those who spoke were in favor of keeping their own church, some of them being urged by the old associations which have over the years and which they could find in no other. They thought that if the amalgamation took place they would be "as strangers in a strange land," one of the speakers comparing the difference between the churches as equivalent to the difference between home and a boarding house.
